Learning from the Conversion of St. Paul

Each year on January 25, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. This feast of our namesake is an opportunity to reflect on times in our lives when we have experienced significant turns in our lives. We are named after the man who wrote many of the letters in our New Testament, from Corinthians to Thessalonians to Ephesians. But, before he was an advocate for the gospel, we know that Paul was a violent persecutor of Jesus followers. On his way to Damascus, he is interrupted by a vision of Jesus that strikes him blind and changes his understanding of God forever.

I had the opportunity this year to celebrate this feast with an online community with the Daily Office, because my friend and colleague the Rev. Tom Roy was being commissioned as the community's vicar. Our Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Craig Loya, offered a prayer at that gathering for the whole church, that it might be revived and renewed as Paul was.

Paul's life was marked by going beyond his previous understanding to be transformed by Christ. It was marked by moments of turning away from one way and towards another, the way that God was making known to him. For our congregation that bears his name, we have a lot to learn from him.

Lent this year begins on February 14. Lent is a time of reflection, rediscovery and repentance. In Mark's gospel, Jesus begins his ministry by saying: "Repent and believe in the good news." Repent in Greek is *metanoia*, literally meaning to *turn around*. Repentance is an act of turning away from something in order to turn toward the good news that God is weaving among us. This season of prayer grounds

us in the story of God's ultimate turning of the world: God chose to become un-God in order to live as a human, only to die in an inhumane way, but to turn the powers of death upside down. This mystery is beyond simple explanation, and so we relive it each year to let it do its work on us, as it did its work on Paul over the course of his life.

There are many ways that you are being invited to participate in this holy work during the season of Lent, but I want to draw your attention to one event in particular. On Wednesday, February 28 at 6:30 pm, Olivia Morin-Swanson, one of our St. Paul's high schoolers, will present "It's All About Perspective" her research project on different Anglican leaders' approaches to the full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ persons and families. Olivia studied theologies of inclusion by interviewing leaders she encountered both in England and in her own faith community here. Our conversation will invite us to reflect on how God once invited us to turn toward more loving ways of being a faith community. I hope it also inspires us to consider how turning and changing our minds can plant new seeds of hope in our community—aptly named after the Saint who had the most abrupt change of all.

With Love from Sophie

"They will know we are Christians by our love." This has been one of my favorite songs since I first heard it as a child. The message is so simple, but powerful. Will they know we are Christians because we tell them? Will they know we are Christians because we judge those who aren't? Will they know we are Christians because we have a T-shirt that says so? Will they know we are Christians by what we *don't* do? NO! They will know we are Christians by our love. That's all. As Episcopalians, we are called to the Way of Love. Love of self, loving others, loving God and God's creation.

For me, February is all about love. I begin thinking about it on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day (also my parent's anniversary—this year they celebrated 47 years!) I think about what a lifetime of work driven by love can do. Martin Luther King, Jr. knew it wouldn't be easy. I have a feeling he knew it would be dangerous. I also have a feeling that he died with no regrets. February is Black History month, which is an opportunity to learn about and honor Black people in America. A reminder to love and value the stories, accomplishments, and strength of African Americans. For me, Black History month is all about love.

Then, we move on to Valentine's Day, a day when many of us give notes of encouragement, acceptance, invitation, desire, and friendship to the people in our vicinity. It's a day of glow ups, sweets, and letting those around us we are thinking of them. The holiday has roots in a few different places, but most commonly, I think of St. Valentine, who lived in 3rd-century Rome. He was eventually imprisoned and martyred because he had been illegally performing marriages for Roman soldiers, which was forbidden at the time. He believed in the power of committed love and marriage with God's blessing so strongly that he risked his life so others could have that comfort.

We end the month with a more somber kind of love- the kind of love that involves empathy and self-reflection with the beginning of Lent. We feel Jesus's pain as we take a break from the pleasures of life, both big and small. We take time to look inward and tend to our own spirituality. We give ourselves some tough love.

