## Isaiah's Audacious Hope

Dear Friends of St. Paul's,

Advent is a season of wonder and hopeful curiosity, when darkness is settling over the earth and the songs of the church look ahead to the coming peace of God. This year, all of our Old Testament readings in Advent come from the Prophet Isaiah.

Isaiah describes in beautiful poetic verse the qualities of the kingdom of God. Words you may recognize, like "they will beat their swords into plowshares" and "the wolf shall lie down with the lamb" and "waters shall break forth in the desert" all come from Isaiah passages we will read in Advent. They are some of the most beautiful and hopeful prophetic verse in the scriptures.

There's also something unique about these passages—they all come from what is called "First Isaiah." This is a portion of the book that is composed prior to the conquering of Israel by Assyria. Isaiah warns his people that their disregard of the covenant, their disregard for the poor, and their refusal to follow God's ways will result in catastrophe. Yet, while he is warning about this—God is sowing a counter-narrative of promise alongside it. Despite this, the prophet declares that God is imagining a future where the tools of war become implements of agriculture, and all creation is at peace with itself, and no one dies an early death. After the destruction, a just ruler will arise from the stump of the people, and God's ways will be known throughout the whole earth.

It strikes me that these Advent readings about hope all come from *before* the people's great catastrophe occurred. First Isaiah stands at the precipice of the complete collapse of his culture. And yet, even amidst

this frightening future, God is promising an absurd and audacious hope—that this destruction will not last, because God is more powerful than anything these empires can wield. This hope, through the words of the prophet Isaiah, survived much longer than the catastrophe—much longer than Babylon and Assyria combined.

It makes me wonder what it takes to trust in *that* kind of hope—the hope that sees through the catastrophe and through the other side. This Advent we will be exploring that question—what does it mean to be filled with God's hope, even in the darkest of days? I hope you will join us for worship, where we can root ourselves in that hope for the year to come.

## From Deacon Pat

***In a lonely, fractured culture, Jesus offers a new kind of family.***

Despite the unprecedented connectivity of the modern era, genuine community is vanishing. Isolation, transience, and superficiality can sabotage our formation into people of mature love. But through Jesus, we enter a new kind of family that offers intimacy, joy, healing, and commitment.

Have you ever noticed how often we refer to the folks of our church as our “St. Paul’s family”? For the past month we’ve been hearing stories from members on Sunday mornings as each shared what this family has meant to them. In our faith community we are here as chosen family. Transformation happens in community. Elders and youngers and everyone in between gain a sense of family connection through participation in community and service. Opportunities include coffee hour and small group gatherings, Altar Guild and Outreach, and the many various volunteers, teams and committees that together form the structure of our family tree. Through service in community we see to the details that form the foundation that lets us come together in worship, in celebration, in formation, and in shared service. We are here for each other, and together we also reach out to serve God in our city. Together we can develop intimacy, joy, healing, and commitment.

Transformation happens in community. We are nourished together as we gather for prayer, worship, reflection, and communion. We are nourished together as we share the gospel while preparing a meal on Wednesday nights, or Saturday morning preparing the altar for worship, or working side by side at Damiano Center or Laundry Love, or meeting as a finance committee or vestry to see to the needs of the church, or joining our voices in choir, or sharing Jesus with our youngsters in formation. Last year I was stitching on the Chum quilt on the stage during a finance committee meeting, and I was struck by the camaraderie and laughter I heard as they saw to the budget. The friendships birthed

around the quilt frame are amazing. The people that gather for Practicing the Way are among my most treasured relationships birthed at St. Paul’s as we journey together following Jesus.

Are you feeling lonely and disconnected, and longing for hopefulness? At St. Paul’s we invite you to join a new kind of family in Jesus. It doesn’t just happen, but through intentionality, commitment, and sacrifice our faith family continues to grow. We aren’t perfect. Like every family we struggle together and experience conflict, but through our commitment to each other and to God we work through the difficult bits as we strive together to love. What a gift it is to have people who love us enough to help us become more like Jesus! Like the action of waves on stone, we smooth each other’s rough edges as we become Beloved Community. Working through conflict in community with friendly antagonists, those who can confront us from a place of love, can transform us as individuals to become people of mature love and more like Jesus.

