A Father's Desperation



Beloved in Christ,

On Sunday, March 2 we read a story from the Gospel of Luke about a desperate father. **He brings his son, who is "seized by a spirit" that convulses him, to the disciples of Jesus.** Jesus, however, happens to be up on a mountain with his three closest disciples at the time. The

others try but cannot heal the boy. The father's desperation grows and grows, and when Jesus returns, there is a great commotion.

This portion of the reading is sometimes omitted for Transfiguration Sunday, which is always just before Lent begins, this year on March 2. The focus is often on the mountaintop moment, the spiritual revelation happening away from the desperate crowds below. But in the year of Luke, we get this secondary story, the story of what happens at the bottom of the mountain—after the spiritual high. In these times, the desperation of this father really strikes me.

It reminds me, on some level, of the desperation of those who have come to the United States seeking asylum, safety, and a future for their children. Today as I write this, people who have come here seeking help have been targeted and threatened by the mo St. Powerful in our country. Bishop Loya has asked us to respond, stating that "The clearest and most consistent moral imperative throughout all of scripture is the call to welcome the stranger." a small difference in the onslaught of crises facing us today. There are many ways, but the simplest one is financial: Bishop Loya has established a new Migrant Support Fund. **He has asked congregations in ECMN to take a special collection on Sunday, March 2 to support the fund.** The hope is to have funds ready to support Episcopal ministries who are responding to needs at the grassroots level. We discussed some of these ministries at our February 26 forum. It is my hope that St. Paul's can show up in a meaningful way to answer this ask.

I know that St. Paul's can show up powerfully to answer the Bishop's request. I ask you to join us on Sunday, March 2, and give generously to support this cause. All cash and non-pledge offerings given that day will be sent to the Migrant Support Fund. You may write checks to St. Paul's with "Migrant Support Fund" in the memo line. I will match up to \$1,500 received in the plate on March 2 from my discretionary account, so that we can show our support to this cause.

This is a small thing, but by doing this, we can at least show up to provide resources to those who are meeting the needs of the many desperate fathers like the one in the story. It is a concrete place to start in a sea of many unknowns and chaotic variables.

Outreach Committee Updates and Needs

Who can be on the Outreach Committee?

The Outreach Committee is open to all parishioners, who are welcome to just attend meetings or to actually join the committee. The committee meets in person every quarter and conducts other business electronically.

What does the Outreach Committee do?

The Outreach Committee decides how to disburse outreach funds. Up to December 2024, money had accumulated in the fund over several years, but after the Outreach Committee was revived at Maggie's request, it expended that money, zeroed out the fund, and requested an annual amount from the general budget for 2025 onwards. The committee also plans to conduct other fund-raising initiatives.

How much money does the Outreach Committee currently have?

For 2025, the vestry approved \$6,000 to be transferred into the Outreach account. The Outreach Committee will be sending out grant application forms shortly for people to apply for a portion of these funds on be-

half of a needy organization—usually local—such as Damiano, Laundry Love, Life House, Safe Haven, or Program for Aid to Victims of Sexual Assault. (St. Paul's \$2,500 annual donation to CHUM comes



from the General Funds, not from Outreach—yes, this is a bit confusing).

Can you donate money specifically for Outreach?

Yes, you can! You can write a check to St. Paul's Church and designate "Outreach" on the memo line. Or you can donate online, by selecting "Other" and then specifying "Outreach" in the notes section. The Outreach Committee promises to use your money wisely.

To Become an Usher

I have some exciting news to share with you. For a long time, I have felt the need for a larger piano in the church. The instrument we have in the chancel is lovely, but it doesn't have the weight to truly lead and support a room full of people in song. We have been given a tremendous opportunity to be caretakers of a grand piano offered to us by retired professor of piano, Dr. Robert Thomas, who has been worshiping at St. Paul's since he moved to the area last July.

Church music has changed over the last 50 years. In my childhood, it was unheard of to lead congregational song with anything but the organ. However, as we have embraced other musical expressions from the Gospel and folk traditions, the organ is not always the best instrument to provide the spirit for leading this music. The piano has come into itself as an instrument of choice for such things.