I am excited to share all this love with you in the coming weeks, as we sing, eat, dance, laugh, learn, shake hands, share mittens and hats, listen, and pray. As Episcopalians, the foundation of our practice is the Way of Love, so this month as we put this into action, here are some ways we can model this for our young ones.

Read to them. Read about Martin Luther King Jr., read Rumi's poems about love, re-read the story of the Good Samaritan, read about artists like Clementine Hunter and Charles McGee, and of course, read a love story or two.

Talk about it. What do different kinds of love look like? Ask those tough questions, such as, what does it mean to love your neighbor as yourself? Why does it matter? Why does love always win, even if it doesn't seem like it?

Model it. Show the young people in your life what it is to love. Take time to feel your feelings, and sit with someone when they need you to be in their feelings with them. Care for yourself and your family in ways that are life giving. Value others: gladly give your resources to someone who needs it, whether that is time, effort, or material.

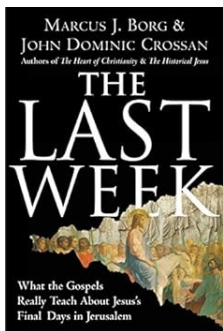
Stories of the Wilderness

Celebrate Chum's 50th Anniversary: Welcome John Cole on February 11



Chum was founded in 1973 when ten churches in Duluth's Central Hillside neighborhood pooled their resources to meet the needs of the neighborhood's many low-income residents more effectively. On Sunday, February 11, we are honored that Executive Director John Cole will be with us as our 10 am preacher. Chum's programs serve more than 8,000 low-income, homeless, hungry, isolated, or otherwise marginalized community members each year in Duluth. Deacon Pat Benson and parishioner Amber Sadowski are on staff at Chum. Please join us to support Chum's efforts and learn more about how we can help.

We Are So Close

First of all, I want to start out with a huge congratulation to you the congregation. This faith community responded to the Annual Giving Campaign and we reached most of our goals. I would like to acknowledge the strong team which supported these efforts: committee members: Holly Hansen, John Pastor, and Jim Ransom. Also, Reverend Maggie, Christine, and Rita supported our efforts and helped with leadership and logistics. Also thank you to the five members of our congregation (Jenny Keto, Agnes Barthel, Kathleen Smith, Jim Ransom, and Terry Roberts), who spoke from their hearts about what St. Paul's means to them. Thank you. Thank you! THANK YOU.

At the Annual Budget meeting, I delivered a presentation from the Annual Giving Campaign Committee. I thought it appropriate to write a Messenger article summarizing the presentation. We are pleased to report that to date for the 2024 campaign: 145 households turned in pledge cards which exceeded our goal of 144. The great news is that we received 27 new pledges which exceeded our goal of 20 new pledges! Our pledged dollars to date is \$355,600, which is 92% of our \$385,000 goal. We have much to celebrate. St. Paul's is thriving and our future is bright.

It is still possible to reach all our pledge dollar goal for 2024. If you are a regular giver and have not yet submitted a pledge card, this is a simple way to reaffirm that you continue to give in 2024.

So, you know I have to try one more time. In my January Messenger article, I suggested that if you are able to in-

crease your annual pledge, all you have to do is submit another annual pledge card or call the church. I would not ask you to consider this if I did not do this myself. Yes, I submitted a new pledge card in December and increased my pledge.

Here are some figures to show you our goal is not only possible but achievable. We are \$29,400 short of our goal. Per pledging household, this breaks down to \$203/annually; or \$16.90/month; or \$4.23 per week. As one member present suggested, this is equivalent to giving up one cup of Starbucks/Caribou coffee per week. I know not everyone is in a position to increase their pledge, but for those who are, please consider any possible increase to help us reach our goal and send in a new pledge card or call the bookkeeper. Right after the Budget meeting, several parishioners accepted the invitation to pledge more and have re-submitted a pledge card with an increase in their donation. THANK YOU! I have to plant the seed in hopes that more will respond.

