Waiting

Advent is a counter-cultural season. The world around us rushes to Christmas. Christmas trees decorate store windows. Christmas music fills our ears in Cub Foods. Television ads try to convince us that we can make it a special holiday season by purchasing the right gifts for our loved ones. While the world around us rushes to Christmas, we enter a church season — Advent — that encourages us to wait and to prepare.

Paul Tillich said this: "Our time is a time of waiting; waiting is its special destiny. And every time is a time of waiting, waiting for the breaking in of eternity. All time runs forward. All time, both history and in personal life, is expectation. Time itself is waiting; waiting not for another time, but for that which is eternal."

"Waiting for that which is eternal" is a wonderful description of Advent. We wait and watch for Christ's coming. We remember his coming a long time ago, a child born in a manger in Bethlehem. We believe Christ will come again in glory sometime in the future. We live in an "in-between" time here and now. Christ comes to us here and now. Christ lives through us here and now. The eternal, Christ, is known to us here and now.

Advent is time to prepare our hearts for Christ's coming. Remembering his coming into the world a long time ago on a starry night in Bethlehem, looking for his coming again in glory, and longing for his

coming into our lives and into our world today, we are encouraged to take time and make space for Christ to be born again in and through us.

The eternal seeks to make a home in our hearts and in the world. Take some time this Advent season to prepare your heart and your home for Christ's coming. Make it a priority to attend Sunday worship. Spend some time in quiet prayer. Pick up an Advent devotional at the Advent Festival (Nov. 24) and spend some time in reflection each day. Say a prayer as you light your advent wreath before your evening meal. Pray morning or evening prayer from the Prayer Book.




As the world rushes to Christmas, we are called upon to wait and to prepare. To wait and prepare not for what is passing away, but for that which is eternal.

Remembering the first service held in St. Paul's Church on December 25, 1869

This Christmas we will remember and honor the 150th anniversary of the first church service held in the original St. Paul's Episcopal Church on Lake Avenue and 2nd Street. It was held on Christmas Day, 1869. Newspaper accounts recall "Christmas Day was spent in Duluth appropriately, but soberly. The Episcopal Church (*it wasn't named St. Paul's until a year later, it was just called Jay Cooke's church*) was the principal scene of attraction in the morning- a good audience attending the first formal services of worship in the new structure. ...We congratulate all our citizens upon having already one completed church in Duluth; and it is a real gem.."

Special thanks to Bob Silverness for his research and Carrie Miller, the Altar Guild and Bruce Sederberg who are making plans to recreate some of the decorations that were used in 1869. It will be a beautiful sight, and the smell of fresh pine will be wafting through the sanctuary! There will also be a special surprise for children similar to what was distributed in the early years of St. Paul's. A second collection will be taken to benefit CHUM at all Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services in gratitude for 150 years of St. Paul's and in remembrance of the forebearers who collected funds at the Christmas services and distributed them to the needy. Our bells will ring out at the beginning and ending of the services as well; as they did 150 years ago. Some of the hymns that will be sung at the services will be the same ones sung 150 years ago. Join us to remember and celebrate the birth of Jesus and 150 years of St. Paul's.

Everyday Callings: A Calling To Serve

I have never considered myself much of a leader. Many times in my life, I have found myself in the awkward situation of trying to explain my point of view in a clear way. This usually includes way too many hand gestures. I can have the most wonderful conversations with a good friend or someone I feel comfortable around; someone who gets me. But when I am engaging with someone new, or a large group of people, I imagine them walking away from our

meeting feeling somewhat confused and thinking to themselves, "What just happened?". And so, when I was asked if I would consider becoming the director of the altar guild, my immediate gut feeling was, "Why on earth would anyone want to have me be the leader of such a distinguished group of faith-filled people! Surely they will dismiss me and any ideas I may have." I guess that didn't show much faith on my part of the truly wonderful people I have come to know and love as my fellow altar guild members. But back then in 2013, I would not have considered being an altar guild director my "calling". It was more like a slightly scary, intimidating step for me to overcome. How could I be worthy of caring for such traditions, not to mention carry around some of the 100+ year-old treasures we use in our worship services, like our irreplaceable chalice adorned with jewels given by the women of St Paul's, or our baptism bowl which has held the chrism oil that has anointed hundreds! And I think I resisted for a while, not feeling like I was meant for it. But then, something started to change in my heart. I began to feel a sense of calm and peace with this new responsibility in this wonderful place. I let myself feel the calling.

