

From The Rev. Rick Swenson

It is interesting to contemplate the meaning of the word we use to describe this liturgical season: Epiphany. As I was trying to annunciate its meaning, I decided I should do what I was taught to do in grade school - look it up. I found that there are three primary definitions: a) a usually sudden manifestation or perception of the essential nature of or meaning of something; b) an intuitive grasp of reality through something (such as an event) usually simple and striking; c) an illuminating discovery, realization, or disclosure. It also means, in a more general theological sense, "an appearance or manifestation especially of a divine being." All four of these definitions have something to offer in understanding what it is that we are actually remembering and celebrating during the season of Epiphany.


I believe that we should always be alert to recognize those "epiphanies" that bring into stark reality the divine presence that manifests in our lives. In my own personal experience, I always seem to recognize and realize that presence "in the rearview mirror." I see the Spirit at work in my life as I look back on events and directions that my life has taken that I did not, nor perhaps could not, recognize at the time they occurred.

I do try to maintain a disciplined spiritual practice of prayer, reflection, and contemplation. A daily practice of prayer and reflection often called the "daily examine" is a helpful way to discern those epiphanies in our lives through which God speaks to us and calls us to follow our Lord and Savior. I highly recommend and encourage you to set aside a period of prayer and reflection each day to look back over your day and reflect on the "highs" and the "lows" and how God may have been manifested in the happenings of your day.

As I have reflected over the past several months about my unexpected call to serve you here at St. Paul's, I have become very much aware of the working of the Holy Spirit here in this place and at this time. Everyone I have met and come in contact with here at St. Paul's virtually exudes a vitality and commitment to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In

fact, one of my biggest challenges so far has been to try to "keep up with" the workings of the Spirit here at St. Paul's.

The next few months here at St. Paul's will be full of events which will challenge all of us to follow where God is leading us. We will welcome a new Music Director, we will host



our Bishop, we are engaged in a process of discernment around the next Rector of this faith community, we will observe Lent and celebrate Easter, we will re-form our pastoral care ministry, we will re-imagine a program of faith formation and youth ministry, and a myriad of other projects and ministries. All of these efforts are, must be, and will continue to be, led by the Holy Spirit.

Please keep your heart and mind open to those epiphanies which will guide the way and show us the true face of God in all that we do.

I have come to know for certain during my ministry that as your Priest I will be not so much be leading these efforts as following the prompting of the Holy Spirit in each and everyone of you. As we move into an uncertain future and out of a terrible pandemic into a "new normal," I pray that we all will recognize and abide by God's call to "build back better" God's Kingdom here in this corner of God's vineyard on this earth.

Always remember and give Glory to God whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine.

From Your Vestry



Backs against the wall! It's gut-check time! Go big or go home! Do or die! There is no "I" in team!

Sports clichés can be so obnoxious. I tried hard to avoid the manipulation of these words in my years as a high school soccer coach,

refusing to insult my players' intelligence with these trite phrases. For there to be mutual respect, being honest and straightforward was always the right approach.

One phrase bothered me more than any other: "Give one hundred and ten percent!" If we all just gave it our very best, try not to do too much, and share responsibility, we would always succeed. That is true *teamwork*. But in my new role as the Senior Warden of the Vestry at St. Paul's, giving one hundred and ten percent has a new meaning. Let me explain why that is.

We, as a parish, are just coming off an insightful Annual Budget Forum and an optimistic Annual General Meeting. Mike French of the Budget Committee provided us with detailed charts and graphs, showing us in the simplest terms where we stand financially heading into fiscal year 2022. Estimated expenses are \$489,227. If you subtract estimated income (mostly pledges) of \$448,747, we wind up with a deficit of \$44,874. Thanks to continued giving and disciplined spending in 2021, albeit a pandemic year, we enjoyed a surplus. We should all celebrate and be encouraged by this. But the anticipated deficit for this year is like we have seen in the last ten years, where the average is \$40,550.

This trend needs to change. Benefactors who can carry the financial load, income from the sale of the "House Next Door" or relying on bequests may be a thing of the past. But a few years ago, we got a major boost from a one time, thirteenth month of giving, proving what we are capable of when we identify and communicate a need and act together to seek a resolution.

The moral of the story is this: The income side of our budget is once again approximately \$40,000 shy of our expense side, causing us to draw more than expected from the Pooled Investment Fund. We are regularly only ten percent shy of a balanced budget or even a surplus.

Imagine our outlook then if it were possible to pledge not the standard one hundred percent, but one hundred and ten percent.

The vestry understands that our annual budget is much more than numbers. It reflects our values as a church. We value our historic place of worship in this community. We pride ourselves in community outreach, respecting the dignity of those in need. We believe in compensating our dedicated employees with a fair wage. This year we will invest in our growth potential by welcoming a talented new Music Director to enhance our music ministry and worship experience, and a Christian Formation Director because we value Christian education for young and old. And we prepare to welcome a new rector to spiritually lead us to do God's will and welcome all. These values were made clear in the Faith-In-Our-Future sessions and excitement builds as we now visualize all this coming together.

