## Vestry Notes



Since the Annual Meeting on January 28, 2024, St. Paul's Vestry has met on February 20, March 19 and April 16 with new leadership and members. Elected at the annual meeting were Nancy Diener, Senior Warden; Tom Elliott, Junior Warden; and new members

Sherry Hall, Chuck Sundquist, Diana Dodge, and Jason Butcher, who joined previous members Angie Shambour, John Pastor, Diane Morin, Eric Thomas, and Susan Anderson.

With Rev. Maggie, the Vestry had a half-day retreat on March 2 to get-to-know one another, discuss a Biblical scripture, work on the Strategic Plan-2024, review vestry duties and responsibilities, and accept various roles and projects. The strategic plan includes five objectives:

1. Strengthen lay leadership systems
2. Re-Initiate the capital campaign project
3. Mobilize to meet spiritual needs of growing community
4. Strengthen community access to worship
5. Increase parish annual income.

The Vestry is in the initial phases of refining the strategy and implementing various projects and tasks. Progress on these strategic objectives will be reported in future Vestry notes.

### What is the Vestry working on?

- **Re-initiating discernment around a capital fundraising project**, led by Nancy Schuldt, and joined by Vestry members Sherry Hall, John Pastor, Jason Butcher, and Chuck Sundquist.
- **Improving Internal Signage**: updating signs to help people find the chapel, restrooms, parish hall, and other meeting spaces, led by Diana Dodge.
- **Cataloging parish members vocations**, avocations, and other talents and skills, led by Diane Morin and Angie Shambour
- **Welcoming New Members**: connecting with newer members of the church with get-to-know-you coffees, led by Eric Thomas, Susan Anderson, Diane Morin, and Jason Butcher.

The Vestry has four standing committees that report directly to the Vestry, and each has Vestry liaisons. These committees and their chairs are:

1. **Finance**: Leslie Brunfelt, Chair; Nancy Diener and Tom Elliott, liaisons;
2. **Building/Property**: Craig Fellman, Chair; Tom Elliott, liaison;
3. **Personnel**: a committee in development, and
4. **Stewardship**: an umbrella group consisting of Annual Giving, Capital Fundraising Initiatives, and Planned Giving Initiatives.

If you have experience or curiosity around human resources, facilities management, or fundraising, we are looking to develop these teams. ## Strengthening the Web

I'm sitting in my office, listening to the sounds of shuffling and sorting in the Parish Hall as preparations for the Rummage Sale commence. I can hardly believe that it's already the end of April!

I'm reflecting on a lot of experiences I've had in my role thus far. I've learned so much since September. I've had a chance to get to know many of you more than I did before, and this time I've had to learn more about how a Church operates has been invaluable. There is a surprising amount to learn about working at a Church, and then there is learning to do about each Church's Community because every single one is different! As I round out the first year of the programming season, I have a much clearer picture of things to plan for next year, how, and what is needed to make stuff happen. I've seen this year as a really gracious "on ramp." There has been a surprising amount of discernment going on about moving forward- what's important, and what we want to cultivate.

I had an exciting meeting last week with Karen Allison about confirmation. It was surprisingly exciting because she was talking about the curriculum that St. Paul's used, and one particular component of it that really struck a cord with me was a book called Faith Webbing: Wrapping Children and Youth in a Web of Faith by Gary M. Pecuch. It offers many ideas about fostering intergenerational connections. Creating a faith web is an assignment for confirmands. Each child makes their own web — mostly through being intentional about talking to people they see at Church, and getting involved in things happening here. That got me thinking, what if everyone did this? A faith web includes a few babies or small children, a few elementary aged children, a few secondary school aged kids, a few young adults, a few people in your generation, and a few people who might be

your parent's age, and a few who might be as old as your grandparents. These are folks at church whose names you know, and that you interact with. I realized that even as someone who works here, I had to stop and think about who that would be for a few minutes!

The other thing that stood out to me while pondering this was the importance of showing up and valuing connection! Our society is in a really odd place right now, where attending something virtually has become an acceptable substitute. Trust me, in some ways I really appreciate this — like being able to meet a Doctor online when your entire family is sick and you really don't want to haul everyone down to Urgent Care. But, I'm learning that when it comes to my faith community and spiritual growth, that it's so important to be physically and mentally present. Being here with you, talking as we work, singing, celebrating, worshipping, laughing, crying, playing — that's the best part!

Seeing the volunteers talking, sorting, caring for each other, and working together in the Parish Hall this week has been a breath of fresh air. There is some real magic that happens when people are united in a common goal, big or small. I will continue to make showing up and doing my part to foster positive connections a central focus of my role. More of the good stuff!

