

A Joyous Rebirth at St. Paul's


St. Paul's is joyously experiencing what I believe can best be described as a "rebirth." A new Rector, The Rev. Maggie Nancarrow, has been called; The Rev. Deacon Thomas Hamilton has accepted a call to be our Music Director; Sunday youth formation classes have begun again; Wednesday Holy Communion services have restarted and plans for adult forum speakers and programs are being developed; rejuvenated confirmation classes are beginning again; a robust stewardship pledge campaign is being organized; plans for re-building St. Paul's staff are also being developed and implemented; and next year's budget process is well underway. The Spirit is truly at work among the faithful here at St. Paul's!

With the blessing of the Vestry, we are preparing to bring back many of the liturgical practices on Sunday that we have truly missed during this pandemic. We will shortly begin offering the "blood of Christ," the wine, from a common cup. We will begin administering Communion from the High Altar rail and begin having ushers pass the offering plate as well. You will hear more specifics as we develop a plan to begin implementing these returns to prior liturgical practices.

With all of this activity, the one thing we must never forget is that all of this wonderful work and the effort that goes into making St. Paul's a vibrant joyous community needs always to be grounded in and led by The Spirit of God.

How do we ensure as best we can that we are grounded in and following the prompting of The Holy Spirit? Through the spiritual practice of prayer and discernment, truly listening to the Word of God.

One practice that Bishop Loya has encouraged all committees of the diocese and all congregations to engage in he has labeled as "Dwelling in the Word," asking his staff and all congregations to engage in the practice of reflecting on The Word of God together to begin every meeting



within the Church. This practice goes beyond opening a meeting with a prayer and asking for God's blessing on our work. It is a way of truly listening to The Word and trying to discern together what God may be saying to us as we engage in the work of God's Church.

One passage of Scripture that is being used for this practice throughout the diocese is Acts 16:6-15. In this passage, St. Paul and his companions travel throughout the eastern Mediterranean running "up against" the Spirit on occasion who would not allow them to proceed as they had intended to. I ask that you read this passage together at any meeting or gathering and reflect together on several questions: What catches your attention in the passage? What questions does the passage create for you? What do you think God might be saying to you as a group through this passage. Copies of this passage and the questions can be found on the credenza in the hall outside of Rita's office.

Let us all faithfully work and pray together as we listen for and follow the will of our Lord and Savior.

Help Wanted


St. Paul's is currently looking to hire a **Church Sexton**.


Special thanks go to Terry Roberts for providing the pizza lunch for our youth at the Acolyte meeting in September. It was excellent.

Lost Treasures from the Archives

October 18 is the Feast of St. Luke. In light of this, here are some historic articles about St. Luke's Hospital, which was founded by St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

St. Luke's Hospital, 1881

Rev. J.A. Cummings, past rector of St. Paul's, was invited to reflect upon the early days of the first St. Luke's Hospital. Here is a portion of his reminiscences from an article published in the Duluth News Tribune, February 3, 1918.

One Nurse.

"Mrs. Gouin was the only nurse, so I remained at the institution three nights each week until the epidemic was over. II. F. Thompson was the second patient of St. Luke's hospital, the first being a charity charge. I remember at one function an individual paid \$25 for a dish of oysters in order to aid the cause, and with such liberal contributions the hospital has been able to meet all its financial obligations since its first inception.

"The old building was occupied for three years and then a building was erected at Second avenue East and Fourth street which served until October, 1902, when the present St. Luke's hospital was dedicated through the efforts of Dr. A. W. Ryan, the

present rector."

Rev. Mr. Cummings saw remarkable changes not only in hospitals but also in sermons. While here he looked over the old files of some of the sermons he preached in the little church around the corner, and remarked: "Sermons nowadays have to have a little jazz and some added syncopation; those old ones would hardly do now."

DONATION DAY AT ST.LUKES HOSPITAL

Generous Gifts of Money, Clothing, Provisions and Medicines Are Received From Friends.

Several hundred dollars and enough clothing, medicines and provisions to fill a large room were received at St. Luke's hospital Saturday and Sunday, a miscellaneous assortment of articles donated by friends of the institution. Once each year donations are made to assist the hospital in its good work and in view of the fact that the annual donation day fell on Sunday this year Saturday and Monday were selected as the days on which gifts would be received.

