

#### **Calling**

It has been more than a year since we accepted Vibrant Faith Initiative's (<u>vibrantfaith.org</u>) invitation to create a culture of calling at St. Paul's. Since then, we have made calling a major focus and offered various programs, activities and reflections like the "Everyday Callings" column you find each month in the Messenger. Personally, the emphasis on calling has helped me to see and hear callings all around me. Bible stories, peoples' stories, NPR features, news segments, billboards, advertisements, movies, everywhere I turn there is calling!

Episcopal Youth Music Camp (EYMC) performs a musical each summer. This year it was *The Greatest Showman*, the story of P.T. Barnum. P.T. Barnum was the son of a poor tailor who fell in love with and eventually married Charity, a rich girl from the other side of town. He always wanted to be rich and famous and to have his name in lights. He was very successful, founding "Barnum's Circus," with a collection of talented misfits who became family to each other.

In an attempt to increase his fame and fortune and to appeal to the upper class, Barnum lost his way. He went on the road to manage the career of famed Swedish singer Jenny Lind. The movie features a heart-wrenching scene where Barnum and Lind's carriage pulls away for their national tour as Barnum's daughters chase from behind. Eventually, he comes to his senses.



In a scene that features the song "From Now On" Barnum sings: "for years and years I chased their cheers, the crazy speed of always needing more. But when I stop and see you here, I remember who all this was for." He promises to live differently "from now on." He was called to change.

The Greatest Showman is the story of P.T. Barnum discerning his calling. Was he born to be rich and famous and to have his name in lights or to be Charity's husband and Caroline's and Helen's father? What is it that brings true joy? What is life all about?

It is possible to work for something your whole life and then achieve it only to discover that it does not bring the satisfaction you thought it would. And if this "success" comes at the expense of relationships, that is a hefty price to pay.

We will continue our focus on "Called to the Way of Love" this new school year. We are excited to welcome our coach from Vibrant Faith, Rev. Melissa Cooper, to St. Paul's September 19-22 for a site visit and more insights on calling. Keep your eyes, ears and heart open. Calling is happening all around, and perhaps even within, <u>you.</u>

#### **EVENING BIBLE STUDY**

Our evening Bible study group is now discussing Genesis, re-visiting the origin stories that ground Christianity and the other monotheistic faiths. We have been discussing Abraham and Sarah's experiences, along with Isaac and his family's adventures so far, and will continue with the Jacob stories as we go forward.

It was a long first day, as campsites were not available, so there was more traveling to do. We finally found a campsite on the third lake (two portages later), thanks to the sharp eyes of Grace B.

We had good weather, and good company. There were a lot of good conversations to be had thanks to the firewood provided by the campers and Ben's amazing wood-splitting skills. There was a great hammock village and our high schoolers, tired from a long year of school, took full advantage by chilling out in them, big time. Sydney H, Ben A, and Hannah G even slept in their hammocks when it was in the 40's! There was plenty of canoe and kayak exploration too by Jamie J and Grace B. Rumor has it Jamie almost caught a fish...

Hannah G summed up our trip well by saying this:" I found interesting about this trip is that the Timber-Frear loop has many different lakes that connect to it but to get to each lake you need to portage. What surprised me the most is that in the beginning the portages were really easy, but then on the last day the last two portages were the longest. The best part of this trip was not being on my phone at all: it felt so good just to get off of my phone for a while and to spend time outside with friends. Another one would have to be sitting in my hammock most of the time and just looking out over the water and watching the sunset

and sunrise everyday that we were there. The wilderness helped me center myself because I really don't like being inside for long periods of time and for me to go outside it is like a breath of fresh air and it helps me center myself by being in nature"

It is good to take time out and reflect in nature and to take in the stark landscapes devoid of human creations. When we do that, when we simplify our existence to travel, food, sleep, and community, we find a unique piece of the Divine.

We are planning another trip next year, and everyone is on board. Thanks again to adult leaders Jason Butcher, Nancy Diener, and Leslie Brunfelt. All the adults thank all the teen participants who made the trip a fun and fulfilling experience!

