



From Your Senior Warden



By the time you read this, St. Paul's Annual Meeting will be in the history books. You will have heard about all the activities of the Vestry, the ordained and lay staff, the committees, and the many, many volunteers who serve the congregation and the community. You will have elected new Vestry members and thanked outgoing members. You will know a little bit more

about the Capital campaign, Stewardship, Faith Formation, Music and you will have heard some folks thank others for a variety of helpful gestures and deeds. The task of the Annual Meeting is to come together as a Christian community, review what has transpired over the previous year and look ahead to the new year with mission, vision and purpose.

This is an exciting time. 2024 was a year of growth and increased stability, 2025 looks to continue on a path of growth, and with this growth, a need to develop initiatives and programs that meet the needs of our St. Paul's members, as well as our neighbors and friends in the Duluth community. With great anticipation, I look forward to seeing what we can do and be as we follow Christ in 2025.

As I write this, I have been, for the last 24 hours or so, following the events in the Episcopal Church and the general public following the sermon given by the Bishop of Washington, DC, the Rt. Rev. Mariann Edgar Budde at the National Prayer Service at the Washington National Cathedral. If you have not seen it, or listened to it, I encourage you to do so. It is an astonishing example of following Jesus and speaking truth to power – with love. She spoke of the fear of many LGBTQ, Trans and Immigrant individuals, who have no guar-

antee of safety of acceptance and are entering an unknown and potentially terrifying future. Bishop Budde's "simple" plea was basically to act more Christ-like, to be humble, to look with compassion on the marginalized, to have mercy, and love all of God's children. I don't know what the trajectory of this story will be, but I think many of us have found a role model in Bishop Budde regarding how we approach our own situations of conflict. While I characterized her plea as "simple", I think we all understand that following Jesus is not a simple path. And acting towards our 'enemies', towards people who annoy us, towards people who do not agree with us, with LOVE as the bottom line, is truly radical in our world today. I pray for Bishop Budde in thanksgiving for her integrity and courage, and also in concern for her safety. I pray also to learn from her humble and loving example.

As we here at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Duluth, Minnesota, continue to discern our mission and outreach goals, may we also be inspired by Bishop Budde's plea for unity through following the Way of Love, demonstrating compassion and mercy, and loving our neighbor as Jesus taught us.

The Deacon's Stoop



Yesterday the Right Rev. Mariann Edgar Budde, Bishop of the Diocese of Washington DC, preached at the Inaugural Prayer Service at the National Cathedral. She issued a plea for mercy for those who, by executive order, woke up to find themselves under a new level of oppression for a variety of "otherness" characteristics. The administration's response was

immediate and defensive.

Anyone who watches the sermon will recognize a pretty significant disconnect here. One of the most frequent comments has been about her gentle tone and the grace with which she preached. She maintained the same steady tone as she was interviewed after the presidential demand for an apology. With all the intense feelings on all 'sides' of the political culture of the US today, where do we find strength, love for those we perceive as 'enemies', and peace in seeking unity with those with whom we so strongly disagree? How do we love and pray for them?

Her sermon has gone viral. I hope you listen to it; to *all* of it. While the inaugural prayer service gathered national leaders, she preached to *everyone* – and her primary message was a call to unity, compassion and mercy. We *all* are called to follow the teachings of Jesus as we live into our

baptismal covenant: to continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers; to persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord; to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ; to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself; and to strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being. How do we do this?

Years ago, the priest at St. Patrick Episcopal in Bloomington delivered a sermon on the Great Commission, Matthew 28:18-20, where Jesus sent us out into the world to do his work. 'Go, preach, and baptize' has been a directive that we have carried out in a way that has caused great harm in the world. Father Bruce suggested an interpretation that

Jesus, undeterred, went right ahead and gave his charge: "God authorized and commanded me to commission you: Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be with you as you do this, day after day after day, right

up to the end of the age."

carried a different tone; "As you go, gossip the gospel" – and I've never forgotten it. We are nourished at the table together, through reading and reflection, participation in formation offerings, etc. And St. Paul's offers many ways to deepen our faith!

Our first "Practicing the Way" small group community has been examining the spiritual disciplines or practices that transform us into becoming more like Jesus, and we have each drafted a Rule of Life to reflect how we will continue to pursue a holy "wholeness" as spiritual beings living here and now, dealing with all the things going on in the world. One of the things we talk about is how church has become so dependent on clergy to lead us. While we are blessed to have Maggie, she is one of about two dozen full-time priests in our diocese, and the *only* one north of the Twin Cities.