Packages began arriving at the hospital early Saturday morning. Some were brought by messenger, but more often they came in delivery wagons. The assortment of clothing included men's suits, overcoats, under garments and all sorts of wearing apparel for women, and the greater portion appeared to be practically new.

There was an abundance of provisions donated by individuals and grocery establishments and a quantity of fruit from the wholesale district of Michigan street that appeared as fresh as though it had been taken out of a car that day.

There were generous donations of wines and liquors, enough, it is believed, to supply the needs of the hospital for a year. These are used in typhoid and pneumonia cases and with the large number of patients who come from outside towns a generous quantity is required.

This has probably been the best year for donations in the history of St. Luke's hospital.

The pledge collection amount for August is \$2800 ahead of budget, and the Year-to-Date pledges are ahead of budget by \$17,838.

Expenses are \$11,523 under budget for the month and \$77,718 under budget Year-to-Date. Please note that monthly August expenses exceed the monthly income. We had planned to have a \$30 thousand dollar deficit at this point in the year instead of the surplus we actually have.

September musings....

Healing:

noun — the process of making or becoming sound or healthy again, "the gift of healing" adjective — tending to heal; therapeutic, "a healing experience"

Often when we think of healing, we think of someone in need of professional treatment due to injury or disease. "Healers" are trained in various fields of medicine, offering physical and psychological treatment for a wide range of conditions.

There are healers of another kind. Scripture records a time when Jesus sent out seventy of his followers in pairs, telling them, "Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you." (Luke 10:8-9) Being surrounded by people who love us, and whom we love, puts us at ease. This is a form of healing we all can practice. The word disease comes from old French, then to Middle English, and means "lack of ease." We have all experienced various extents of trauma in the pandemic; some from physical sickness, others from loss of work, or the inability to go to school, or isolation from family and friends. A lot of strong feelings have circulated around masking, gatherings, vaccinations, shut-downs, and the role of government managing the pandemic. How do we return to a place of ease?

In our study of <u>The Body Keeps the Score</u>, we've encountered four fundamental truths:

- Our capacity to destroy one another is matched by our capacity to heal one another. Restoring relations and community is central to restoring well-being;
- Language gives us the power to change ourselves and others by communicating our experiences, helping us to define what we know, and finding a common sense of meaning;
- 3. We have the ability to regulate our own physiology,

including some of the so-called involuntary functions of the body and brain, through such basic activities as breathing, moving, and touching; and

4. We can change social conditions to create environments in which children and adults can feel safe and where they can thrive.



In August a small group of folks from St. Paul's offered a gift of healing to our neighbors during the Jefferson Street Block Party. Loaves and Fishes sponsored this event, while grieving the loss of Donna Howard. The healing gift of presence came through neighbors helping neighbors set tables and chairs, grill brats, playing Connect Four, and serving root beer floats (see photos by Nancy Diener on next pages). The healing gift of listening came through hosting the welcome table and sharing hospitality. The healing gift of creating a safe environment came through the invitation to share stories and create a prayer flag to capture the longings and hopes and dreams of our neighbors. We learned that it's hard to be black in Duluth, that trans lives matter too, that bugs are cool, and diversity is a treasure. You can see the flags posted in the Parish Hall – take the time to read them and to pray for our neighbors. Walk the streets around St. Paul's and meet the folks who live here, because you bring the kingdom of God near to them with your love.

Gabriel Project

St. Paul's has supported the Gabriel Project for many years, and we are taking a more active role for the next four months. Peace Church has managed the donations and offered the gifts of this multicongregational discretionary fund for many years. It is designed primarily for those persons who are surviving, but not thriving, where an unexpected expense could be enough to push them into crisis. Peace Church has been on a journey similar to ours, in transition with clergy and staff. With an ongoing call and the loss of two administrative staff in September, they asked for

some respite from the day-to-day operations of the fund.

On Mondays from 11:30 am to 1:00 pm and Thursdays from 10:00 - 11:30 am, St. Paul's will open our doors to offer folks a helping hand. Most of this takes the form of gift cards for food or fuel, while some requests are a bit more complicated. I will hold office hours for this purpose, but invite you to join me! Contact me if you would like to sign up for a single time or a repeat experience.
