

My Grandmother's Altar Flowers

On Saturday afternoons, when I was growing up, my grandmother and her friends visited each other's flower gardens. My grandmother and her friends were members of the Rosary and Altar Society, the Catholic equivalent of the Episcopal Altar Guild. The flowers picked from their gardens were destined for the altar for next morning's Mass. Besides attending church the next morning, these Saturday visits were their social occasion of the week. The smiles on their faces as they greeted each other, complimented each other about their gardens, and exchanged advice about what to do about caterpillars and other bugs showed how much they enjoyed this break from the vegetable gardening, canning, cooking, and other chores that occupied the rest of their weeks.

Their flowers were old-fashioned species and varieties, such as delphiniums, gladioli, zinnias, hollyhocks, irises, lilies-of-the-valley, peonies, and old-time roses, among many others. Gladioli were my grandmother's specialty and her pride and joy. Their tall spikes glowed apricot and yellow on the altar in August like the sunset later that day. My grandmother was a modest woman, but she beamed whenever anyone complimented her on her flowers, especially her gladioli.

The women brought the flowers by the armful into the church late on Saturday afternoon, arranged them in vases for the altar, and then knelt in the pews and prayed the rosary. Overnight and next morning, these flowers emitted heavenly fragrances that filled the small church they and their husbands built by hand many years before, after most of them had emigrated from Hungary.

The arranging of the flowers, followed by praying the rosary, was a worship service not found in any prayerbook, but for the women it was their time together with each other and with God. The flowers were a gift from these women's gardens, but more importantly they were a gift from their spirits which lifted us all.

Reflections on Ecumenical Leadership: Forum with Retired Bishop Craig Anderson

Sunday, June 2, 11:30 am, Parish Hall

This summer, St. Paul's will have a special guest, a visiting retired bishop from South Dakota. Bishop Craig Anderson was bishop of South Dakota from 1984 to 1993. He was the president of General Theological Seminary from 1993 to 1998, and became president of the National Council of Churches in 1995, where he served in

leadership until 2001. He currently serves Lutheran congregations in SW Minnesota. With such an extensive background on church leadership, both within the Episcopal Church and across denominations, we will host a forum after church where we can ask Bishop Anderson about his experiences. What are the biggest challenges facing the church today, and how have they changed? What gifts does ecumenical ministry bring to the average congregation? This promises to be an interesting and informative hour of good conversation!

Vestry Notes

First, I would like to thank so many of you for the good wishes, prayers, cards and emails I've received while I recuperate from an accident that happened when I was in Mexico to see the total solar eclipse. The accident resulted in a broken tibia/tibial plateau and knee damage which required surgery. As of this writing, I am still 'homebound' and non-weight bearing on my right leg. Hopefully, I will be back at church in person and vertical very soon.

Next, I want to give a special shout out to the hardworking folks who made the rummage sale happen. Led by the talented Susan M. Anderson and Jim Sontag, this event raised over \$13,000! This is an astonishing result, as typically the rummage sale brings in \$3,000-\$5,000. Part of the purpose of the rummage sale is to raise money for service organizations allied with our community outreach efforts. This year, it was decided to share our good fortune and give essentially a "double tithe" (20%) to Safe Haven, or \$2,800.

In the past two months, there has been a lot of activity at St. Paul's. Some of it we easily see, like Easter Sunday, choir, bells and musicians, Bible studies, Wednesday night programming, kids church, and the rummage sale. Other activities are not as visible, the work that clergy, staff and

volunteers do behind the scenes, meetings, caring for our beloved building, caring for individual members, planning and discerning about the future of St. Paul's. In the last Vestry meeting, Maggie posed thoughtful questions to spark discussion about future planning. The idea was to imagine the Parish Hall filled with timelines of our history, including pic-



tures and narratives about what happened in and through our church history. Maggie asked what might we envision would be included for the time periods 2020-2025 and 2025-2030? A robust discussion followed. I pose the same scenario to all of our members. What might you wish for St. Paul's in the next 5-10 years? Feel free to share any thoughts or ideas with me or any of the members of the Vestry.

The Deacon's Stoop

On the day of Pentecost, God's wild, reckless, uncontainable love set the early church on fire, igniting in the first Christians a singular passion to fold the whole hurting world into the healing arms of God's love. Every Pentecost is an invitation to allow God to rekindle that fire in us, renewing our own passion to join God's project to knit together the beautiful spectrum of human diversity into a communion of perfect love, reflecting how the very heart of God, the three in one, is difference without division and unity without uniformity. In an election season that both features and plays out against the backdrop of what seems like a never-ending assault on the vulnerable, the poor, and the marginalized, with a dangerous white Christian nationalism threatening both the fabric of our common life and the integrity of the church's public voice, the gift and fire of Pentecost are as urgently needed right now as they have ever been.

