Becoming People of Prayer



Dear Friends of St. Paul's,

Over the summer, I was approached by the Director of the Episcopal House of Prayer in Collegeville, Minnesota. She had received an exciting opportunity through a Lilly Grant to create an experimental educational program in Benedictine Spirituality for local congregations. The initiative was

called Transforming Hearts, and it is designed to equip Episcopal Congregations in Minnesota to become a transformative, prayerful presence in their communities.

The curriculum teaches Christian monastic and contemplative practices, including spiritual discernment, contemplative dialogue, and intentional rhythms of daily prayer and work, as informed by the wisdom tradition. It brings twelve ECMN congregations together to participate in a three year program of education, practice, and service. Participants will go on three annual retreats, receive group spiritual direction, and bring these practices back to the congregation.

We were invited to participate as one of the pilot congregations in this program. I am thrilled about this, and we have recruited an excellent team of lay leaders in our congregation to participate: **Sherry Hall, Lynnea Hultkrantz, Sophie Spehar, and Diane Kolquist.** I will be participating in the pilot cohort, which will be meeting two weeks ahead of the first

group of congregations, and providing feedback to the House of Prayer on the curriculum.

One thing that remains clear in our divided times is this: prayer grounds us for a more peaceful presence in the world. With a strong contemplative practice, we are able to make room for God's peace in our own lives, carrying it out into the community with us. When we learn to listen to God better, we learn to listen to one another better, and we learn to speak when it matters most. This allows us to be rooted in the goodness of God, and when we are rooted in the goodness of God, we embody God's peace in ways that can transform the places where we work, study, play, serve, and so much more.



That is why I am so excited about this opportunity: we, as a community of prayer, can be servants of others by embodying God's peace in our daily lives. This is one step towards that kind of service. I hope you will connect with the four members of our team to support them, and ask them questions about their experiences. Our first workshop on Zoom is January 5, and the first retreat will be in February.

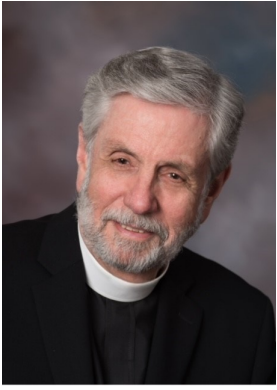

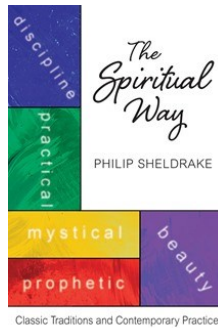
Adult Spiritual Formation Opportunities



We will resume our previous reflections and discussions on the history of Christian spirituality and practice after the New Year on January 2.

The book we will use to help guide us in our discussions of the history and traditions of Christian Spirituality is a wonderful book by a very prominent theologian and author of many works on theology and Christian spirituality,

Philip Sheldrake, titled, *The Spiritual Way: Classic Traditions and Contemporary Practice*, published by Liturgical Press, Collegeville, Minnesota. Our discussions sessions will be held on Thursdays at 5:30 pm in the Parish Hall. If you would like to join these discussions, there are one or two copies of Sheldrake's book still available at St. Paul's. Just contact me and let me know. You could also order the book, and it should arrive before the discussions begin on January 2.



Topics included in Sheldrake's book are: *What is Christian Spirituality; The Way of Discipline; The Contemplative Mystical Way; The Way of Practical Action; The Prophetic Way; and Contemporary Practice*. Many if not most of Sheldrake's books are used in college courses and are thorough and thought provoking.

As many of you are aware, my responsibilities and time at St. Paul's have diminished somewhat over the past months as my ministry and responsibilities have increased as Dean of the Northern Region/Deanery of ECMN. However, as I

am called to live into that ministry more fully by Bishop Loya, I will continue to be anchored at St. Paul's and will continue to serve in whatever capacity I am needed here in this wonderful congregation. I intend to regularly update you during the year on what is going on throughout Northern Minnesota in ECMN and what opportunities might exist for anyone interested in joining in to help during these times of transition.

One of the things I very much intend on continuing at St. Paul's is to continue to offer adult formation opportunities and discussions on various spiritual and theological topics. I will be discussing possible topics with many of you privately over the next several months. If anyone should have a topic of particular interest that they would like to explore and discuss, please let me know.

As we at St. Paul's continue our journey into the new reality of the Church in the twenty-first century, and to discover (re-discover!) different ways to form ourselves and be formed as disciples of Jesus Christ, I strongly believe that understanding and recovering our past traditions and theological and spiritual understandings as the Episcopal/Anglican branch of Christianity is extremely important to understanding what we are called to in the present time and cultural circumstances. I hope you will join in this effort of formation that is being offered by myself, Rev. Maggie and many other gifted "teachers" here at St. Paul's.