We continue to meet on Wednesdays (6:00 pm, alternate Wednesdays from the Faith Formation nights). Members of the first small group are selecting one of the spiritual practices and will be sharing a 'mini-course' to dive deeper, offering these to the congregation. We will go beyond Wednesdays, as is appropriate, with different practices. For example, the practice of solitude might include gathering a group for a silent walk on Park Point, visit to Quarry Park, or a swim in Lake Superior. Janice and Harley are offering our first group practice of the spiritual discipline of community by hosting a potluck Shabbat in their home for our

small group. Rothko will lead our next Wednesday night offering by leading the series on the practice of prayer. (see *info* on page 10)

Another "Practicing the Way" cohort will begin in September, and there are no pre-requisites here. Anyone can participate in any of the Spiritual Practice sessions, so watch the bulletin for details!

St. Pauls' many small groups love and care for each other, "gossiping the gospel" as they share life's journey with each other, pray for each other, celebrate life's joys and sorrows together. Perhaps you are in one of these smaller communities within the St. Paul's family: the team prepping meals at Damiano, one of the Small Group Bible studies, Practicing the Way, Rick's or Maggie's formation gatherings, book study, Chum quilters, Altar Guild, or the group

Elementary/Godly Play:

She is responsible for recruiting and organizing volunteers in the nursery. We are still looking for folks who would like to be a part of this vital ministry, even if it's just for a morning or two per year. Please talk to me (Sophie), Maggie, or Hannah if this is something that interests you.

Middle School/Confirmation:

Confirmation and Middle School groups will continue to meet on Wednesdays after our 6:00 pm meal. Upcoming dates are February 12, February 26, March 12, and March 26.

Other events to be aware of:

Shrove Tuesday! My other favorite event of the year. We will be hosting our annual Talent Show and Pancake Dinner on Tuesday, March 4, at 6:00 pm in the Parish Hall. Last year we had a great time with music, magic tricks, jokes, and other daring feats. This event is free, and anyone can attend and participate! Keep an eye out for a sign up sheet for the talent show.

Please don't be shy about signing up for youth events around the Diocese. There are a few happening this spring.

The St. Paul's Church Scholarship Fund

Because education is one of the most important elements of a successful society and a key factor in the well-being of a community, the Mars family established a Scholarship Fund in 1989 for members of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Graduating seniors from high school or high school graduates, of any age, are eligible to apply. The scholarship recipients are chosen by a committee of people who also are members of St. Paul's and/or members of the Mars family.

The criteria to be considered are active church participation, completion of high school or GED, a demon-

strated interest in completing a college or trade-oriented education process, and submitted recommendations. The awards are renewable annually for four academic years.

APPLICATIONS FOR NEW SCHOLARSHIPS for the 2025-2026 school year must be submitted to the Scholarship Committee by March 15, 2025. Application and letter of recommendation forms are available through the St. Paul's Episcopal Church website. Click on the Connect tab then scroll down to Scholarships on the sidebar.






Olcott Library

I am a Follett thriller reader and did not think I would like a book set in medieval England. I was wrong!










Lost Treasures from the Archives

TALE OF WINTER **50 YEARS AGO TOLD BY PIONEER**

Duluth In Infancy Faced Hardships; Ganoe Races Held Kew Year's Day.

Difficulties faced by residents of Duluth during the winter of 1869-70 when the present city was only a little village without railroad facilities and dependent on horse-drawn transportation for the necessities of life were related by J. Kimball, 2226 West Fourth street, to a News Tribune reporter yesterday. Mr. Kimball is one of the few surviving real pioneers of the city and is now serving in a district court jury in the Bay Froze in October.

"In the last of October, 1369, the bay was frozen over and the last trip for the season of the Duluth and Superior ferryboat Kasota was made at that time." Mr. Kimball said. The boat could only make a landing at the railroad dock near the end of Rices Point.

"The first railroad to Duluth was then under construction from St.
Paul and was operating as far as
Pine City. The Duluth end of the
railroad had been built as far as Fond du Lac. After the close of navigation freight had to be brought by teams from Pine City over the old United States military road to Superior, thence across the bay on

the ice to Duluth.

"Hay for feeding the many teams used in this and other work at the Head of the Lakes became so scarce that \$60 a ton was the price given. Church Basement Ready.

"The basement of St. Paul's Episcopal church was ready for use and Duluth's banker, Senator George B. Sargent, read the Christmas service to a congregation composed princi-

pally of men.
"Before Christmas snow had fallen but had disappeared in the openings on the hill side, except for

drifts in low places.
"Jan. 1, 1870, was devoted to sports. Canoe races were held in the open lake between the present location of the canal and an old dock at the foot of Second avenue East. The Indian squaws who won the race were awarded sacks of flour.
"February and March

"February stormy months with a heavy fall of snow."
