Notes of a Different Kind

Many of you have heard me tell the story how I came to be an organist. My family was housesitting for a professor couple in Kalamazoo, Michigan in the summer of 1975. They were musicologists and had a huge collection of vinyl record albums all over the house. The records that were on the shelves that we could see were either music from the middle ages or 20th century avant-garde composers. My 12 year-old taste in music didn't resonate very well with such esoteric music. One day, however, my sister and I realized there was a cabinet in the corner of the living room, so we opened it. There we found classical music recordings which we considered "normal." There was a complete set of the Beethoven symphonies among many other big names: Mozart, Brahms, Bach, etc. In this part of their collection was an album titled, "E. Power Biggs' Greatest Hits." It was this record that turned me on to playing the organ. It was a smorgasbord of various composers and periods of music history, from Bach to Widor to Charles Ives. So often, an artist will record the complete works of a given composer or historical period, but this collection showed the organ in all of its versatility and virtuosity. I returned to Hibbing after that summer determined to reach the point in my piano training where my teacher would allow me to study organ. I reached that goal and, as they say, the rest is history.

Fast forward to a couple weeks ago when we hosted the choir from St. John the Evangelist Church in St. Paul. The spouse of one of the St. John's choir members caught me after church that day and told me he had grown up in Duluth, the son of the pastor at Good Shepherd Lutheran

Church. He shared with me that not long after the pipe organ was installed, the notorious E. Power Biggs had come to play a recital at St. Paul's. It is possible this may have been the dedication of the organ when it was new. Regardless, it is such an honor to occupy the bench where Biggs once played. I was flabbergasted that my childhood hero had once played the same instrument where I now play every week.

Regrettably, I never met E. Power Biggs or heard him perform live. He died in March of 1977. (I still remember the report of his death on the NBC Nightly News.) He was one of the most well-known organists of the time. Who knew when he played here in the 1950s that he would be responsible for sparking the interest of an adolescent organ nerd in the 1970s who would become the organist at St. Paul's in the twenty-first century? I'm still a bit weak in the knees when I think about it.

ST. PAUL'S PARISHIONERS PAY DEBT OF \$57,000 ON CHURCH

Formulate Plans to Consecrate Edifice October 14—Hamilton M. Peyton Inspires Work of Lifting the Mortgage.

With the St. Paul's Episcopal church entirely out of debt, preparations are being made to consecrate the church, 1710 East Superior street, Sunday, Oct. 14. The debt has been liquidated through the efforts of the parishioners. Prompted by the enthusiasm of Hamilton M. Peyton, vestryman since the opening of the church, they have contributed \$57,000. This amount covered the balance of a mortgage and interest which has been satisfied and a release recorded.

Mr. Peyton's enthusiasm is one of the biggest assets of the church. Before the old church was established at Lake avenue and Second street, he was responsible for Episcopal services in Duluth. It is said he would drive across the ice on the lake between Superior and Duluth in a sleigh to get the rector who lived in Superior, bring him to Duluth to read the service.

The services were conducted in homes of Episcopalians. As the communicants grew in numbers they looked about for a larger meeting place. Peyton assisted in the campaign to build the pioneer church, and has performed the same service in obtaining the present structure.

After St. Paul's parish had been established in 1869, the late George B. Sargent was a large factor in its growth. Previous to its construction Mr. Sargent conducted an energetic campaign to obtain funds with which to build the church. Co-operating

in his untiring efforts were the late J. B. Culver, the late William R. Stone, Mr. Peyton and Col. C. H. Graves. The optimistic church-builders procured the lot at the corner of Second street and Lake avenue and built a wooden edifice.

The consecration of the church will mark the beginning of the twenty-fifth anniversary of Dr. A. W. Ryan's rectorship. Dr. Ryan's faith in the future of St. Paul's was equal to that of the membership. He came to the church when the congregation was comparatively small, his faith in its future caused him to decline many offers to take charge of parishes that offered brighter prospects. Dr. Ryan helped make the church a meeting place of all creeds, mother to a number of Duluth churches, whose congregations held their services in St. Paul's until they were financially capable of building their own church.

The foundation of the present church of Duluth was laid in 1913. The completed building, with its site, is estimated worth \$175,000. The frontage on Superior street is 250 feet, with a depth of 140 feet.

October 15: St. Luke and the Founding of Duluth's St. Luke's Hospital

Luke's history and contribution to Christianity is vast, but he made an enormous impact on the women and men of St. Paul's when they founded a hospital in Duluth. Oscar Romero was a Catholic priest who spoke out against the injustice and violence plaguing El Salvador during a brutal civil war. He was assassinated while presiding at Mass in 1980.

Sunday, November 2 | All Saints Sunday and All-Parish Event for the Building Our Legacy Campaign

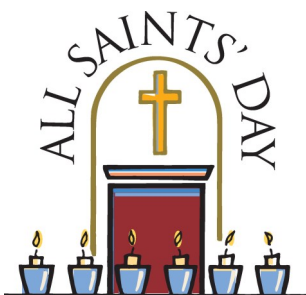
You're invited to an event for the whole church on Sunday, November 2 at 6:00

From the Olcott Library

Recently, someone asked how to find a book in the Olcott library. So, I thought I would write a brief explanation of how the library is organized.

As you enter the Olcott room, there is a wooden card catalog immediately to your left. The card catalog is organized by author, title and subject. The author and title cards are up to date. The subject cards are no longer being kept up to date given the small size of the library and each section in the library. All the cards in the catalog contain a reference to the location of the book. In the more recent cards, a number with three capital letters underneath are in the upper right-hand corner. The number references the subject, and the letters are the first three letters of the author's last name. In the older cards, this reference is more towards the center right of the card but on the top of the card. The books are organized generally as religious on the window side of the room and secular on the fireplace side of the room. All books within each section are organized alphabetically by the author's last name.

The secular books are organized in numerical order starting from the catalogue and going from one to nine, except five.

The subject numbers are: 1. Fiction; 2. Arts, poetry, music and seasonal; 3. Prayer, spirituality and devotions; 4. Biography and memoir; 6. Creation awareness and environment; 7. Personal wellness, healing, aging and death; 8. Education, family and parenting; and 9. Social and ethical issues.

The religious books are on the window side of the room. Starting nearest the window facing Superior Street, they are organized as follows: 11. (with a blue dot) Bibles; 11. (with a gold star) Bible study and commentary; 10. Episcopal and Anglican Church including history, liturgy and commentaries; 12. World religions; and 5. Theology.
