

## **Spiritual Curiosity Matters**

Dear Friends of St. Paul's,

When I think about what matters most to me in a faith community, *curiosity* is a value that stands out. Religious tradition and spiritual practice are both multilayered, prismatic, full of twists and turns. There are endless ways to learn more, from discovering the stories in our scriptures, to engaging spiritual practices over the course of a lifetime, to learning about our religious history, to discerning values for our current contexts. Spirituality requires curiosity. Why do we do that? What is God like? What could that mean? What other ways might this be interpreted? How does this all fit together? Do I really *have* to believe *that*?

I have always perceived St. Paul's as a church that embraces curiosity as a value, offering crucial space for wondering and discovering God in multilayered ways.

That's why I'm thrilled about all of the opportunities to learn, discuss, and grow that are coming up this Fall. We are swiftly approaching the beginning of a new school year, which also signals the beginning of our educational year here at St. Paul's. There is a way that every member of the church, from the youngest to the oldest, can engage their spiritual curiosity both in practice and in discussion. In this issue of the Messenger, you will find all the details you need for fall education for all ages.

Here are some crucial things I'd like to highlight about this upcoming year:

Rally Day is Sunday, September 8. We will have an 8 am service and a 10 am service, with a picnic following the 10 am. The very popular bouncy house will return for kids! This is a favorite event when we gather in after our many adventures in the summer and celebrate being all together again.

Wednesday Evening Eucharist will be returning at 5:15 pm on September 11, with a discussion of the scriptures assigned for the upcoming Sunday. Eucharist

will meet every Wednesday, unless canceled for a holiday.

Wednesday Evening Education will move to a biweekly schedule, gathering for a meal, two youth groups, and adult forums twice a month, beginning with supper at 6:00 pm and program at 6:30 pm. A new confirmation cohort is beginning for teens in grades 9 – 12, and a middle



school youth group will gather for grades 5-8. Please help us prepare for these groups by registering your children with the enclosed registration form. Exact dates for these programs can be found on pages 2 and 11.

Our meals will be shared among many teams of cooks this year. We will be looking for teams to sign up twice a semester or so to cook for up to 40. Recipe support will be provided, and some reimbursement will be available for those who need it. Sophie Gray Spehar is in charge of locating these teams, so please consider if your household, or you and a friend, might be able to serve in this capacity. Contact her at kids@stpaulsduluth.org.

### St. Paul's Discovery Tours



Recently, St. Paul's has revitalized its discernment team regarding our capital campaign to address issues with our building and programs to ensure a vital future. Several weeks ago, an engaged group of our parish leaders joined the discernment team and our consultant, Linda Buskirk, for a capital campaign discernment "retreat".

This involved a tour of the church building, inside and out, and a detailed look at the organ console and pipe chamber. Craig Fellman, Bill Stapp, and Tom Hamilton were able to provide significant details around facility priority needs and rough cost estimates. Afterwards, we had a guided discussion around how lives are impacted by what happens in these spaces, the "vocation" of our building, and how tackling these projects can reflect what people treasure most about St. Paul's.

The Building & Grounds Committee at St. Paul's manages a long list of projects necessary to maintain our grand old stone church building. While many of these projects can be planned and sequenced through our annual budgeting process, a number of them are far larger than an annual budget

can incorporate, and are being considered as part of a separate capital fundraising effort. A small discernment team (Sherry Hall, Tom Elliott, Jason Butcher, Chuck Sundquist, Brad Brunfelt, and Nancy Schuldt) has been meeting since early this year to discuss and prioritize building and facility needs, develop plans for reaching out to the parish for your input and ideas, and to create clear channels of communication about next steps.

We would like to extend an invitation to everyone in the parish to sign up for a similar tour: to see first-hand what has been "done and left undone", and to ask questions and offer creative ideas on how our building and its many spaces could be better used to further our mission and impact in the community. We will be finalizing dates — primarily Sundays after church services, and Wednesday evenings — for anyone interested in learning more about what our building needs and why it matters. We see tremendous potential in our beautiful building, and we are excited to share our hopes with you! You can sign up online on St. Paul's website, or directly with one of us on the discernment team, beginning on Rally Day.