This week we noted the close of the 2024 Minnesota Legislative session. Our area senators and representatives have worked passionately for the people making their homes here, living their lives here amid increasing challenges. While I appland their efforts, I'm also saddened by what we didn't accomplish. We didn't see constitutional amendments safeguarding the human rights and dignity provided in the Equal Rights Amendment, or the amendment to remove barriers to homeownership, to make our rental housing safe and affordable, and to protect our vulnerable households and communities from displacement and homelessness. We didn't see funding to provide shelter for the hundreds of people living outside year-round in Duluth. We need the gift and fire of Pentecost to knit us together into a communion of perfect love.

This week Chum co-hosted the Affordable Housing Listening Event at Peace Church, where we heard the stories of our neighbors struggling to find housing in Duluth. We heard from a young couple who are both working full time to support themselves and their baby, who worked diligently for three months without success to find housing they could afford, and had to settle for a place that is distant from work and childcare at a cost that is \$400 over their budget at a time when food prices have increased by 25% in the past year.

We heard from our neighbors at Loaves & Fishes, who daily offer a home to those who have nowhere else to go. We heard from

Stepping On Up and One Roof about the housing stats in Duluth. We heard about City Council members discerning how to spend \$3.9M in remaining funds from the American Rescue Plan Act that have to be used or returned by the end of the year. So many needs make these hard choices.



In 2019, Duluth sponsored a study

by Maxfield Research to assess the housing needs of our community. Their analysis revealed the need of 1031 market rate units and 3509 affordable and senior housing units in Duluth by 2030. Affordable in this context is tiered, beginning with a single person household earning \$50,000 or less.

More than half of all Duluthians are cost-burdened by housing costs, paying more than 30-50% of their income on housing. Most citizens in Duluth don't make more than \$50K/year, which is considered 80% of the Area Median Income. This leaves people with little capacity to address other needs that support a healthy life. Ramen fills a stomach without providing any nutrition. Hungry kids in school can't focus, and it affects the ability to learn. Hungry employees don't perform as well on the job. And all of this diminishes their ability to respond to the unpleasant and costly surprises life can bring, from a car breakdown to a medical bill. One little crisis can be enough to break them because they have no capacity to build savings or resilience. The Covid shutdown revealed just how vulnerable people are, and by March of 2022 eviction rates in the Duluth area reached 150% increase above historical averages.

To date, Duluth has over 5000 market rate units going up or completed (much more than the need of 1031). In stark contrast, less than 1000 affordable and senior housing units have been added (much less than the 3509). This gives us a shortfall of more than 2500 affordable housing units in the pipeline.

St. Paul's Outreach is working and standing with our neighbors in need. We host a 2nd Tuesday Laundry Love team at Spin City Laundry and offer two free loads to people with low/no income to offer them the dignity of clean clothes. Twice a month, teams from St. Paul's work at Damiano Center to prepare and serve free meals to folks who are hungry.

We are a "food staple" congregation supporting the Chum Food Shelf, collecting pasta year-round to feed our hungry neighbors. We facilitate a food rescue program, picking up frozen trays of food leftovers from the

From Your Bookkeeper

Dear Parishioners.

Like many organizations, we incur a significant expense in credit card processing fees. Each individual credit card transaction incurs a separate charge. For example: A \$25 gift incurs a processing fee of \$1.15; times four, that \$100 gift costs \$4.60 in fees. A \$50 gift incurs a processing fee of \$1.87; times two, that \$100 gift costs \$3.74 in fees. A \$100 gift incurs a processing fee of \$3.29. Thus giving \$100 over four transactions is \$1.31 more costly. Over many transactions in a month or year, this has an impact on our expenses. Please consider this when setting up your online contributions.

Bake Scones for Rhubarb Festival



HOMELESS YOUNGSTERS TO PICNIC ON JULY 8





The Divine Hours by Phyllis Tickle. A manual for prayer containing prayers for autumn and wintertime.


Love is the Way by Bishop Michael Curry. Bishop Curry talks about holding on to hope in troubling times.




This book uses the storytelling style of an ancient philosopher experiencing life in the twentieth century, finding timeless truths in daily incidents.