Many of you may be familiar with the movie "Dead Poet's Society". It was released in the summer of 1989 just before I became a senior in high school. I was deeply moved by this stirring, coming-of-age drama. A scene that really resonated with me happens early in the movie when actor Robin Williams, playing the role of a poetry teacher to a group of teenage boys at an elite boarding school in 1959, encourages them to look closely at pictures of past students in the school's trophy case. He urges the boys to lean in and listen to the young men of the past, as if to hear them whispering "Carpe diem." Now, this was particularly impactful to me for 2 reasons: 1) I knew what "Carpe diem" meant before it was even translated in the movie! I had just spent two years of my high school education taking Latin – my dad was so proud. And so I knew quickly that "Carpe diem" meant "Seize the day." 2) I absolutely believed that the faces of the boys in those pictures, boys who by now had become old men, were urging this next generation of young men to "Seize the day!" I could practically hear it

And now, as a member of the altar guild, I get the privilege of entering into all the holy places of our church and sacristy. I often find it easy to "geek out" at the amazingly old pieces of silver, brass, and linens that I can look at closely and hold. I do recognize that the church is more than a beautiful building and the things inside it. It is about the people, and how we are called to love one another. But also for me, when I really take a moment and pay attention, I can hear the voices of those wonderful people of the altar guild that have gone before me. They too held these items in their hands. They are whispering to me "carpe diem." Seize this day and make it count. Take what you have learned, felt and seen in this place, and go out in the world and spread it around.

Oh yes, this is my calling.

Church Nights in December

Wednesday Church Nights have some exciting offerings this month. Church Nights have become the centerpiece of our Christian Formation program and include something for everyone. The adult programs for Church Night will focus on health, wellness and safety this month.

Our 5:30 pm Eucharist is held in church. This is a great way to attend service if you are not able to make it on Sunday (or even if you are able!). We gather in the front pews. Tom Hamilton leads our music on the piano. This service is less formal and shorter than Sunday. We use the scripture readings for the coming Sunday.

Buffy Helstrom (and friends) prepare our simple suppers that begin at 6:00 pm. Buffy does a wonderful job preparing a simple, healthy meal that we ask you to help support by making a donation toward defraying the cost.

Church Nights meet three times per month with programming from 6:30-7:30 pm. Two Wednesdays, the children and youth have age-specific faith formation for grades pre-K through Confirmation. Faith formation is life-long, so adults have the opportunity to engage in programs, speakers and discussions on various topics. Please let me know if you have suggestions for speakers or programs.

One Wednesday we will be together for GIFT; Growing in Faith Together, which gives a chance for all ages to **engage** in fun faith activities together. We will have one Wednesday where we don't gather at church, instead that time can be used for focusing on faith at home. On the months where there are five Wednesdays, our church leaves the building and engages in a service project somewhere in our community.



<u>December Church Night Adult Programs:</u>
Our focus for December is: **Health, Wellness and Safety**.

December 4: Peter Hafften from **Age Well Arrowhead** will lead a training on **Dementia Friendly Living.** Dementia effects many aspects of our communities including our faith community. It is predicted that dementia cases will triple in years to come. One in three adults over age 80 already suffer from dementia. With the proper training and education, we can support those living with dementia and help them remain active members of our community. *Dementia Friendly Living* seeks to:

- Provide us with valuable communication strategies, easy physical changes that support those with dementia, and ways to detect early warning signs of dementia with older adults.
- 2. It supports those who are caregivers to loved ones with dementia and better educates everyone about the disease and resources available.
- It promotes education about the disease and allows us to become "Dementia Friendly." St. Paul's will be recognized for completing the training through Age Well Arrowhead's website, newsletter, and our social media!