## A Summer Well Spent

Greetings! I'm writing on a crisp August night. I can hardly believe school begins in just a few weeks. Our family was lucky to have so many adventures this summer! The most recent was ECMN family camp in Sibley State Park by New London, MN. As a huge fan of summer camp, I was excited to go with my own kids for the first time. It was exactly what I was hoping for



— we met some new friends, ate many smores, fished, swam, paddled, hiked, worshiped joyfully, and slept like rocks.

We also visited an Episcopal Farm! Good Courage Farm is a smallish, biodynamic farm outside of Hutchinson that feeds a wide variety of people. They have goats, chickens, raspberries, pears, apples, and the coolest worship space I've been in: a concrete silo. The sound of children singing in a silo is something unforgettable.

I didn't know exactly what to say when families at St. Paul's asked me "what's camp like?" Having been there this year, I can now say that it was great! ECMN family camp is a wonderful time for kids and families to connect with their faith in a beautiful, low stress environment. I hope you will consider coming next year, and now I have the scoop if you want to know more!

I'm sending a condensed version of what I wrote last month — because it was a lot of information and I know you're busy!

#### Elementary Kids: Ages 3-12

Children will continue to meet during the 10 am service on Sunday mornings. All are welcome to come forward for a blessing, then we will journey downstairs to the classroom adjacent to the Parish Hall. We will continue with Godly Play, which is a Montessori-based curriculum that is calm, open

ended, and includes simple manipulatives used to illustrate a story. Godly Play is inclusive, beautifully simple, and lets kids ask questions. Children's Church will resume the week after Rally Day (September 15) and will go until June 8.

#### Middle School Group: Grades 5-8

Meetings will be discussion based with a focus on creativity, and the goal is to give kids a supportive and interactive space to talk about how their identity as young Christians can shape their world, and how they can use this resource as they develop, and ask big questions. The curriculum used is Re:form from Sparkhouse.

This group will meet twice monthly on Wednesday evenings, and will run concurrently with Confirmation. Attendance is open to all kids in this age group, and will meet in the upper level classrooms of the building.

#### **Confirmation Class: Grades 9-12**

It's back! Confirmation is for young Adults who are confident that they are seeking it, and requires regular attendance. This is an intentional study that deepens ties to our own Church, and what it means to be an Episcopalian out in the world. We learn about sacraments, tradition, and philosophy. The Curriculum is "My Faith, My life," which is designed to equip these stu-



dents with resources, knowledge and understanding as they near Adulthood. This class goes for two years and will require registration. Meetings will happen on Wednesday evenings twice monthly during the programming year.

Registration: Please find and fill out the enclosed registration form (pages 13-14) for the young people in your family. This is vital information for the church, as it gives us an idea of what to plan for. We'd like to know if your child is planning on participating in Faith Formation Activities, and a little bit about them. This also includes a photo release, what school they attend/grade, and minimal medical background information. We strive to be as inclusive and accommodating as possible. All children are invited to be a part of this growing group of young Episcopalians! Please mail the completed form back to St. Paul's, or return it in person on a Sunday morning to Sophie before Rally Day.

Rally Day: September 8! This exciting Sunday is the kick off

for our programing year. We will have the games in the Church yard that your kids can enjoy during the 10 am

### Notes of a Different Kind...

Dear Friends in Christ,

Fall is upon us once again, and what better time to consider getting more deeply involved in making music at St. Paul's? While we sing together every time we gather for liturgy, singing or ringing in a choir provides a deeper experience of community and leadership of God's people in song. St. Paul's has a long tradition of fine music, and I am honored to lead the music ministry. Yes, it requires some time commitment, but those who participate would tell you how rewarding it is to make music in community. Along the way, we develop friendships and care for one another deeply; and we laugh together a lot too.

The Chancel Choir sings every Sunday in addition to holidays and special occasions. We rehearse on Wednesday evenings from 6:15 to 7:30. We gather at 9:00 on Sunday morning to prepare for worship. In addition to our annual Festival of Lessons and Carols on December 15, in November, we will be singing a festive Anglican Choral Evensong to premiere a new hymn tune composed for George Herbert's text, *Let All the World in Every Corner Sing.* It promises to be a challenging but exciting fall season for the choir.

