## Looking Forward to Rally Day!

When St. Paul's published your parish profile in March of 2022, the first story in the profile was about Rally Day in 2021. It was a hard-won celebration, that felt different from all other kick-off celebrations in the past: controlled by covid restrictions, full of joy, but also full of anxiety about what would happen next for this community that was so dearly loved. Despite all that, though, a few things were clear to me. This community sees the spiritual path as one of joy and celebration, and that St. Paul's is resilient in pursuing a hopeful future on the path to which God has called us.

Now, we are preparing for Rally Day 2023 on September 10. So much has taken place over the last two years to celebrate and rejoice in. We're welcoming new members and curious seekers every week. We celebrated a powerful confirmation, reception, and reaffirmation in August, and young people are learning about God's love for them in children's church again. COVID took so much from us. We've also said goodbye to beloved elders, mourned countless losses that will not return, but we have—together—learned what it looks like to walk the path of resurrection and rebirth after crisis.

We know now that we will not be able to return to what was in exactly the same way that we had it before, but we stand at the edge of a different bright future, with an inkling of the joy that lies ahead. Rally Day this year is an opportunity to celebrate this.

This year, we are simplifying things a little bit: having a joyful picnic with fun for the kids and good company among adults. We need all hands on deck to make this event happen, and you'll receive in your email ways to sign up to support the event. We will not be having the traditional "Ministry Fair," so we can allow ministry leaders to meet people organically.

Rally Day traditionally kicks off the academic year at St. Paul's, when Sunday School and Faith Formation Classes return. As I write this, we are still in process with our position for Children & Youth Formation, and so our plans may take a little longer to solidify than in years past. **However, we do have a fair amount of information to share with you now, so please check this out on page 3.**



Some of my colleagues in the wider church complain that churches need to have "Rally Day". They say that church takes place all summer—why would we celebrate that we were gone all summer? I don't think that's fair, though. Many of us go out into the world during our summer—into the wild, into a good book, into a time of rest and recuperation, and we learn from what God has to tell us out there. We celebrate our return home because we have learned so much from our adventures, and we get to gather once more in our faith community to share what God has had to show us. On March 15, 1982, the Community Kitchen was the Damiano Center's founding program. This is currently the largest on-site meal program in Northeastern Minnesota, serving sixteen meals each week.

No questions are asked of the people who come for a meal, and everyone is welcome to eat. In addition, we make available day-old bakery products and produce for people to take home.

For safety reasons, volunteers must be 16 years of age or older.

## About Laundry Love

One of my simple pleasures in life is putting on clean clothes. Imagine having to make a choice between a necessity and washing your clothes. Recently a service for low/no income people has been started in Duluth, it is called **Laundry Love**. The program pays for washing/drying of clothes, two loads per person. The washer is loaded by the client; the payment is put in the machine by the volunteers. Clients are then responsible for transferring the clothes into the dryer. Currently this service is offered every Tuesday at Spin City in

## Children's Church

Children's Church will resume with a Godly Play story in worship on September 10 and time to play games on the lawn in between the Psalm and the Baptism.

On September 17, we will have 'regular' children's church again with two classes:

pre-K to 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and

3<sup>rd</sup> – 6<sup>th</sup> grade.

Toddlers are welcome in the younger class with one of their grown-ups.

## Other Formation Opportunities

The Bishop has invited the entire Episcopal Church in Minnesota into a study of the Gospel of Luke, and Deacon Pat is looking into planning small group gatherings that read this gospel and reflect on it.

Nat Constance is also planning a fun "gap-year" class for our 8<sup>th</sup> & 9<sup>th</sup> grade students on Wednesday nights around the Gospel of Luke, where our kids can dig into this curious gospel to learn more about what Jesus actually did, said, and taught.

## Diocesan Youth Event

St. Paul's is hosting the annual Diocesan Youth Event, where all youth grades 9-12 in ECMN gather for a retreat! This will be an all-hands-on-deck opportunity for adult leaders to support this effort, from cleaning classrooms to chaperoning, and more. All high school youth are invited. This takes place over MEA weekend, October 20 – 22.

