About Our Worship Today

Worship in the Episcopal Church is participatory and embodied. We stand and kneel, make the sign of the cross at times, sing and breathe together, and walk forward for communion each week. You are welcome to participate at your own comfort level. You will likely see people engaging differently at different times. One of the gifts of the Episcopal tradition is that there are a variety of 'right' ways to participate.

Restrooms

Exit at the side door at the front of the church and go down the hall. They are the first and second doors on the left side of the hallway.

What do I do?

This service booklet will give you the words you need and instructions. The words in **bold** print are said by everyone. Hymns can be found either in this booklet or in the blue or green hymnals in your pew.

May I have communion?

Yes. All may come forward to receive communion (or the Eucharist.) No one is required to receive. We are serving both bread and wine. You may choose to receive at your own comfort level, both bread and wine or just bread. You may also come forward with your arms crossed over your chest for a blessing, or you may choose not to come forward at all. Children may receive at any age.

Worshiping with Kids

Joyful noise is most welcome here. Many families find that sitting close to the front helps children to see and engage better with the service. There is a staffed nursery located down the hall. We also have a rocking chair in the back of church for parents with infants. Children aged three through fifth grade are invited to Children's Church after the opening prayer.

We are a community dedicated to following the Way of Love as shown to us by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. Together we practice curiosity, awe, and community to love God, love our neighbors, and love ourselves.

The Liturgical Season

In the Episcopal Church, we follow a circular calendar with special seasons. We are currently in the season of Lent, represented by the purple cloth of the altar.

Lent is a forty-day season when we prepare for the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection at Easter.


Opening Collect

The Collect of the Day

Let us pray... (Pause for silent prayer) Almighty God, you know that we have no power in ourselves to help ourselves: Keep us both outwardly in our bodies and inwardly in our souls, that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

First Reading Exodus 3:1-15

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the LORD saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are

standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the LORD said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the country of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. The cry of the Israelites has now come to me; I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain."

But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM." He said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I AM has sent me to you." God also said to Moses, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'The LORD, the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you':

This is my name forever, and this my title for all generations."

Psalm 63:1-8

Note: The assembly sings the entire verse marked, "All."

The **bold** words indicate when to change notes on the psalm tone.

One: O God, you are my God; eager-ly I seek you; my soul thirsts for you, my flesh faints for you, as in a barren and dry land where there is no water.

All: Therefore I have gazed upon you in your holy place, that I might behold your power and your glory.

For your loving-kindness is better than **life itself**; my lips shall **give you praise**.

So will I bless you as long **as I live** and lift up my hands **in your Name.**

My soul is content, as with mar-row and fatness, and my mouth praises you with joyful lips,

When I remember you up-on my bed, and meditate on you in the night watches.

For you have **been my helper**, and under the shadow of your wings I **will rejoice**.

My soul **clings to you**; your right hand **holds me fast.** Second Reading 1 Corinthians 10:1-13

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.

Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

Holy Gospel Luke 13:1-9

The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

At that very time there were some present who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them--do you

think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down."

The Nicene Creed





Making Space for a Grand Piano

St. Paul's has been approached by a gracious member who would like to loan his Steinway Grand Piano to us. The Vestry, Rector, and Music Minister have discerned that this offer will be of significant benefit to St. Paul's, and we are very excited about the potential that such an instrument offers. The piano will be available for use in worship and will make our church an attractive venue for groups requiring a concert quality piano. Students who study piano here may also be able to host recitals in the church, welcoming in the wider community. In addition, this piano will provide us with a high quality instrument that can lead us in song when, in a few years time, we need to do significant repairs on our organ. In order to house the piano, we will be removing three pews from the pulpit side of the church. The removal of pews will both create space for the piano and will assist with traffic flow when serving communion. Overall, the team believes that these changes will improve our worship considerably and allow us to share music with people from beyond just our own congregation. Recycle Your Cell Phone

Safe Haven, Duluth

Safe Haven always needs cell phones for its clients, and St. Paul's Outreach Committee encourages parishioners to respond to this request. Safe Haven is happy to accept old phones, new phones, working phones, and broken phones (a recycler/refurbisher takes care of needed repairs and wipes the phones clean).

Most people feel more comfortable wiping their phone before donating it (understandably!) so Safe Haven has provided some instructions for that:

For iPhones: go into Settings > General > Transfer or Reset iPhone –and that will wipe it clear and return it to factory setting mode.

For Android: go into Settings > System > Reset options > Erase all data (factory reset).