The Handbell Choir usually rings one Sunday a month and for Lessons & Carols. Some music-reading ability is helpful to

play in this group, but you usually only have two notes to worry about, so the rhythm is the more complicated piece. We rehearse on Wednesday evening from 7:35 until 8:30 pm. If you've never



rung bells before, I'd be happy to meet with you outside of rehearsal time to teach you how it works. This is a great and talented group of folks who would love to have you join them.

The Brass Choir plays for high festivals and other times throughout the program year. We usually rehearse for two weeks before we play, often on Sunday after church. We always have space for more.

Last but not least, if you sing (but are unable to commit to choir) or play an instrument, please let me know. There is a place for you in the music ministry at St. Paul's. Now is the time for you to get involved. You are welcome.



#### **Practicing The Way**


## Wednesdays biweekly, begins September 18 (dates below), 6:00 pm, Olcott Room

## The Deacon's Stoop

When Bishop Craig Loya invited the diocese to join together in reading John Mark Comer's book, <u>Practicing the Way</u>, I scheduled a book study in August. Little did I know...

This isn't a book you just read. It has drawn me into an examination of my spiritual life and challenged me to consider how I spend my time. I started adding up all the little things I was doing that just passed minutes by each day, and those minutes added up! I deleted a couple of apps on my phone, and am trying to discipline my use of Facebook. I'm finding ways to slow down and pay attention, less time scrolling through meaningless reels. I'm evaluating my schedule with the question: Is *this* what I planned to do with my one wild and precious life?

Comer talks about the hunger of our souls, our longing for community, our longing for happiness and how we search for it. Previously I've written here about the epidemic of loneliness the surgeon general warned about in America. While zoom kept us together a bit during Covid, many of us have become a people more accustomed to sound bites and texts than a lingering conversation in community over a meal. How often we do we see Jesus gathered around a table and sharing a meal?

Decades ago, when Jesus was just coming to my deeper attention I was deeply influenced by the book, <u>A Long Obedience in the Same Direction</u>, by Eugene Peterson. Comer brought that book back to my attention, reminded me of the spiritual practices that form us into followers of the Way of Jesus as we seek to "be with Jesus, become like him, and do as he did." Turning God into a habit, renewing my personal Rule of Life, transforming me into someone who becomes like Jesus, does what he did, loves like he loves us. Practicing the Way is transformational, and it takes time... a lifetime.

Practicing the Way isn't meant to be read alone. It's a community practice, a call to a way of life, a call to apprentice with Jesus. Jesus didn't apprentice a person, he gathered a group around him and called them his disciples. They learned together by being with him. This book offers an invitation to do the same. It awakens our hunger for a deeper, more meaningful life. Jesus told us he was the bread of life, and if we eat his bread we will never hunger. Practicing the Way gathers us around Jesus' table and provides us with the bread of life.

I invite you to join me this fall in becoming an apprentice of Jesus through the course, Practicing the Way. Following Jesus' example, we will gather around a simple meal together and listen to the teachings provided

online. Each lesson includes a habit to implement between gatherings, and our time together will include supporting each other as we together labor to strengthen the habits of Practicing the Way. Together we will watch curriculum videos online, followed by a simple supper and discussion around the table. We will meet on the



alternate Wednesdays from the scheduled formation, and see where the Spirit leads us in our apprenticeship to Jesus.

### Fall Adult Formation Offerings

This fall I am looking forward to offering two adult formation opportunities for members of the congregation. The first will entail a look at the topic of Christian Spirituality, its history and practices; and the second will be an examination of Jesus' mother, Mary, and her significance in God's history of salvation and as an example of our call to discipleship.

The first offering looking more deeply at the history, traditions, and practices of Christian Spirituality is an outgrowth of work with St. Paul's Faithful Innovation Team earlier this year. As the Faithful Innovation Team grappled with the ideas and practices that the Rev. Canon Blair Pogue of ECMN and others were presenting to St. Paul's and the wider Diocese, we came to the conclusion that perhaps we needed to examine more closely the basic spiritual traditions and practices of our Christian faith.

