

Confirmation and Reception

Bishop Bruce Caldwell (retired bishop of Wyoming) will be here on Sunday, April 28, for confirmation and reception. He will confirm our youth who have been part of a two-year confirmation process with Karen Alison that also includes mentors and service work. He will also confirm and receive others who seek to be confirmed or received into The Episcopal Church.

The Book of Common Prayer (p. 412) defines confirmation as "a mature public affirmation of (ones) faith and commitment to the responsibilities of (ones) Baptism (through) the laying on of hands by the bishop." Reception is for those who were confirmed in another denomination who seek to become Episcopalian. They are "received" by the bishop during the service. Please talk to me or Barb Elliott if you would like to be confirmed or received on April 28.



Those desiring to be confirmed or received are encouraged to receive some instruction. This March and April we will offer four "Episcopal 101" sessions during Wednesday Church Nights. We will be using a new curriculum called "Walk in Love." These courses will cover basic Episcopal beliefs and practices including: the sacraments, grace, daily prayer and the liturgical calendar, core beliefs, the nature of the church, creeds, the Anglican way of Christianity, the Bible, prayer and spiritual practices.

Here's the description from the developers: "this series is ideal for people who are new to or curious about the Episcopal Church. It covers the uniquely Episcopalian approach to different central aspects of the faith. The courses are also good for people who want to go back and re-explore the basics — the big questions. How do we know what God wants from us? How do we think about the mystery of the Holy Trinity? What exactly happens when we are baptized? These and other great questions are addressed in ways that are accessible to people who are new to the church while offering food for thought to Christians who want to revisit these central tenets of the faith."

Walk in Love sessions will be 6:30-7:30 pm Wednesdays, March 13 & 20 and April 3 & 24 in the parish hall. These sessions will be helpful preparation for those seeking to be confirmed or received, and for anyone wishing to explore the basics of our faith in a group setting. There will be lots of opportunities for you to ask questions. New to Christianity? New to the Episcopal Church? Looking for a refresher on the basics? Check out "Walk in Love" in March and April!

LETTER FROM BISHOP BRIAN PRIOR

Action from General Convention regarding clergy sexual misconduct

February 6, 2019

Greetings ECMN,

At General Convention in July of 2018, The Episcopal Church took action in response to conversations that have been happening for years regarding the failures of the church to address issues of sexual harassment, exploitation, and abuse.

One of those actions came in the form of resolution 2018-D034. Beginning in January 2019, for a period of three years, the time limit set on bringing complaints and initiating proceedings in cases of clergy misconduct against adults is being lifted. There has never been a time limit for reporting clergy sexual misconduct against children and youth. This will remain the same.

Any allegations of misconduct in the Episcopal Church in Minnesota can be directed to the ECMN intake officer, Rebecca Bernhard, who can be reached by email at bernhard.rebecca@dorsey.com or by phone at (651) 261-8940.

This is just one small step among the many necessary to bring justice and accountability around this issue. We hope, however, as stated by the President of the House of Deputies, The Rev. Gay Clark Jennings, and the Presiding Bishop, The Most Rev. Michael Curry, that actions like these help "our church move closer to the day when, having repented of our sins and amended our common life, we may be restored in love, grace and trust with each other through our Savior Jesus Christ." The Bishop search process continues. Three more members have been added to the team for a total of fifteen. Part of the mission area communications is to have a voice in the walk-about process. Select Bishop Candidates will travel around Minnesota to meet Episcopalians and share a bit about themselves.

Another part of voting for the Bishop is at the Election being held in January, 2020. This meeting will be a continuation of the September 2019 Convention. The same lay delegates who are credentialed at the October convention will be the delegates voting in the January convention.

Do you know who your St. Paul's lay delegates to ECMN are? We currently have four delegates and one alternate delegate. The delegates are Nat Constance, Sue Meyer, Jill Peterman, and Rita Rosenberger. The alternate delegate is Nelson Thomas. Nat Constance also has the role of serving the Northeast Mission Area Team, which represents the eleven Episcopal faith communities in the region stretching from Moose Lake, Duluth, Grand Marais, International Falls and the Iron Range.

CHURCH NIGHTS IN MARCH

Check out Wednesday Church Nights this month. Church Nights have become an important part of our Christian Formation program and include something for everyone.

Our 5:30 pm Eucharist is held in church. This is a great way to attend service if you are not able to make it on Sunday (or even if you are able!). We gather in the front pews. We are grateful that Brad Brunfelt leads our music on his guitar. This service is less formal and shorter than Sunday. We use the scripture readings for the coming Sunday.

Buffy Helstrom (and friends) prepare our simple suppers that begin at 6:00. Buffy does a wonderful job preparing a simple, healthy meal that we ask you to help support by making a donation toward defraying the cost.

Church Nights will meet three times per month with programming from 6:30-7:30pm. Two Wednesdays, the children and youth have age-specific faith formation for grades 3 through Confirmation. There is a new "Music and Movement" activity for preK through 2nd grade. Faith formation is lifelong; so adults have the opportunity to engage in programs, speakers and discussions on various topics. Please let me know if you have suggestions for speakers or programs.

One Wednesday we will be together for GIFT; Growing in Faith Together, which gives a chance for all ages to engage in fun faith activities together. We will have one Wednesday where we don't gather at church, instead that time can be used for focusing on faith at home. On the months where there are five Wednesdays, our church leaves the building and engages in a service project with a local social service agency or group.

This month will feature two sessions of "Walk in Love" an "Episcopal 101" course on the basics of the faith. Sisters and brothers in Christ,

In the summer of 2013, I sat down at the desk in the music office on the top floor of the church and looked out the window for a while. Then I set about the task at hand, and I knew I had come home. I was, once again, needing to immerse myself in the lectionary readings for the upcoming Sundays and answer the question, "What does this community of faith need to sing in order to live out these readings?" My previous employment was as organist, and I did little to no worship-planning in that congregation. I didn't realize how much I had missed it. As you may know, the readings we use in church (the lectionary) are on a three-year cycle. I have been through that three-year cycle several times, but it is always new and fresh. It is humbling to approach the ancient readings and discern how we can illuminate them in liturgical song for God's gathered people. It is central to my faith journey as I live into these texts each week.

I encourage you to experience the readings for the upcoming Sunday as part of your Lenten discipline. I believe it will make a difference as you come to worship on Sunday if you have read the Biblical texts beforehand. An online resource for this is at www.lectionarypage.net. There you will find a calendar where you can click on the Sunday, and the readings will come up. You can also download the texts as a Word file. Together, let us live into the Sunday readings. I trust it will enrich your faith journey.


