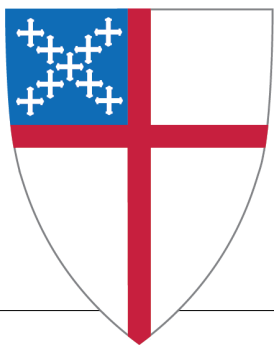

From Your New Rector, The Rev. Margaret Nancarrow

Dear People of St. Paul's,

As I prepare to join you, I have been reflecting on the incredible energy, love, and commitment that is present in this faith community. It is visible even from afar, infectious even though I am not yet with you.

During my time discerning with St. Paul's, I learned immediately how resilient and vibrant this place is. You are eager to celebrate your faith, care for your children, serve the community, and name God at work in the city of Duluth. I was moved over the course of my interview process by how many of you invited me into your homes, prepared home-cooked meals, and told vulnerable stories. I am inspired by your past and present generosity toward your neighborhood, from your historical work to found St. Luke's Hospital to your current partnerships with places like CHUM and the Damiano Center.

I feel as though I have only scratched the surface, but I already know that this is a community deeply committed to one another and to the Way of Love.

During the month of November, you may notice the excellent work that the Rev. Rick Swenson is doing to guide the parish in a robust stewardship campaign for 2023. Looking ahead, we are preparing for an exciting year of ministry with one another. For me, faith communities matter because we witness to God's love, hope, and good news when the world around us is full of bad news. Whether we struggle with climate change, pandemic, divisive political discourse or the more personal pains of illness, heartbreak, disconnection, or financial struggles, our church has the power to be a place where we receive and practice hope for young and old alike.

As the stewardship team develops our budgetary goals, we are attempting to work with numbers that reflect our pre-pandemic budget. Because annual pledges represent the major source of funding for St. Paul's, the annual pledge campaign which will take place over the next several months is particularly significant this year.



It is important to me to speak about stewardship as both faithful stewarding of our resources *and* as the spiritual practice of generosity. This is about more than just giving to the church's budget because it pays the bills. Generosity transforms us from the inside out, so that we are empowered to stand in the world differently. Practicing generosity helps us give more time to those we love; more resources to the non-profits making a difference; more compassion to those we disagree with; more patience with those who don't meet our expectations. Little by little, this changes the world we live in. Therefore, in joyful anticipation for the next year of our ministry together, I invite you discern what you are able to pledge for 2023.

We have an exciting road ahead, an opportunity to emerge from a time of pandemic and disconnection with joy in the future God is making ready for St. Paul's. I look forward to joining you on that road very soon. My first Sunday with you will be Christ the King Sunday on November 20. Until then, may you go into the autumn with grace, faith, and joy.

From Your New Director of Christian Formation

Dear St Paul's Parishioners,

I am delighted to share that I have officially become the new Director of Christian Formation. Although many of us have already met, I thought you might be interested to know a bit of my backstory... after all, I have been asking you to share your stories for Rev. Maggie's welcome book for weeks, so it only seems fair.

I grew up across the border in the little town of Poplar, Wisconsin, the daughter of an ELCA Lutheran minister. I was fortunate to be part of a thriving youth group, who were much more like family than friends. After high school, I went on to Hamline University in St. Paul where I majored in psychology and sociology. The next transition was a big one, away from small town and small campus life, to Los Angeles where I received my masters and doctoral degrees in clinical psychology. In 15 years, I lived in 10 different places! (If you've ever been to Southern California you may appreciate that moving is necessary to avoid being stuck in traffic for three hours a day.) In my 30s I found the Episcopal Church and became a member of All Saints in Pasadena, one of the largest and most progressive parishes in the country. I was hooked.

After making the decision to move to Northern Illinois to be closer to my mother, out of the blue (thanks, God!) I received a call from her priest with an offer to become their Christian Formation Director for children, youth and families. I preached the morning after arriving in Rockford, and spent the next 11 years loving this job (which never felt like a job) more than any other - which is saying a lot because I have worked in about any clinical setting that you could imagine. From Sunday school to confirmation, VBS, "Pajama Prayers" overnights for children, youth group outings, parish and diocesan middle and

high school lock-ins and retreats, membership on diocesan and national steering committees, and even a teen pilgrimage to England, it was an amazing whirlwind. And oh, how I loved it. The time spent with children and youth has been instrumental in my ongoing faith formation, and in deepening my relationship with God. What a tremendous gift.

Along that path, my 12-year-old son, Elijah, and I became a family. The outpouring of support from our church and diocesan friends was absolutely overwhelming. When I decided that we were going to move to Duluth about a year and a half ago, leaving our church family was the piece that was difficult. So imagine what a happy surprise it was to learn that the only available apartment we could find, after a two month search, is less than a block from St. Paul's! I was familiar with St. Paul's because, years ago, my youth group had stayed here while doing volunteer work in the community. Additionally, and even better, my younger brother, Matt Gustafson, and his family have been members here for years.