## The Wider Church

As most of you know, in addition to my ministry here at St. Paul's as Associate Rector, I am engaged in ministry and serving in representative positions at several other levels in ECMN and the wider Episcopal Church. Those additional ministries and positions include serving as Dean of the Northern Region of ECMN encompassing the NW and NE Mission Areas which covers the area of all Northern Minnesota north of the Twin Cities. I also serve as one of two elected members from ECMN to Province VI Council (the other member from ECMN being Minnie Steel of St. Mark's Cathedral). And finally, I serve as one of eight elected Deputies from ECMN to the Episcopal Church's triennial General Convention being held this year in Louisville, Kentucky.

The upcoming several months is a very busy and important period this year for all of these additional ministries. First, I attended the online Province VI Synod on Saturday, April 27. Province VI is made up of eight upper Midwest Dioceses in the Episcopal Church: Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, and Montana. The Province VI Synod is composed of the Bishops from those eight Dioceses as well as Province VI Council, together with the General Convention Deputations from each of these eight Dioceses. We elect a President and Vice-President of Province VI and a Province VI member to the Episcopal Church's Executive Council at this Synod meeting.

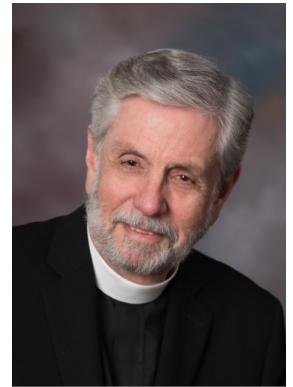
Second, on Saturday, May 4, I will be convening and attending the Spring Joint Mission Area Gathering of the NW and NE Mission Areas of ECMN being held at St. Paul's, Brainerd with all the delegates to ECMN annual Convention from each congregation in northern Minnesota invited to attend.

Finally, from June 20 thru 29, I will be attending the Episcopal Church's General Convention in Louisville, Kentucky as one of eight elected Deputies (four Clergy and four Lay Deputies) in addition to Bishop Craig Loya from ECMN.

One might and in fact should ask, what are the purposes and functions/roles of each of these bodies in our Diocese and the wider Church and how do they effect and define who we are as the Church?

First, The Episcopal Church is a "hierarchical" Church. This

means, by contrast, that we are not a "congregational" church, although we might seem to behave that way sometimes. In the Episcopal/Anglican Church tradition, we are organized in dioceses ministered to by Bishops in historic succession, meaning that theologically we believe and assert that our Bishops are in historic succession from the original Apostles. Thus, theologically we have basically the same understanding of "Church" as do the Roman Catholic and Orthodox Christian traditions.



The diocese in our tradition represents the basic and full reality of "the Church." The fullness of the Church "subsists" in the Diocese ministered to by a Bishop. All the dioceses in the Episcopal Church are joined together in communion and governance in General Convention consisting of a Presiding Bishop, a House of Deputies (as mentioned previously the Deputies consist of both Lay and Clergy members), and a House of Bishops. These two houses and Presiding Bishop constitute the governing body of the Episcopal Church as a whole. It is interesting to note that out of our formation during the revolutionary period of this country's history the resulting Episcopal Church's governing structure looks much the same as our civil national governing structure. This is not a coincidence.

There are other formal levels of communion in the Episcopal Church including the system of Provinces (groupings of diocese), regional deaneries or mission areas (groupings of congregations within a diocese) and of course the congregation (parishes or mission congregations). All of this creates a church which at all levels is organized to hopefully be in the fullest possible communication through communion with each other as we all seek as faithful disciples of Christ to fulfill our "ministry of all of the baptized" to glorify God and help to build God's kingdom here and now.

## The Deacon's Stoop

In April I had the honor of preaching on the 'Good Shepherd' gospel, combined with the epistle from I John with the call to lay down our lives for one another and the text "let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." During the preceding week I was part of the Joint Religious Legislative Coalition's Faith Leaders Day of Prayer and Action. JRLC is the largest advocacy group in the state, and the coalition consists of Jewish, Islamic, Catholic and Protestant leaders coming together to speak to our shared values in the public policy sector. Our panel that day included representatives from each of these faith traditions sitting side by side having authentic discussion of some of the most difficult issues you can imagine. Today we hear a lot about the need for civil discourse in the public sector, but these leaders went beyond civil. They listened to each other with compassion and a desire to learn, and their speech was rich with empathy, their questions laced with the desire to deeply understand.