We are each of us being formed – unintentionally when we consume all the world offers us through unprecedented connectivity, or intentionally when we choose and filter what we consume to form us into a more loving person. We can experience the peace Jesus promised us. Becoming more like Jesus is how we learn to do as Jesus did, and how we partner with God to co-create the Kingdom of God here, in this time and place. Prayer and practice together as our St. Paul’s family can make miracles happen! Remember the women who founded St. Luke’s Hospital, and the community transformation that came with our last capital campaign. Remember, trust, pray, and practice as we grow as followers of Jesus and members of this beautiful family of St. Paul’s.

# Be a Light in the Storm

Please join Deacon Pat and faith communities from Duluth for the People's Convention at the Minneapolis Convention Center on Saturday, December 13. We will share our values for just and compassionate policy in this faith-based resistance to the rise of an authoritarian regime. The People's Convention is our first step together as we proclaim our shared values alongside leaders representing Muslim and Jewish congregations. This event is leading us on the Palm Sunday Path (below). We are hoping to fill a bus! Bishop Craig Loya has called this the most important work we can be doing at this time, and has invited us to participate.

## Saturday December 13, ISAIAH People's Convention (For MN Clergy and Leaders)

Our People's Convention will be a gathering of 5000 people across our organization from 12 pm - 6 pm at the Minneapolis Convention Center. This will be a pivotal moment for Minnesota clergy and teams of lay leaders to launch the next phase of the Palm Sunday path, as well as the statewide agenda we will be adopting and working to achieve.

## Palm Sunday Path (There will be a local gathering in Duluth)

As Christians, we stand for healing the sick, feeding the hungry, and welcoming the stranger. We stand for telling the truth and honoring the dignity and worth of every child of God. As we live through a period of rapidly consolidating authoritarian power in our country, the dominating politics of hate, fear, greed, and division, are violating our values and tearing our country and democracy apart. We are living in an emergency, and we need to decide that now is our time to act in a new way. Now is our March on Washington moment. Now is our Confessing Church moment.

In response, a broad coalition of clergy, congregations, denominational leaders, and faith based organizations are coming together launching a path to mass actions for Christians across the country.

### Step 1: Palm Sunday afternoon, March 29, 2026

Jesus entered into Jerusalem at the beginning of Passover, on a donkey, a symbol of a just, humble leader that honors the dignity and needs of the children of God, one that heals the sick, feeds the hungry, honors and welcomes the stranger. Historians tell us Roman authorities entered Jerusalem at the same time to show the power of the Roman empire and to control this freedom festival. Jesus provoked and drew a contrast. We will, too.

We will march, proclaiming God's values in contrast to the dominant politics of hate, greed, and injustice. We will be Christ's body now.

Our goal is tens of thousands of Christians marching in St. Paul, other regional centers, and hundreds of thousands more in state Capitols and cities across the country.

### Step 2: Sustained Action on Medicaid Cuts, SNAP Benefit Cuts, and Immigration

The first thing Jesus did after entering Jerusalem was to overturn tables in the Temple, taking disruptive action provoking his fellow worshippers to stand publicly for the values of their faith and against the greed and injustice of the empire. **We stand for healing the sick, feeding the hungry, and welcoming the stranger.** We will unleash consistent strategic actions across the country through April, May, and June, to fight for our healthcare, the food on our tables, and our rights, worth, and dignity.

### Step 3: July 4 Action

These actions will lead to a mass action in Washington D.C on July 4th, the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence from a king. We will protect the sick, the hungry, and our neighbors. We will protect our freedom of speech and our ability to proclaim the gospel. We will tell our nation that what is happening in our country is wrong, and there is another way.

# Lost Treasures from the Archives

From the *New York Herald*, December 24, 1893

## HISTORY OF A CHRISTMAS POEM.

The "Visit from St. Nicholas"  
Written as a Christmas Gift  
to the Author's Daughters.

### ITS PUBLICATION UNEXPECTED.

Reproduction of an Autograph Copy of  
the Poem Prepared for the  
New York Historical Society.

THE POET'S OTHER WRITINGS.

Probably no ballad written by an American is so widely known or has been so often reprinted as the "Visit from St. Nicholas." Its author, Clement C. Moore, was born in New York July 15, 1781, his father, Rev. Benjamin Moore, being the bishop of the diocese. ...

In 1862 Dr. George H. Moore, of the New York Historical Society, resolved to obtain if possible from its modest author an autograph copy of his famous poem, and he success my be learned from the following letter:—

"New York, March 15, 1862. Dear Sir — I have the pleasure to inform you that Dr. Clement C. Moore has been so kind as to comply with my request (made at your suggestion) to furnish for the archives of our society an autograph copy of his justly celebrated 'Visit from St. Nicholas.' I now enclose it to you. I hardly need call your attention to the distinctness and beauty of his handwriting, very remarkable considering his advanced age (he completed his eighty-second year in July last" and his much impaired eyesight.