I am very grateful to have been welcomed so warmly by the St. Paul's community. Everyone, in particular those involved in Christian Formation, has been incredibly helpful in a myriad of ways. I can't overstate how blessed I feel to be taking on this new role, being able to serve God doing something I love, while surrounded by kind and committed people. I look forward to getting to know you all, especially the children, tweens and teens, as we work together to grow and revitalize St. Paul's Christian Formation programs!

From Your Vestry



As the new Junior Warden, Erik has asked me to write the vestry column this month. Former Junior Warden, Kathy Leonard, has left Duluth to care for her father, and she sends greetings to the vestry and parish. We wish Kathy, and her father, God's blessings from St. Paul's.

As a church family, we have gone through quite a lot in the last almost three years. It feels like we have been on a long journey, a rather epic trek to find our way back to our church and to each other. On the way, we have had some dramatic ups and downs, and I marvel at the strength and perseverance that so many have displayed during this challenging time. And we made it through! We are welcoming Rev. Maggie Nancarrow as our new priest, Dr. Tom Hamilton as our returning music director, and we are currently in the process of hiring a Christian Formation director and a Sexton. This is an exciting time for St. Paul's!

One part of opening up and getting back to "normal" is bringing back some of the rites and routines found in our Sunday services. On November 13, we are planning to begin offering wine at Eucharist, passing the offertory plates, and bringing the elements to the altar from the congregation. In order to be ready for this transition, Rev. Rick will be conducting a practice

and 'walk through' for all who are involved in Sunday services, including acolytes, chalice bearers, ushers, lectors, altar guild and others. This practice will happen after church on November 6, so watch for more information on this.

A word about wine. As we return to using the common cup, please understand that partaking in the wine is not a requirement to receive the sacrament. As we have been doing for two years now, the bread alone is sufficient. If you would like to pass on partaking in the common cup, simply cross your arms over your chest or tell the chalice bearer.

Finally, I want to mention that the Vestry is also working on reviewing and revising our Articles of Incorporation as well as our Bylaws. Rev. Rick has been doing the lion's share of the work on this, and we are thankful for his expertise in this area. The reason for reworking these documents is that they need to comply with both the Diocese of Minnesota and the National Church canons.

Our journey together continues as we begin this new chapter in the life of St. Paul's. I am excited to be on this journey with all of you. God's blessings to you.

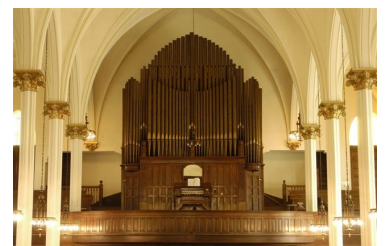

St. Paul's Faith Formation

It is a pleasure to share that Christian Formation programs for children and youth are all up and running again, after a long break due to the pandemic. Additionally, other traditional intergenerational events are on the calendar. In October, all were invited to carve pumpkins and nosh on pumpkin treats. On November 27, join us during coffee hour to green and decorate an Advent wreath to enjoy in your home. All necessary supplies will be provided; however, if you have a metal base at home from years past, please do bring it along for reuse.



Our children have continued to learn songs every Sunday to begin class — Mr. Brad emphasizes to use “outside voices!” — followed by a lesson from the Bible, discussion and a related activity. As an example, last Sunday focused on the parable of the mustard seed. Afterwards, the children planted their own mustard seeds so that they can watch them grow from something as tiny as the head of a pin into a large plant, to remind them of how this relates to faith, the church, and how we can spread God’s love through our actions. Of note, the Christian Formation Team wants to make sure that everyone knows that Sunday morning class is not just for the little ones (love them as we do). We really hope

to grow the number of fourth and fifth graders in attendance, and assure parents that there will be age-appropriate instruction and activities for all. The more, the merrier!

On Wednesday nights, Middle School students are learning about various world religions, and have even been able to

taste related traditional foods. High School confirmands continue to explore their faith and learn about Episcopal traditions and components of the liturgy. This month, all will be matched with adult mentors who they will meet with separately through the remainder of the Confirmation journey. An advance “thank you” to those adults who answer this meaningful call to serve others.

Discussions are in the works for 2023, including summertime volunteerism and the possibility of inviting other Northern MN Episcopal church youth to join us. Should you have service project ideas, especially for Hands Across Duluth, please do share. Information regarding diocesan events will be provided as soon as it becomes available.