#### **UPDATE FROM YOUR VESTRY**

The Vestry met Tuesday, August 21, 2019 after the break for July. The Financial reports for June and July were reviewed and approved. There were two resolutions passed by the Vestry, the first funding the budget shortfall for 2018 in the amount of \$43,852.97. This amount was in addition to the recommended funding from our investment reserves of 5% which was taken in the calendar year 2018. The second resolution was passed authorizing a 5% draw from the reserve in the amount of \$43,338.97, plus \$15,107.00, the remaining funds from the sale of "The House Next Door", for the general operating costs for 2019.

Other items covered in the meeting was a review provided by Sue Van Oss on the new Safe Church Training material, Christian Formation and the St. Paul internet presence work she has done with the website, Facebook and others. Mary Helf provided insight into the status of our current Financial and Membership software and future upgrade needs. Other items discussed were building repairs, the 150th Anniversary Celebration and Rally Day.

Bill Van Oss provided a report on Clergy activities.

The September meeting will be held Tuesday September 17th.

#### Welcome Rev. Melissa Cooper



Early in 2018, St. Paul's was one of 24 congregations from throughout the country chosen to participate in a new initiative from Vibrant Faith (vibrantfaith.org). Vibrant Faith is an ecumenical faith formation organization.

The initiative is called *Creating a Culture of Calling*. We have received a three-year grant "to promote a congregational culture of calling that helps Christians of all ages discover their callings throughout life and equips them to live their vocation in the church community, at home and in the world."

Diane Kolquist and Bill & Sue Van Oss have participated in two convocations. Together with Leslie Brunfelt, Patrick Eidsmo, and Glenn Maloney we are working to embed calling into our various activities and ministries. There is no cost to the parish, and we are receiving invaluable training, contacts and resources.

We are pleased to welcome our coach from Vibrant Faith, Rev. Melissa Cooper. Melissa has been working with us on "Creating a Culture of Calling." She is from Orlando, Florida and will visit with us September 19-21. We will have a special event on Saturday evening and Melissa will preach on September 22. Please give her a warm St. Paul's welcome.

#### A PLACE TO HEAL

What if you were being released from the hospital and had no safe place to go? Until a year ago, that happened often in Duluth. People that were homeless had a table and talk - often about hopes medical issue, got it taken care of and then were back on the streets again whether they were medically stable or not.

Now there is a medical respite house in Duluth, Bob Tavani Medical Respite house at 2119 W. Second St. I am fortunate enough to volunteer there twice a month and I have been asked to share my experience.

The goal of the house is that people are healed when they leave. Kate and Kelly, the live-in volunteers, assist the residents in navigating housing barriers and help them to be in a better position before leaving. Some go to new permanent housing and some are reintegrated with their family.

My job as a volunteer? Depends on the residents there. Typically, I am there from 6 pm – 10 pm on a Thursday night. When I get there, supper is usually ready. We sit down and eat together as a family would and just talk about the day. After dinner, we clean up and get ready for the evening. When residents are newly discharged from the hospital, they often go to bed after supper. Otherwise, we watch TV together, play cards or work on

projects they are involved in. Sometimes we sit at the dinner and dreams for their future. Pretty much the same stuff any family would do.



I've been volunteering there for about a year. The house is a result of many people and organizations working together including First Covenant Church (the house belongs to them), CHUM (community partner), and Duluth Family Medicine program doctors. But they need us, also. If you are interested in volunteering, drop in any Saturday morning from 10 am-1 pm for homemade muffins, coffee, and the crossword puzzle. If this is not the time to volunteer, please like the Bob Tavani Respite Facebook page and consider becoming an "angel" for needed supplies. Their Facebook page is also where they post needed things like recently, they needed a blender for a guest who was moving on. Many hands are needed to carry on this mission – there are only three medical respite houses in Minnesota, the other two in the Twin Cities.

One Wednesday we will be together for GIFT; Growing in Faith Together, which gives a chance for all ages to engage in fun faith activities together. We will have one Wednesday where we don't gather at church, instead that time can be used for focusing on faith at home. On the months where there are five Wednesdays, our church leaves the building and engages in a service project with a local social service agency or group.