December 11: Our own **Craig Heidenreich** will lead a session on **Personal Safety and Suspicious Behavior.** This comes out of requests from a number of people who have completed the newly revised **Safe Church Training** for more information.

December 18: Our **GIFT (Growing in Faith Together)** intergenerational church night will be singing **Christmas Carols** at the Woodland Garden Apartments, 127 East Calvary Rd, Duluth. Come at 6:00 pm. No 5:30 service or meal this week.

St. Paul's Creation Care Team

For several decades, St. Paul's has been highly involved in caring for God's creation through education, action and spiritual resources. For example we were designated a Green Congregation and worked with Ecolibrium3 on an energy audit and energy efficient lighting project. Now there is renewed interest and energy among several parishioners in continuing and expanding those efforts to combat climate change and care for creation on an individual and congregational level.

We are in the final step on being the first congregation in the Northland to be certified as a Climate Justice Congregation (and the second Episcopal parish in the state) through Minnesota Interfaith Power and Light. Climate Justice Congregations are faith communities who are committed to living out their faith through effective and sustained climate action. We hope to implement solutions that address systemic problems and co-create a just and sustainable world.



We have taken several small steps like composting food waste, using biodegradable items, reducing waste and plastics. Those are practical steps. In addition we are looking at systemic and spiritual steps as part of a three-legged stool to respond in ways that are effective and life-giving.

Notes of a Different Kind

Second verse just like the first. . . .

Each year we gather around the same story of angels and shepherds, Mary and Joseph, the innkeeper and the animals in the barn. However, each time I hear the story of Jesus' birth, I hear it differently. This year I hear it in my dad's voice, gentle and calm. I hear it in the voice of the community of St. Paul's as we sing and pray and eat and bless together. My prayer for all of us is that whatever makes us feel empty, Jesus, love born anew, will fill our hearts with calm and comfort.

December Library Notes

So, I was going to do an article on the Christmas books in the library. As I was thinking about this, I had a "duh" moment where I realized that the center of Christmas is the birth of Christ and the tale is told no better than in the Gospels. With that in mind, I thought I would give brief descriptions of some of the Bibles in the collection here at the library. They are all available to be checked out. They are listed in no particular order.



<u>Life Application Study Bible</u>: this Bible is annotated with application and explanatory notes. Each application note has three parts: (1) an explanation that ties the note directly to the Scripture passage (2) the bridge that explains the timeless truth and makes it relevant for today and (3) the application that shows you how to take the timeless truth and apply it to your situation. The explanatory notes help the reader understand the culture, history, context, background and places. Maps, charts and diagrams are also found on the same page as the passages to which they relate.

<u>The Spiritual Formation Bible</u>: this Bible is designed to help you reflect on the passages. Each page contains an "Entry Point" which is a short article based on a passage on or near the page on which the article appears. The contributors hope that these "reflective notes will help you enter the passage and make it come alive for you in a personal way."

The One Year Bible: this entire Bible is arranged in 365 daily readings.

<u>The Access Bible</u> is designed to provide study helps that enable the reader to engage biblical text directly. The study helps range from full length essays on topics of general interest to short, dictionary-like entries.

<u>Holy Bible.</u> This is a traditional King James version illustrated with masterpieces of religious art. It is published by Heirloom Publishers.

<u>Seniors' Devotional Bible.</u> This is a large print, King James version containing a years' worth of daily devotions on "the great art of living" with a focus on issues that may be especially important to an older adult – no matter where you are at in the process of aging and saging.

These are only a few of the Bible versions available at the library. There are several more for your reading pleasure and study.