In addition to more effective leadership in worship, the piano will be a great tool for outreach to the wider community. In the past, performers have inquired but had to pass on performing at St. Paul's because we do not have a concert quality piano. As word has gotten out into the musical community in town, I have already had inquiries from various groups wanting to perform in our beautiful space since now we will have a concertquality piano.

The plan as endorsed by the Vestry involves placing the piano in front of the pulpit. This will necessitate removing some pews to make space for it. Rest assured that the pews



which are removed will stay intact in case we ever want to put them back in place. This is also providing a space for conversation about wheelchair space on the lectern side of the church. We will keep you posted as to the progress of the project.

It bears mentioning that the chancel piano will remain in place and will continue to fulfill its role in worship. Logistically, it won't always make sense to use the grand piano, so the chancel piano remains a vital part of our cadre of fine instruments at St. Paul's.

The Power of Retreat

Greetings!

It's been a quick month! I can't believe I'm writing with March in mind. These last few weeks have been kind of a blur with cold weather, school breaks, and much to ponder politically. I find great comfort and relief working for St. Paul's right now, knowing that I'm working for a church with deep roots in service and care for all. Recent events have caused me to pause and reexamine my role. I've asked myself and others what children in our Church and community might need, and am listening intently. Thankfully, our Diocese is providing a wealth of guidance and support as we wade into new waters. I hope you have been reading the weekly messages from Bishop Loya, as there is a lot of information included about various ministries currently supported by ECMN, especially for migrants.

I want to tell you about the wonderful retreat I attended earlier this month at the Episcopal House of Prayer. The House of Prayer is an absolutely dreamy place that is attached to St. John's in Collegeville. I can't believe I hadn't heard about it before! I was asked to be a part of an ongoing spiritual growth opportunity that is based in Benedictine Prayer Practices. The Episcopal House of Prayer recently received a grant from the Lilly Endowment to do some long-form learnin Christian spirituality, which they are calling ing Transforming Hearts. It is a well-crafted, three-year program, that is designed to equip a team from a congregation with contemplative practices. The program will have online workshops, group spiritual direction, and retreats three times a year. The hope is that these leaders will be able to learn about prayer practices like the Jesus Prayer, Examen, and others, and then feel equipped to bring these back into the community. There were twelve people from Episcopal Churches from around the state present, and it was a great opportunity to reflect and rejuvenate. We were so guiet. We sat, eyes closed, for almost an hour every day in prayer. I had no idea that I needed that, but I sure did.

On the ride home with my new dear friends, Sherry Hall, Lynnea Hultkrantz, and Diane Kolquist, we talked about our experiences and hopes for this three -year-long endeavor. We talked about other stuff too- but one of the be St. Parts of the trip was making that connection with other women from St. Paul's that I didn't know very well before the weekend. I already have ideas bubbling for ways I can bring what I've learned about leading prayer into my work here. It's been a gift already.



If what I described above sounds great to you, there is an opportunity for strengthening bonds and getting to know each other for women here at St. Paul's! We are hosting a retreat on March 21-22 at Camp Amnicon. This retreat will center around connecting through shared food, games, outdoor time, art, and spiritual practice. A reminder that 2024 Year-End Giving Statements were emailed to you at the end of January. Please check through your inbox and spam folders carefully to locate your statement.

January 2025 financials were presented to the Finance Committee and Vestry in February. Here is a summary of the January General Operating Fund results. January is typically a very good month for income, as several people catch-up on 2024 pledges and/or pay all of 2025.

The St. Paul's Church Scholarship Fund

Because education is one of the most important elements of a successful society and a key factor in the well-being of a community, the Mars family established a Scholarship Fund in 1989 for members of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Graduating seniors from high school or high school graduates, of any age, are eligible to apply. The scholarship recipients are chosen by a committee of people who also are members of St. Paul's and/or members of the Mars family.

The criteria to be considered are active church participation, completion of high school or GED, a demon-

strated interest in completing a college or trade-oriented education process, and submitted recommendations. The awards are renewable annually for four academic years.

APPLICATIONS FOR NEW SCHOLARSHIPS for the 2025-2026 school year must be submitted to the Scholarship Committee by March 15, 2025. Application and letter of recommendation forms are available through the St. Paul's Epis-