#### September Church Night Adult Programs:

**September 11 – Welcome back** and "Called to the Way of Love" Bill Van Oss will lead a discussion and refresher on our focus on being called to the Way of Love (see: episcopalchurch.org/way-of-love)

#### **CONVENTION UPDATE**

The 2019 Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in Minnesota (ECMN) will be held September 13 and 14 in Bloomington, Minnesota. The Delegates to Annual Convention are comprised of all Clergy canonically resident in ECMN and Lay Delegates elected for three-year terms from each faith community in ECMN. Lay Delegates elected from St. Paul's are: Nat Constance, Sue Meyer, Jill Peterman, and Rita Rosenberger. Our youth delegates elected by Northeast Mission Area to represent the Northeast Mission are both from St. Paul's as well: Sydney Hanna and Luisa Van Oss (alternate).

It should be noted that these same delegates, as well as the youth delegate and alternate elected by the NE Mission Area, are the same delegates who qualify to attend and vote at the special session of Annual Convention to be held on January 25, 2020 for the election of the 10<sup>th</sup> Bishop of ECMN -- location to be announced.

The Delegates at the September 13-14 Annual Convention of ECMN will be voting on several important matters, including:

- Procedures for the nomination of the 10<sup>th</sup> Bishop of ECMN and the transition and consecration of our new Bishop.
- Special Rules of Order for conducting the January 25, 2020 special session of Annual Conven-

tion at which the 10<sup>th</sup> Bishop of ECMN will be elected.

- ECMN Budget for the years 2020, 2021, 2022. ECMN not only budgets for the upcoming year (2020) but also establishes preliminary budgets for the following two years (2021 and 2022) as well.
- Several Constitutional and Canonical amendments
- Election of several Standing Committee members, Trustees, Commission on Ministry members, and other officers of ECMN (e.g., Treasurer, Secretary, Chancellor)
- Election of Deputies to the Episcopal Church's triennial General Convention. These Deputies are elected at ECMN's Annual Convention in September will attend the next session of General Convention in Baltimore, MD in the summer of 2021. General Convention is the fundamental governing body of the Episcopal Church comprised of two Houses: The House of Deputies (elected Clergy and lay Deputies from each Diocese of the Episcopal Church) and the House of Bishops. It is held every three years at a different location throughout the country.

#### **Everyday Callings**



We have been talking about calling for the past year or so at St. Paul's. Like many others, I thought calling was reserved for people who served in the church, or maybe someone called to be a doctor. I didn't really know how the concept applied to all of us. As I have learned more about it, I am able to identify things in my own life that I consider callings.

My professional career is as an accountant. My first realization about calling is that my work does seem to be the intersection of something I am good at and something others need, perhaps a calling. As I learn more, I realize being an accountant has put me in places and with people where I have been called in another way.

Financial work with small business owners can be intimate. People tend to be very private about their financial situations, so as an accountant I am already in a trusted posi-

tion. Combine the trust with a couple of key questions about how things are going for them and I have ended up listening to stories about sick parents, challenges with siblings, financial worries, death, divorce, and many other very intimate and sometimes painful things. I give people space and confidentiality that they expect regarding their financial information and they use that to share other things. I am not a trained counselor, so I don't do much more than listen and offer support. But I can't help but feel I am in the right place at the right time to help someone who may not feel comfortable reaching out to anyone else.

Callings happen outside of work, too. I am excited to share a story from last week. I was on a backpacking trip on the Superior Hiking Trail with my good friend, Beth Fait, and it seemed we were called to be on the trail at exactly that time to meet exactly the people we met. The first pair of backpackers we spoke to were a mother and daughter. The mother was thru hiking (doing the whole trail from the Wisconsin border to Canada – approx. 320 miles) and her daughter had joined her for a section. As we spoke with them, we found out that the mother's husband had died just a few weeks earlier from a long struggle with dementia. We asked a few questions and listened to her struggles. As we parted ways to continue our respective journeys, she called us "Trail Angels" and was inspired by Beth's last name (Fait – Fate?). We met another group along the way that had also suffered recent tragic losses. Again, we listened and offered support. Being together in nature without the distractions of everyday life already feels spiritual, but to be able to be there for others in that space was even more. It truly felt like we were called and had experienced (as one of our trail friends described it) "God winks."