"These lines were composed for his two daughters as a Christmas present about forty years ago, and they were copied by a relative of Dr. Moore in her album, from which a copy was made by a friend of hers from Troy, and much to the surprise of the author, were published (for the first time) in a newspaper of that city."

## Homeless Memorial Vigil

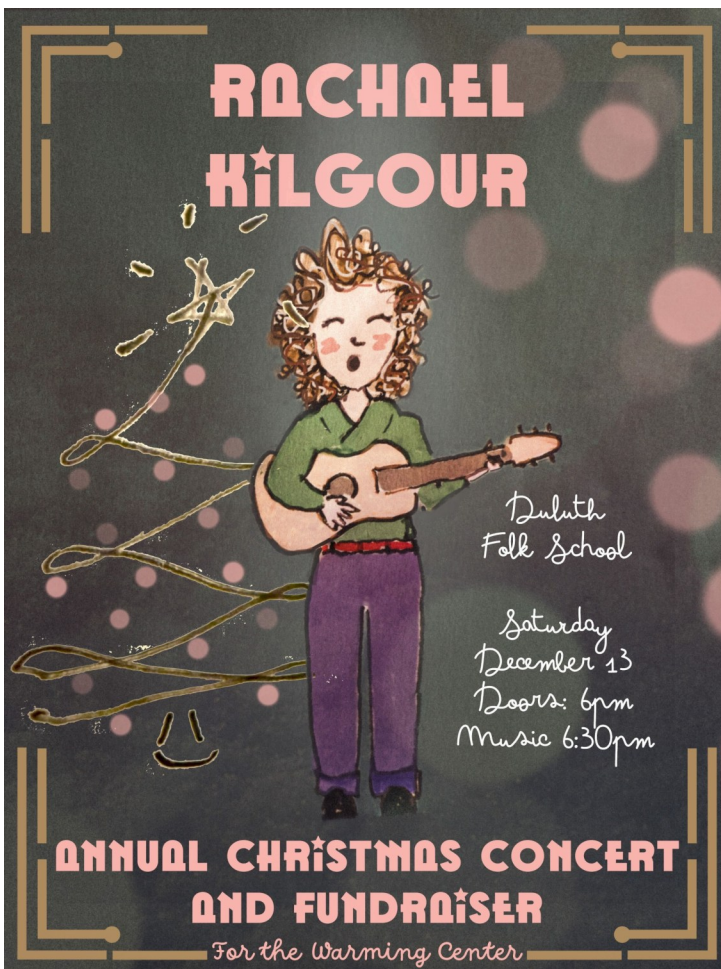

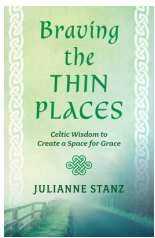
Here are some of the books that have been recently added to the Olcott Library:



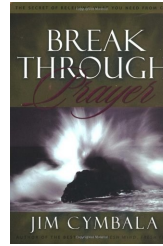

A National Geographic illustrated atlas that surveys the history of the Holy Land with more than 50 maps setting Biblical places and events in geographical context; more than 350 photographs, illustrations and works; and more than 60 timelines tracing developments and comparing histories across regions and civilizations of the Middle East.



Braving the Thin Places: Celtic Wisdom to Create a Space for Grace by Julianne Stanz. A "thin place" is where God's Grace is waiting to happen, it might be an important threshold, a soul friendship, a fresh chapter in your life, or a painful secret, fear or hardship. The author shows how we can experience each thin place as a point of departure on a sacred journey to a truer understanding of who we are meant to be.



Breakthrough Prayer: The Power of Connecting with the Heart of God by Jim Cymbala. Cymbala, a pastor of the Brooklyn Tabernacle, explains the principles of faith-filled, mountain-moving prayer that can transform circumstances, change lives and draw you closer to God than you've ever imagined.



Bread of Angels by Barbara Brown Taylor. A collection of sermons reminding us that God continues to be made known to us in the simple things that sustain our lives.



Treasured Stories of Christmas edited by Sarah Anne Stuart. Christmas stories by over thirty authors including Charles Dickens, Louisa May Alcott and Ray Bradbury.