The Deacon's Stoop



Practicing the Way of Jesus

Our first small group following Jesus together through an apprenticeship process called “Practicing the Way” will wrap up our primary study in January, culminating with each of us writing a Rule of Life. This is defined as a set of practices (habits) that help us each live in alignment with our deepest desires

and abide in Jesus. It’s a way to organize our lives around (and be more aware of) God’s presence, to keep God at the center of everything we do. On the flip side, it’s also about avoiding habits that find us living in ways we don’t want to live, getting too caught up in popular culture, consumerism, or busy-ness that saps our strength and weakens relationships. It’s a way to love God and people, to live with greater intentionality as we strive to become more like Jesus, to love as Jesus loves, to do as Jesus did. A Rule of Life includes your mind, your body, and your spirit; it includes your relationships, your habits, and your patterns of work and rest.

In February we will begin offering mini-courses of four sessions on each of nine ancient spiritual practices that have been used by followers of Jesus to assist us in living into our baptismal covenant. These practices include sabbath, prayer, fasting, solitude, generosity, scripture, community, service and witness. We learn together about each practice and then go practice until they become a habit. Anyone can join any session at any time, and anyone can facilitate any of the sessions on practices that interest you. You can pick and choose which practice speaks to you, and you may have practices that aren’t included in this list. It isn’t comprehensive; it’s just a place to start and a process that includes companions on the journey so we can explore together with the support and encouragement of others.

Practical Radicals

If you would like to change the world from the way it is to the way it could be, then I would invite you to learn how to become a Practical Radical by joining Deacon Pat and Rev. Larry Johnson in reading and discussing the book [Practical Radicals—Seven Strategies to Change the World.](#)

Participants will be expected to have read the material prior to our meetings—about 30-40 pages each week. Each session will be in the range of 90 minutes to two hours. There will be ten weekly sessions beginning Tuesday, February 4. We will not meet on February 18 (and invite you to attend Chum’s Assembly and Annual Meeting at Gloria Dei) with the first meeting on Tuesday, February 4. The first meeting will focus on an introduction to the book, getting acquainted with one another, and obtaining the reading schedule. A daytime group will meet for ten weeks on Tuesdays from 11:00 am – 1:00 pm at St. Paul’s Episcopal Church, and an evening group will meet from 6:30-8:30 pm at First Lutheran Church. Please register for the book study by January 15th with Deacon Pat (deacon@stpaulsduluth.org) and let us know if you need to order a book. The cost of the book is \$25 and will be available for you to pick up at our first session. Rev. Larry Johnson who self-identifies as a practical radical will be our facilitator for these events.

The St. Paul's Church Scholarship Fund

Because education is one of the most important elements of a successful society and a key factor in the well-being of a community, the Mars family established a Scholarship Fund in 1989 for members of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Graduating seniors from high school or high school graduates, of any age, are eligible to apply. The scholarship recipients are chosen by a committee of people who also are members of St. Paul's and/or members of the Mars family.

The criteria to be considered are active church participation, completion of high school or GED, a demonstrated



interest in completing a college or trade-oriented education process, and submitted recommendations. The awards are renewable annually for four academic years.

APPLICATIONS FOR NEW SCHOLARSHIPS for the 2025-2026 school year must be submitted to the Scholarship Committee by March 15, 2025. 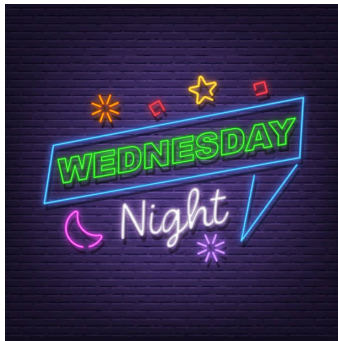

Lost Treasures from the Archives

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS WORTH WHILE

Are New Year's resolutions worth while?

Of course, they are worth while, in spite of all the ridicule that is spent upon them, and in spite of the fact that they often amount to nothing more than resolving to be better. It is an arbitrary thing that the civil year ends with December, but it gives a common time for taking stock. And, surely, we can just as wisely take stock of our bank accounts. In fact, it is an evidence that the better manhood within us is not wholly dead when conscience and reason combine to warn one to amend whatever of his habits are bad.

The experiences of the twelve months that are gone surely have some lessons of wisdom to teach us. And is it not manful, is it not a characteristic of a reasonable being, to try and put into action the product of the experience of the past?

It may be objected that many of these resolutions — may be, most of them — are broken, hence it is unwise to make the attempt to amend one's life. It might just as well be said that inventors should cease their attempts to gain the dominion over our world. Most inventions are failures, but here and there one succeeds, and all humanity is the gainer.

It is only by effort piled upon effort that we win out in life's struggle, and every man who makes the effort honestly and conscientiously is the better man because he has tried to do his best. Every man shows the innate manhood within him, shows that he does not belong to the brute beasts that perish, when he attempts to refuse the evil and choose the good.

All right-minded men should give their cordial approbation and assistance to the man who is making good resolutions at this New Year's time; for here we are dealing with the most serious life-issues, whose results go far into the long ages that are yet to come. Woe betide the man who by superficial jocularly, or heartless discouragement, or, still worse, cruel temptation, seeks to hold his neighbor back from making good resolutions, or, when he has made them, aids his lower nature in breaking them.