Giving to St. Paul's is a very personal and prayerful process. My purpose today is not to say all must give more, but to help us to see the opportunity before us in a different light. In this year of transition, we not only can get back to normal, but reimagine our future and thrive. By all of us understanding how close we are to live out our values with a balanced budget, collectively, may we endeavor to achieve it.

The work ahead is going to take an ongoing team effort where I was tempted to use a lot of motivating cliches. Please allow me this one: Let's give it one hundred and ten percent!



deserved special training she was placed with competent teachers, and after some good foundation work here went to New York where she enjoyed two years under the well-known teacher and accompanist, Luckstone of that city.

Two succeeding years were spent in Duluth, where as a member of the choir of St. Paul's Episcopal church and as a frequent soloist both on public occasions and in private homes Miss Sjoselius continued to win the admiration of her sudiences.

Since it seemed then that the time had arrived for study abroad, the seasons of 1910-11 were spent in Berlin under the guidance of Madame Schoen-Rene, the well known teacher of voice.

The first year was mainly devoted to ballad singing—the folk songs of Sweden being peculiarly adopted to Miss Sjoselius' style. But more protentious work had already been conmenced when the illness occurst which interrupted all plans. Which Berlin Miss becelius was frequently asked to take part in marked that and everywhere her beautiful rich and pleasing manner won instant recognition from that most critical a all audiences—the public of Belia

A Sjoselius also held the postion of soloist in the American chird in Berlin, to the great satisfaction of the congregation.

On her return to Europe, Ma Sjoselius will resume the study of grand opera and dramatic art, it ready begun, and her many friend here will look forward to hearing a her success in the field of her cloical Miss Sjoselius has a high soprate of peculiarly clear and pure timbre, sympathetic tone quality, that make its appeal to the heart of the lister, and a simple, unaffected personality.

The Deacon's Stoop



"Arise, shine, for your light as come, and the glory of the Lord has dawned upon you."

I appreciate the way our liturgical calendar fits with our seasonal calendar in this northern clime. The coming of the Light of Christ aligns with longer hours of sunlight, the season of Lent moves

us through the depth of winter into a Holy Week that might be warm or cold, but always includes signs of spring. Winter invites me to mimic the patterns of nature with a period of rest, of watching and waiting. This is the season of nursery catalogues, of planning gardens, of starting seeds. We reflect on what is past, and dream of what is to come.

In our liturgical calendar, we also are entering a season of attentiveness. We reflect on who we are, how we've been living; about how we have loved, and how we might love more deeply. We nurture the seeds of faith with prayer, study, sharing the Lord's table together, and by following Jesus into the world to share God's love for all. Many of us deepen our devotionals and open our eyes and hearts to see more clearly as we journey into Lent.

I'm new to St. Paul's, and in the last year I have heard many stories about how this community of faith has brought healing to the world with love. I learned about the Gabriel Project, where you've joined with several other congregations to more fully meet the needs of those calling out for help by seeking to know them and connect them to community resources. I learned about Damiano Center, where you have prepared food and shared table twice a week as you fed the hungry. You contribute food to CHUM Food Shelf, to Loaves and Fishes, to the families at Steve O'Neil Apartments, at CHUM Drop-in Center and Shelter, and now to St. Francis Apartments. You turned an empty apartment into a home for a family at Steve O'Neil Apartments and have responded generously to appeals for the specific needs of families we encounter.

You have volunteered at the Warming Center, at Loaves and Fishes, at Damiano, at CHUM, and have guided these organizations by volunteering your time as a delegate, a board member, or in countless other capacities. I understand the tall cabinets in my office were originally filled with diapers for parents in need, and it was a frequent stop for someone looking for assistance in obtaining their

ID.

Are there more stories coming to mind? What else have you been up to as you follow Jesus into the world? Please share them with me! I want to learn about what you've done, where you've been, what you've learned.

As Covid begins to wind down, Outreach opportunities are opening up. What stirs your heart? Is the Holy Spirit bringing some thought to you repeatedly, or urging you to get involved in an Outreach Ministry? In this Messenger (page 5) is an invitation to a gathering of those who have served, or are still serving; those who carry wisdom, and those who are sensing a desire to get more involved in reaching out to our neighbors in need. Please join us to discover what will be birthed in this changing season.

Housewarming for Todd

I'd like to share a story with you. I met Todd here at St. Paul's during our book study this past summer. Several of you met him at worship, or when he helped with packing lunches for Steve O'Neil Apartments. I was touched by the empathy I saw in him, a homeless man who shared his time putting lunches together for kids in need. Todd was working part-time, had savings, and was staying at Loaves and Fishes as he searched for housing. We've been meeting for coffee about once a month to check in, and he's had a rough winter. Now he is near the top of the HRA list and anticipates getting a 1-bedroom apartment in March or April. Please join me in setting up Todd's place. Watch for a sign-up board at church with a list of what he needs, and add your name and phone number next to items you can provide (so we don't duplicate items), and I'll let you know when he's ready for delivery. When he gets the key, he'll move in only with what he's had in the shelter with him. No furniture, no housewares, nothing to prepare meals, not a glass to drink from, not a pillow or blanket. I am looking for gently used items in good repair, and I'm confident that among us we probably have enough in the back of our cupboards and closets to give him a warm welcome back and the comforts of a home.


Faith Formation: Ash Wednesday