SOUSA WILL HONOR DULUTH BY PLAYING CUSTANCE MELODY

Sousa will play Mr. Custance's composition "Taps" at both afternoon and evening concerts at the Armory Saturday Nov. 6. Mr. Sousa informed Mrs. Stephen Jones that he would be glad to play "Taps" at both concerts as he considered the composition a perfect piece of work.

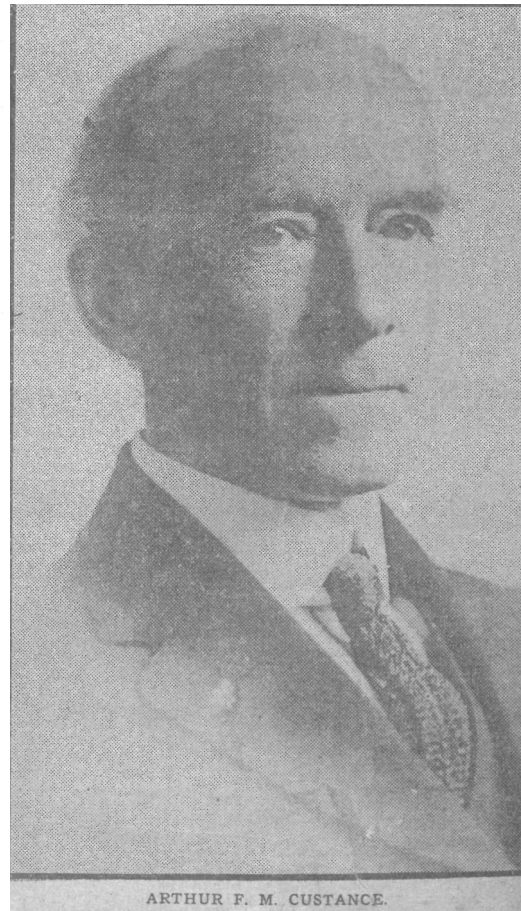
He has orchestrated the composition and Miss Baker his coloratura soprano will sing the solo.

The Normana Male chorus, Jens Flaaten director will celebrate its twenty-ninth anniversary by attending the evening concert in a body. The Marshall-Wells chorus, Myrtle Hobbs, directing, wearing the Marshall-Wells colors, will make its first appearance as a full fledged singing society and will lend their voices when the audience sings the "Star Spangled Banner" and "America." The Normal School Glee club, Miss Danielson director, Duluth Choral club, members of the Ionic Male chorus, The Imperial Shrine Girls, of America, St. Paul's church choir (these latter directed by A. F. M. Custance.) The Normal School Glee club of Superior, Miss Custiss director will be there to join in the singing.

The American Legion band, Glen

Locker director will greet Lieut. Commander John Phillip Sousa U. S. N. R. F. and play him out to the Armory. They will carry great banners bearing the inscription, "The Americans have come; Welcome to Sousa, 66 years young."

This is the third attraction in Mrs. Jones' International Celebrity Series—and from the large advance sale of tickets and the enthusiastic interest shown, not only by Duluth, but by the surrounding towns, the great march king will have a capacity audience. 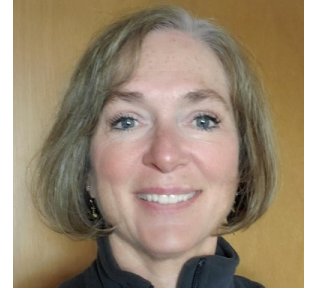
Photo of plaque mounted behind the organ console at St. Paul's

From Your Bookkeeper

Dear Parishioners,

September 2022 financials were presented to the Vestry at the October 18, 2022 meeting. Here is a summary of the September **General Fund** Statement of Activities.

The pledge collection amount for September is \$13,674 under budget; and the Year-to-Date pledges are ahead of budget by \$4163.

Expenses are \$14,415 under budget for the month and \$92,133 under budget Year-to-Date.

Our bottom line, income over expenses for the year through the end of September is a surplus of \$62,409.

Lend a helping hand...

Peace Church has asked us for a few months of staff support of the Gabriel Project. Thank you to those who have stepped up to answer phones, greet folks with a warm smile and a cup of coffee, and offer support to our neighbors seeking assistance. In just

over two weeks we have encountered 37 persons, and received many more calls. We have distributed \$1027 in assistance, most of it in food and gas cards. As I write this, Christine is preparing to purchase ten each of our St. Paul's monthly outreach of \$20 gas and food gift cards.

We have also connected families with young children to the Fearless Moms group at Eastridge, where they can access clothing that has been gently worn from among their 400 families. We have guided people through the housing market, and assisted in finding the right applications to meet their unique needs. We have listened to their stories, offered them support, cared for them, and handed out Gloria's apples!