## Wednesday Night Programming

Wednesday night programming will return on Wednesday, September 13 with a new schedule. Wednesdays will have more opportunity for multigenerational formation where kids, teens, and adults can learn together. We will also bring back adult formation opportunities. In the month of September, we will try a new schedule for worship, eliminating the 5:30 Eucharist and adding in 7:30 Compline. This is a month-long experiment, so your feedback is appreciated.

6:00 pm – Home Cooked Supper

6:30 pm – Formation Classes or Multigenerational Program

7:30 pm – Compline on the Lawn (September)

**On the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of the Month, we will have informal, intergenerational bring-your-own board game nights where church members can just enjoy each other's company around a fun game.** Mark your calendars for Sept. 20, Oct 18, and Nov. 15. Multigenerational programs will be on October 4 for St. Francis Day, and November 1 for All Saint's Day. For All Saint's Day, we will have a "Recipes of the Saints" Potluck, a Godly Play story for all, and a discussion among the adults about the Saints of St. Paul's.

Typically, the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesdays of the month will have classes for different age groups, children to adults. First Wednesdays will be multigenerational formation gatherings, and 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesdays will be board game night.

Due to banking issues occurring nationwide, our bank is cracking down on their own processes. They have begun to carefully scrutinize how checks are written and rejecting checks not correctly issued.

July 2023 financials were presented to the Finance Committee at their August 2023 meeting. Here is a summary of the **July General Fund** results.

- The pledge collection amount for July was \$2054.00 *under* budget.  
*Please note that pledge collection is under budget not because people are not meeting their pledges, but because we did not meet our pledge goal during the fall stewardship campaign.*
- Total income is under budget \$26,690.00 through the end of July. Please keep in mind that our pledges did not meet our pledge goals.
- Expenses were \$2540.91 under budget for the month of July and under budget \$20,040.43 year -to date, which is good news.
- Our bottom line, income over expenses, for July is -\$13,321.04 and -\$50,566.26 year-to-date. This not a cause for concern at this point, since we budgeted to utilize the surplus from the prior 3 years as we rebuild our programs.

Please prayerfully consider additional giving to St. Paul's to support our mission and ministries and offset the deficit.

## The Deacon's Stoop

In May 2023 the Surgeon General issued a statement about a public health crisis of loneliness. You can find a brief summary on page 7, and the full pdf here: <https://www.hhs.gov/sites/default/files/surgeon-general-social-connection-advisory.pdf>

I have often said that I'm a Covid refugee, because for me the pandemic included job loss and a move. Until I read the Surgeon General's statement I hadn't fully reflected on how my move to Duluth was different from the many other times I've moved. This time the new habits I developed when arriving in this community included church, but during lockdown. I spent the better part of two years socially isolated except for limited-exposure gatherings of family, at church, and at work, all followed by a weekly Covid test. I built new habits around my Covid reality, and am just starting to get back to social gatherings.

Bishop Craig Loya has repeatedly reminded us that the foundation of the church is small groups of dedicated followers of Jesus. He has invited us as a diocese to join in a study of the Gospel of Luke this fall, and at St. Paul's we are gathering small group leaders for day and evening sessions with hybrid options. I invite you to consider becoming a small group leader or to host a group either at church or in your home, or to join a small group. Covid has taught us that we can create fellowship even when we don't share the same geography, and for folks who are isolating for health (or other) reasons, we will offer a hybrid option. All are invited! Staff from the bishop's team offer training for those who would like to facilitate the studies.

In the Book of Acts, Luke describes the characteristics of Christian life in the early church. The St. Paul's family has faithfully kept to these practices in so many different ways. I've heard members of the Search Committee describe how close they became on the journey to find Rev. Maggie, so much so that they could live together. I've heard members of the Altar Guild describe how much they enjoy each other and working together. I witnessed the choir's love as they joined in the laying on of hands with the bishop as Sarah was received as a member of St. Paul's. I've heard stories of small, multigenerational groups meeting in

homes for a potluck meal and fellowship. Have you heard of the ROMEOs (Retired Old Men Eating Out) who meet at Bridgeman's for breakfast and fellowship? Movie night, game night, makers night... lots of opportunities to gather with and for each other, and along the way become closer to Jesus on our life journey together.