December 2023 financials were presented to the Finance Committee and Vestry at their January 2024 meetings. Here is a summary of the December **General Fund** results.

*Total income is under budget \$42,369 through the end of December. Please keep in mind that our pledge commitments did not meet our pledge goals.

*Expenses slightly over budget for the month of December and under budget \$27,546 year-to-date, which is good news.

*Our bottom line, income over expenses, for December was \$4,665.55 with a total year end deficit of **\$75,916.98**. This deficit was covered by the surplus from the prior three years, and we still have a small four-year surplus of \$1,119.80.

Lost Treasures From the Archives

From the Duluth News Tribune of June 19, 1907

WILL ORGANIZE DULUTH INTO EPISCOPAL DIOCESE

Formal Steps in This Direction Will Be Taken This Morning When the Annual Convocation of Churches in This Missionary District Will Open.

The twelfth annual convocation of the missionary district of Duluth will be opened today at the Trinity Pro-Cathedral church, Twentieth avenue east and Superior street. Active steps will be immediately taken towards organizing a diocese of Duluth, which will be formally completed at the session tomorrow morning.

The convocation will be attended by about 35 clergymen and 40 laymen. An excellent program consisting of speeches, sermons, musical numbers and a banquet has been arranged.

The morning session will begin at 9:30 o'clock. The opening services of the convocation will be held at 10 o'clock and will consist of the celebration of the Holy Communion, and a sermon by Rev. C. C. Rollitt, of Red Wing. The music during this service will be rendered by the choirs of the different Episcopal churches of Duluth. Bishop J. D. Morrison will then deliver his annual commemorative address, which will be followed by his charge to the clergy of the district.

In the business session which will follow, the convocation will be organized and will continue in session until 12 o'clock, when noon-day prayer will be observed. Luncheon will be served at 12:20 by the ladies of the church.

A business session will be held in the afternoon from 2 o'clock to 4:30 when reports will be read and active steps towards the formation of the diocese taken. In the evening a banquet will be held in honor of the visiting clergymen and laymen at the Klitchi Gammi club.

Tomorrow morning the diocese of Duluth will hold its first annual meeting, after organization. For 12 years the Duluth field has been a missionary district, but during that time has made such rapid strides that it has more than

fulfilled the requirements for a diocese. The Duluth missionary district has an endowment fund of \$50,000, the interest of which will be devoted towards paying the expenses of the convocation and the bishop's salary. There are in the Duluth district 20 parishes, 43 organized and 21 unorganized missions. The total number of communicants is 3,663; the total valuation of parishes and churches amounts to \$273,000, while the value of the rectories totals \$40,000, making a total valuation of properties owned by the entire district over \$270,000, which with the endowment fund increases the amount to \$320,000. The report of the district shows a decided increase during the past year and has more than three times the requirements to become a diocese.

The good showing made by the Duluth district during the past year and its high standing are sufficient to warrant the receiving of the district into the American church and will place the newly organized body among the best and strongest dioceses in the northwest.

Tomorrow at 10 o'clock the annual meeting of the Women's Auxillary will be held in the chapel, when the sermon will be delivered by Rev. C. P. Thurston, of the St. Paul's church, Minneapolis. A short business session will be held, and in the evening Bishop and Mrs. Morrison will hold a reception in honor of the visiting clergymen and laymen in the bishop's house.

The banquet for the clergymen and laymen will be held in the Klitchi Gammi club at 7 o'clock this evening. The toastmaster will be Rev. Roderick J. Mooney, of the Holy Apostles church. Toasts will be responded to by Bishop J. D. Morrison, Rev. A. W. Ryan, Rev. Kah-O-Ned, the Indian clergyman from St. Vincent and Thomas S. Wood of Duluth.