Second Saturdays for Resident Support (CHUM and Stepping On Up)



On the 2nd Saturday of each month, I am coordinating volunteers to provide support for our neighbors who are really struggling to make ends meet. Different congregations will host each

event, and the activity will vary based on emerging needs. Volunteers come from among our supporters, including many congregations. We are working and imagining together as we become a more just and compassionate community!

- **November 12** making three different kinds of soup at First Lutheran Church for people experiencing food insecurity.
- **December 10** making Christmas cookies

(location TBD) for the St. Louis County Jail, Arrowhead Juvenile Center, St. Francis Apartments, the Warming Center, and CHUM Shelter and Drop In Center.

- **January 14** orientation and invitation to participate in advocacy for housing solutions at Pilgrim Congregational Church.

CHUM Donation Requests

It's that time of year when cold weather and darkness really impact persons living unsheltered, in places unfit



for human habitation. It's hard on people living in a shelter, but not a home, who have to find a way to keep warm all day. We have already seen more folks in the shelter, folks asking when the Warming Center will open (November 1), and requesting gas cards to keep vehicles warm overnight. Here are some specific needs:

- Socks (regular, not boot socks)
- Washable, warm blankets
- Quilts for guests in Family Shelter and residents of Steve O'Neil Apartments (check with me for sizes)
- Sleeping bags rated for winter camping
- Twin bed fitted sheets for the shelter
- Hand warmers and foot warmers

This is all we have been doing, and it is good to wish our neighbors be warm and be fed. This month we remember the saints who have gone before us, those who have formed us, those near and dear to us who have shaped us to become who we are. We too are birthed to become saints, growing and stretching, tested by life. The following prayer is from The Pattern of Our Days, from the Iona Community. It is a prayer for pilgrimage and journeys, like the one we walk as we follow Jesus into the world. Like birthing, it is not without pain and struggle, but rewards us with new life.

Strong, sheltering God,
 We bless you for all the beautiful things of home;
 Warmth and shelter when the wind outside is bitter
 Food for the body and for the soul
 Treasured gifts and treasured memories
 Stability, acceptance, care.
 We bless you for the change to be ourselves
 For the tasks that weave the pattern of our days
 For the sweet, familiar round of ordinary things.
 Blessed are you, strong, sheltering God.

Disturb our complacency
 Shake our circles of contentment
 Sweep through our hearts
 And our houses
 With the new broom of your Spirit
 Until LOVE is our only refuge. Amen

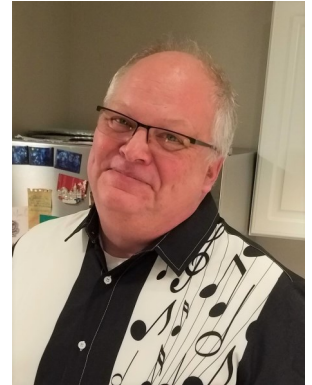
Notes of a Different Kind . . .

Musings From The Musician

Greetings, friends!

Most of you know me; however, many have come into our fellowship recently, so I thought this month I would use this space to reintroduce myself.

I grew up and received my earliest musical training in Hibbing. My father was a teacher in the Hibbing schools and also worked as the house manager for the beautiful auditorium in the high school, so I was granted special permission to practice the organ after hours. The organ has always fascinated me with its ability to make so many different sounds, to roar sometimes and whisper at others. More than anything, the church in which I grew up was a singing congregation. The organist there was not well-trained, but she was very good at leading hymns, and that awakened a passion in me for people singing together. It is a joy to serve at St. Paul's and lead you in song and to give voice to that which is otherwise inexpressible.



I served at St. Paul's from 2013 until the end of 2020 when I moved to Berlin, Germany, to be with my partner Alex. The Covid restrictions were very high in Germany at the time, and I found my mental health to be suffering because of it, so I returned to the United States in March of 2021 to serve as Director of Music at Grace Lutheran in LaGrange, Illinois. I was not able to adjust well to life in the Chicago area, so I moved back to the Twin Ports in March of this year and have been working in the registration area at St. Luke's Hospital until returning to St. Paul's. When I left here in November of 2020, I wrote in this same space that I believed St. Paul's has a bright future ahead. I continue to believe in that bright future that God has in store for us, and I am deeply thankful for your gracious welcome to me returning to this amazing place. I have met our new rector, Rev. Maggie Nancarrow. We established immediate rapport and are very excited to lead St. Paul's with energy and humility.

I have three adult children: Serrie, who is married to Brian, and lives in Boston; Ian, who just married Emma last week, lives here in Duluth; and Meredith, who lives with her partner, Luis, in upstate New York. I have a family cabin in Itasca County that my parents built when I was two years old; it is my solace and refuge. While I have many hobbies like cooking and movies, what I love most is to make music and energize large groups of people in song. Together we will sing our praise, prayer, and lament to the increase of the reign of God, the source of all such gifts.