As a congregation we've also experienced many changes. We miss some old familiar faces while we welcome many new ones. We celebrate gathering again around the altar for Eucharist, and also around the table at coffee hour. We join with each other in volunteer capacities at Vestry, Altar Guild, and a variety of committee meetings and service in the community. Last weekend we had a lot of fun serving up root beer floats at Loaves & Fishes' Jefferson Street Block Party, and visited with many of our neighbors. In September we will reconvene our Wednesday night meals, worship, meetings, choir practices and faith formation classes. During Lent we learned about several different spiritual practices, some of which were personal prayer practices. In the life of the church we also have spiritual practices we share in community. As Episcopalians we are often called "People of the Book", referring to the Book of Common Prayer. We are also a people who gather, who walk together, who come to the table together, at the altar and in the dining room. It's good for your mental health, your physical health, and your spiritual health. And it's just good fun!

# New Surgeon General Advisory Raises Alarm about the Devastating Impact of the Epidemic of Loneliness and Isolation in the United States

## **Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy Calls for Action to Address Public Health Crisis, Lays Out Framework for a National Strategy to Advance Social Connection**

*“Our epidemic of loneliness and isolation has been an underappreciated public health crisis that has harmed individual and societal health. Our relationships are a source of healing and well-being hiding in plain sight – one that can help us live healthier, more fulfilled, and more productive lives,”* said **U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy**. *“Given the significant health consequences of loneliness and isolation, we must prioritize building social connection the same way we have prioritized other critical public health issues such as tobacco, obesity, and substance use disorders. Together, we can build a country that’s healthier, more resilient, less lonely, and more connected.”*

The physical health consequences of poor or insufficient connection include a 29% increased risk of heart disease, a 32% increased risk of stroke, and a 50% increased risk of developing dementia for older adults. Additionally, lacking social connection increases risk of premature death by more than 60%.

In addition to our physical health, loneliness and isolation contribute substantially to mental health challenges. In adults, the risk of developing depression among people who report feeling lonely often is more than double that

of people who rarely or never feel lonely. Loneliness and social isolation in childhood increase the risk of depression and anxiety both immediately and well into the future. And with more than one in five adults and more than one in three young adults living with a mental illness in the U.S., addressing loneliness and isolation is critical in order to fully address the mental health crisis in America.

**While the epidemic of loneliness and isolation is widespread and has profound consequences for our individual and collective health and well-being, there is a medicine hiding in plain sight: social connection.**

Social connection is beneficial for individual health and also improves the resilience of our communities. Evidence shows that increased connection can help reduce the risk of serious health conditions such as heart disease, stroke, dementia, and depression. Communities where residents are more connected with one another fare better on several measures of population health, community safety, community resilience when natural disasters strike, prosperity, and civic engagement.

## Stewardship — A Fundamental Understanding

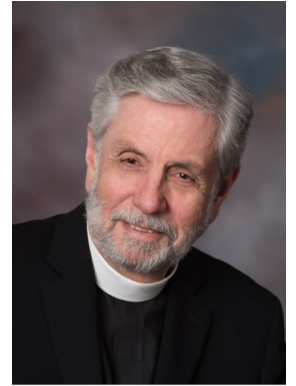
In the Church, we hear the word “stewardship” used in a number of contexts and with a number of specific and slightly different meanings. I think that it is important, as Rev. Maggie has said before, to understand stewardship in its full theological and spiritual meaning as a form of ministry—a calling to steward, to take care of, to properly use and not waste and destroy all of creation which has been entrusted by God our creator to our care.

