About Our Worship Today

Worship in the Episcopal Church is participatory and embodied. We stand and kneel, make the sign of the cross at times, sing and breathe together, and walk forward for communion each week. You are welcome to participate at your own comfort level. You will likely see people engaging differently at different times. One of the gifts of the Episcopal tradition is that there are a variety of 'right' ways to participate.

Restrooms

Exit at the side door at the front of the church and go down the hall. They are the first and second doors on the left side of the hallway.

What do I do?

This service booklet will give you the words you need and instructions. The words in **bold** print are said by everyone. Hymns can be found either in this booklet or in the blue or green hymnals in your pew.

May I have communion?

Yes. All may come forward to receive communion (or the Eucharist.) No one is required to receive. We are serving both bread and wine. You may choose to receive at your own comfort level, both bread and wine or just bread. You may also come forward with your arms crossed over your chest for a blessing, or you may choose not to come forward at all. Children may receive at any age.

Worshiping with Kids

Joyful noise is most welcome here. Many families find that sitting close to the front helps children to see and engage better with the service. There is a staffed nursery located down the hall. We also have a rocking chair in the back of church for parents with infants. Children aged three through fifth grade are invited to Children's Church after the opening prayer.

About St. Paul's

We are a community dedicated to following the Way of Love as shown to us by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. Together we practice curiosity, awe, and community to love God, love our neighbors, and love ourselves.

The Liturgical Season

In the Episcopal Church, we follow a circular calendar with special seasons. We are currently in the season of Epiphany. The word Epiphany comes from the Greek word for "manifestation" or "appearance." During this season we read stories about discovering who Jesus is through baptism, the calling of the disciples, and his early ministry. Epiphany continues until Ash Wednesday, which is on March 5 this year.

First Reading

Jeremiah 17:5-10

Thus says the LORD:

1 Corinthians 15:12-20

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ--whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

Holy Gospel

Luke 6:17-26

The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Jesus came down with the twelve apostles and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. They

had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them. Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

"Blessed are you who are hungry now,


You Are Holy




The Great Thanksgiving

During Epiphany, in honor of the wise men who came from distant countries, we are using Eucharistic prayers from Anglicans throughout the world. This Sunday we are using the Thanksgiving and Praise prayer from <u>A New Zealand</u> <u>Prayerbook</u>, p. 485-487. It has been slightly adapted. Therefore, with all your witnesses who surround us on every side, countless as heaven's stars, we praise you for our creation and our calling, with loving and joyful hearts:



Blessed are you, most holy, in your Son, who washed his disciples' feet ... Therefore, with this bread and wine, we recall your goodness to us.

God of the past and present, We your people remember your Son. We thank you for his cross and rising again, we take courage from his ascension; we look for his coming in glory and in him we give ourselves to you.

Send your Holy Spirit ... For you, the heavenly one, make all things new; You are the beginning and the end, the last and the first.


Praise, glory, and love be yours this and every day, from us and all people, here and everywhere. AMEN.

Next Sunday we will have a guest preacher, **Pastor Mark Olson.** He works as the White Earth Mission developer for the ECMN and the Northwestern Synod of the ELCA.



This ecumenical position develops shared ministries in indigenous contexts, developing leaders and cross-cultural theological education. Mark has worked for many decades at Leech Lake and White Earth. After church, Mark will host a coffee hour forum about the faith communities he serves in White Earth, some of which are historically native congregations affiliated with Enmegabowh.

Our Call to Support Migrants

Sunday, March 2: Special Collection

"The clearest and most consistent moral imperative throughout all of scripture is to welcome the stranger." Bishop Loya has asked Episcopal Churches in Minnesota to respond to the ongoing crisis facing immigrants in the United States. He has asked congregations in Minnesota to advocate, pray, and donate to a newly established diocesan Migrant Support Fund. This fund will be used to support those in ECMN who are working with migrants at the grassroots level. At Bishop Loya's request, St. Paul's will be taking a special offering on Sunday, March 2 to contribute to this fund. All cash and non-pledge offerings given this Sunday will be sent to the diocese to support Fund" in the memo line. Rev. Maggie will match up to \$1,500 in parish donations from her Rector's Discretionary fund.