### **Justice is what love looks like in the public sector.**

One of the stories shared by the rabbi was about Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. In the words of his daughter Dr. Susanna Heschel:

*"When he came home from Selma in 1965, my father wrote, 'For many of us the march from Selma to Montgomery was about protest and prayer. Legs are not lips and walking is not kneeling. And yet our legs uttered songs. Even without words, our march was worship. I felt my legs were praying.'"*

Listening to understand, speaking truth with empathy and compassion, showing love in truth and action - these are the characteristics of those who follow the Good Shepherd. These are the telltale marks of our healthy personal relationships, but also hold true of our faith community's relationship to the broader community of Duluth, and beyond.

There are all kinds of competing interests demanding our

attention in our fast-paced world. There are the desperate needs of people who are struggling to survive, trying to find food, water, shelter, medical care. There are those deeply wounded by injustice, whole communities of people who seek to be recognized and accepted. In our country we are experiencing a growing mental health crisis coupled with a lack of access to care; an opioid epidemic and people self-medicating their pain; a surgeon general warning us of the health consequences of isolation and loneliness. All important, all deserving, and all landing on top of an economy that isn't working for most of us and the pressure of working harder for a dollar with less purchasing power. What's a person to do?

Listen to understand, speak truth with empathy and compassion, show love in truth and action. When Bishop Craig was with us on Palm Sunday, he reminded us that we can't do it all. We discern the areas of ministry that call to us as individuals, and as a congregation. We focus our attention, pray with our feet, and do it well. We stand in solidarity and offer our words of support for those who discern ministry along other paths of service, and raise our voices in the public sector for policy changes where it is needed. This is how we pray with our feet, how we live justice out loud in our community, and as a community.

And as we follow our Good Shepherd, goodness and mercy shall follow us all the days of our life, and we shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever - beginning here and now, as together we co-create the Kingdom of God on Earth.

Go in peace, to love and serve the Lord. Alleluia! Alleluia!

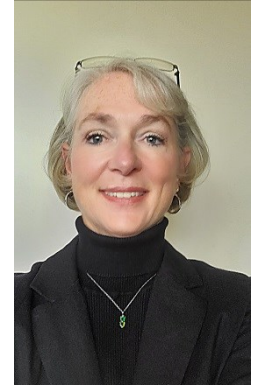


## St. Paul's Church Scholarships Announced

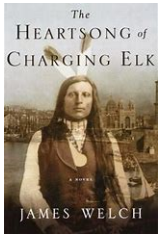
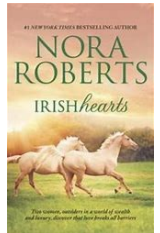
The following books have been added to the Olcott library recently:

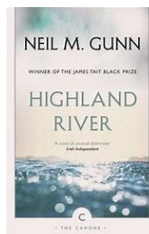
Highland River, the “northern river” that ran through his childhood.

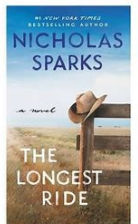

**“Highland River”** by Neil M. Gunn. This book is considered one of the great works of 20<sup>th</sup> century Scottish fiction. The story follows Kenn, the central character, from an idyllic childhood spent in the Highlands through the terrible slaughter of World War I, his disillusioned thirties, and, eventually, back to the



**“Johnny Tremain”** by Esther Forbes. The story of a fourteen-year-old boy and his adventures in Boston leading up to the Boston Tea Party and the Battle of Lexington.

**“The Longest Ride”** by Nicholas Sparks. From the dark days of WWII to present-day North Carolina, this novel shares the lives of two couples overcoming destructive secrets -- and finding joy together.

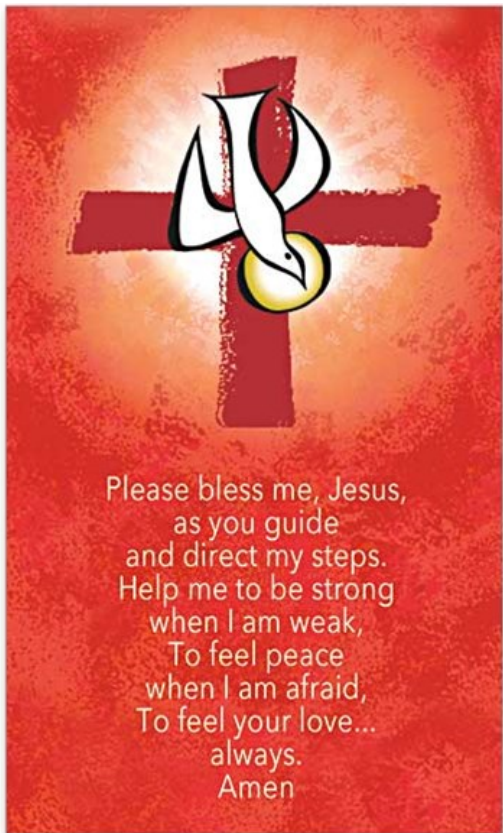