For many of us, however, when we hear the term stewardship, we immediately think of the fall campaign that most all Episcopal Churches engage in each year to reach out to members to ask for contributions to meet upcoming yearly operating budget needs. This, however, is only a part of what Christian stewardship is all about, but it is an important part. As Henri Nouwen, renowned Christian spiritual writer has said, “[Fundraising] is a way of announcing our vision and inviting other people into our mission. It is, ...proclaiming what we believe in such a way that we offer other people an opportunity to participate with us in our vision and mission.” (*Henri J. M. Nouwen, Spirituality of Fundraising, Upper Room Books, 2010.*)

The book I have just quoted from is a book that is being read and reflected upon by our fall giving campaign committee led by Kathy Leonard. You will be hearing more from Kathy and the committee as we enter the end of our calendar year, looking back to celebrate our joys and accomplishments this past year while looking ahead to the challenges of the upcoming year.

As we look to the future, while it is important to remember that stewardship is a spiritual practice: it is a practice that takes many forms, and fundraising and financial giving is only one of those practices. How we give to our church and our community can be manifested in a

variety of ways, both in treasure and talent. There are a variety of gifts that God has given to each and every one of us. We each have individual gifts of love and compassion and ministry in all of its forms that we can each give generously to the building up of the church and God’s kingdom. These are all practices of stewardship.

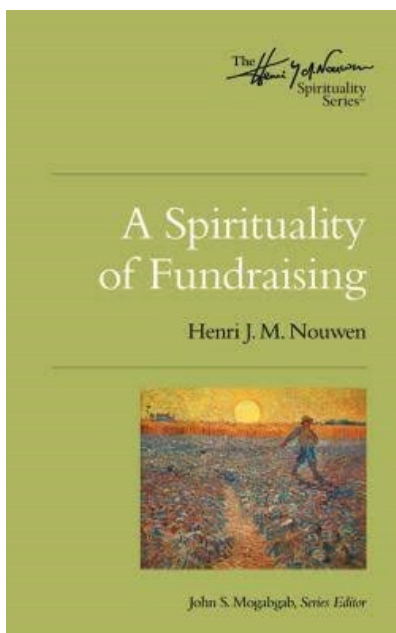


Recognizing that “stewardship” is a ministry that takes many forms, Rev. Maggie has asked me, along with others, to form an overarching Stewardship Committee to coordinate all of St. Paul’s various stewardship efforts -- efforts as diverse as renewing our capital campaign, efforts to improve and utilize our building and grounds, an educational program to encourage and foster planned giving, and searching for opportunities and applying for grants. All these efforts and more are vitally important and needed to continue to foster the ministries of every one of our disciples at St Paul’s.

This overarching committee being formed will not be engaged in the “hands-on” supervising or implementation of all these various programs and projects but will instead be coordinating with the separate committees, groups, and individuals whose efforts and ministry are involved. The vision for this overarching committee is to have representatives from each of these separate committees and groups along with other parish leaders to ensure that we are efficiently meeting the needs of St. Paul’s and maximizing, to the extent possible, all our efforts towards the goal of fostering a vital community of disciples.

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## What to Expect in our Annual Giving Campaign for 2024

This year, our goal for fundraising will be \$385,000. We hope to meet this goal by December 1, 2023. This is a similar ask to our 2023 goal, which allows us to meet the needs of our growing faith community.

### **Important Dates:**

- ♦ Sunday, October 8 - Annual Campaign Kick Off
- ♦ Sunday, October 15 – Celebration of St. Luke's Day and all Healthcare Workers
- ♦ Sunday, October 22 – Celebration of the Diocesan Youth Event and Formation Ministries
- ♦ Sunday, October 29 – Commitment Sunday and the Conclusion of the Campaign



Pledge cards will be due earlier than is typical this year, on October 29, allowing us to plan ahead and prepare transparently for 2024. Pledge cards will also, for the first time, include a place to pledge time and talent in addition to financial resources, so that all households regardless of income may feel confident in making a pledge in 2024.

In the early weeks of October, each household in the church will be contacted by a member of the vestry or stewardship team as a way to make a connection, share our exciting vision, and be invited to make a pledge. These will not be 'follow up' reminder calls, but invitational calls—certified guilt-free and excitement-oriented. We are really energized, proud, and inspired by what is happening at St. Paul's, and we are eager to make connections with everyone who worships here that we might go forward with our vision together.