After meeting sporadically last spring and looking at several published resources, we determined that there were two areas that needed more extensive examination and reflection: first, we needed a clearer understanding of the third person of the Trinity, The Holy Spirit, and our relationship with God; and second, we were lacking in our knowledge and understanding of the rich historical traditions and practices of Christian spirituality.

We will use two books to delve more deeply into both topics. For a look at the Holy Spirit and the significance of the Incarnation for our relationship to God, we will use a short book by a teacher, mentor, guide and friend of mine Fr. Richard J. Hauser, SJ titled In His Spirit: A Guide to Today's Spirituality. Early in his book Fr. Hauser makes the following simple but profound statement: "The


indispensable starting point for understanding Christian Spirituality is an acceptance of the view of person presented in the New Testament. The New Testament is emphatic in stressing the fact that human nature is different because of the resurrection of Jesus. The difference is the result of the sending of the Holy Spirit

by Jesus and the Spirit's new presence in the world in those believing in Jesus."

The second book, "The Spiritual Way: Classic Traditions and Contemporary Practice" by Philip Sheldrake, a renowned teacher and author of the history and traditions of Christian spirituality will

form the basis of our examination of the 2000-year history of Christian spiritual understanding and practices and how these traditions might engage with the contemporary spiritual quest.

This "Spiritual Formation" group will meet bi-weekly on Mondays (time and location TBA) starting **Monday, Sep-**



**tember 16**. A <u>very short</u> preliminary meeting to gauge interest in this group so that the texts can be ordered and distributed and to establish a time for subsequent meetings will be held on **Sunday, September 8** right after the 10:00 service in the Olcott Room. If you are unable to attend this organizational meeting but are interested in this offering, let me know by emailing me at <u>Associate@stpaulsduluth.org</u>.

The second offering I will be facilitating this fall is a scriptural, theological, and historical look at the Virgin Mary. Meetings of this group will take place during the weeks of Advent. Because of what are viewed by many as excesses involving Marian piety and doctrine developed over the centuries, we of the "Reformation Churches" tend to downplay or in many instances ignore the theological and spiritual significance of Mary. I hope it will be useful to take a fresh look at the mother of Jesus, what part she played in his life and what part that she can play in our lives and in God's call to holiness. More information about this group and where and when the group will meet will be forthcoming as Advent draws near.



The following books have been added to the Olcott Room Library recently:





Legend of the Celtic Stone by Michael Phillips. An epic saga of Scotland and her people.



## Lost Treasures From The Archives

From October 27, 1915:

Has a Varied History. The parish has had a varied history, feeling the many depressions in business and at all times being selfdependent in an extraordinary degree. St. Paul's has had largely to carry the mission work in the city and has shown remarkable zeal in erecting and maintaining a hospital for the public good. In the last ten years it has not done much for itself but has nevertheless carried a great burden. Unself-ishly it has looked for others' good and not its own selfish ends. It paid a large indebtedness, it sacrificed itself to give absolutely vital help in raising the greater amount of endowment for a new bishop, when there was but little money in the city. Some of our lead-ing men could not give money, but gave their notes for amounts totalling \$3500, when it looked as though the project for relieving Bishop Gilbert, of beloved memory, from his too great responsibilities was doubtful. when it became imperative to build a new hospital, we put aside the selfish desire to have a new church, and all worked together to the end that we have one of the best western hospitals for fireproofing, for sanitary conditions, and for equipment. It marks a most unselfish career that though we well might have expended this money on building betterment, we passed our vanity by, and did what seemed best for the city at large.

One of our mission churches would have been sold for a mortgage, had not our parish stepped in and paid in large part the indebtedness. And always our people have given largely to every part of the church work in our midst. It should make us take cour-It should make us take courage that this is true and hope that St. Paul's, as in the past, will be one of the main factors in the spiritual up-

building of our city.

October has been a fruitful month with us. It was Oct. 31 that the first set service was held, probably in our basement. It was in October that the hospital was started. It was about that time that we entered the building on Fourth street. It was in October, 1902, that we began work in our last noble building. It was in October that Bishop Barker was elected and a year after that the present rector jook charge.
