Lenten Focus: God Loves You



Beloved in Christ,

On February 18, we gathered for Ash Wednesday worship in a cozy small chancel service. It was a delight to see about 20 hardy souls brave our unexpected “snow hurricane” for this service. I’m very grateful to everyone who came, shoveled, worshipped and sang with us, and for everyone who joined us online.

As I shared in my homily that night, during Lent this year, I want us as a church to focus on just one simple thing: to know how much God loves you. I pray that this season, we are able to do whatever it takes to simply remember that. When the world is a difficult place, and it seems like the way forward is strange and unknown, I hope this is the one thing we can remember.

For all that we have been asked to do to care for our neighbors, to respond to violence in our world, and to speak the truth, we gain strength for that work only by grounding ourselves in God’s love. We are

only able to show God’s love to others when we know we are loved ourselves.

So, as we begin our Lenten fast, I ask you for one simple thing—to do whatever is necessary in your life for you to rediscover how much you are loved. Each and every one of you, as a creature of God, was crafted with care and delight. You are loved beyond measure, in ways that are incomprehensible to most of us. This is a gift that God has already given you and can never be taken away.

This love does not come to us because we practice outward symbols of piety, as if we could manipulate God into liking us more because we put on a good show. This love already belongs to us, already exists, and is already accessible to us just because we are alive.

May our Lenten observances draw you into this unfathomable love, such that you are strengthened for our work ahead.

Saturday, March 14

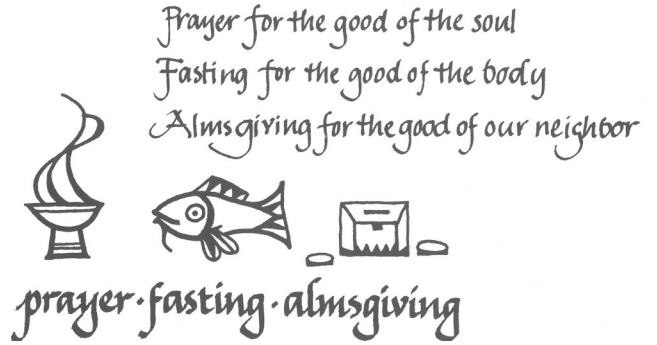
Parish-Wide Lenten Retreat

Join us for a day of Lenten workshops, prayer, song, and good company. This retreat helps us focus on different ways to pray during Lent, and lets us have some extended time together. Activities include:

This sacred site is the home of two Celtic saints who lived in the 7th century, and helped Christianity develop into what we know today. They helped bridge the differences between the Roman Christian church and the church developing among the Celts. Nancy Diener has served many summers at an archeological dig on Holy Island. Tom & Barb Elliott traveled the pilgrimage route this past summer. They will share about their experiences and what they've learned about these unique saints in our history.

Join a Bible Study about the Biblical Prophets

Thursdays starting March 5, 10 am, Olcott Room

Last year, Thursday morning Bible Study with Rev. Sue looked at the rise and fall of the Monarchy in Israel, as detailed in 1-2 Samuel and 1-2 Kings. We met prophets -- Samuel, Nathan, Elijah, and Elisha -- and we discussed how God raised them up to challenge the kings whenever the kings went off the rails -- which was often.

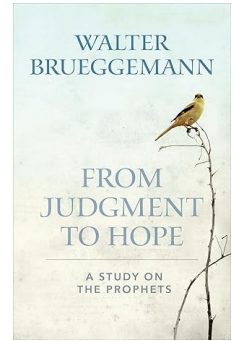
But none of those prophets left behind Biblical texts! Instead, The Old Testament gives us a wealth of other prophetic voices, all of whom spoke words not their own to leaders who did not want to hear it.

Beginning March 5 at 10 am, we will turn our attention to several of these Biblical prophets. What was their historical/

political/economic context? What was their message, and how do their calls for a return to righteousness and hope speak to us, uniquely, today? We'll use Brueggemann's text, From Judgement to Hope, as our starting point.

All are welcome. No questions are ever off the table. Bring yourself the first week, and your favorite Bible thereafter. Rev. Sue will be using the NRSV.

No registration required, just show up.

Thanksgiving Offering: Addressing Medical Debt in Duluth

St. Paul's had a profoundly successful capital campaign, raising 1.8 million dollars to support the structure through which we do ministry. Throughout this process, many of you asked how St. Paul's could also serve the community and help others at the same time as we helped ourselves. Many of you said that if we were going to raise this much money for our own church, we should do something meaningful for those beyond our doors.

We have now been presented with a unique opportunity. Working with an organization called Undue Medical Debt, we can forgive the medical debts of our neighbors. Defaulted debt is often sold by hospitals to debt collectors for pennies on the dollar. Undue uses donations to purchase this debt on the market, and rather than collecting the debt, they forgive it. On average, \$1 given to Undue can forgive \$100 of debt. St. Paul's has the opportunity to for-



give locally in St. Louis County. This is an opportunity to make an enormous impact with a relatively small amount of money.

We want to give thanks for the good work we have done here by sharing our collected wealth with others. We will take

a special collection on Easter Sunday (April 5) for this initiative. Our goal is \$20,000, and several thousand dollars have been committed already. In this way, we can honor our legacy as the builder of St. Luke's Hospital and make a very real impact in the lives of this community.

I am very proud of Minnesotans for gathering peacefully to protest injustices happening in our cities, and the support our Diocese has shown in these gigantic efforts. This is the power of community, and the power of love. I'm sitting here struggling to find the right words to even describe how I feel about all of it, which tells me that what we've been through was indeed very intense. When I feel that way, I know that what I need most is to stop talking, trying to think in complete sentences, and pray. Lent is the perfect time to do just that. We all need rest and quiet meditation. Up until recently, I had a very hard time actually knowing how to pray, or thinking that I wasn't "doing it right." I'm learning that there are so many different ways to pray, and they all help bring us closer to our understanding of ourselves and God. This is the work of Lent.

In March, St. Paul's will be hosting a Lenten Retreat, and I am really looking forward to it. This is an all ages retreat that will focus on spiritual practices, song, art, and prayer in community. It will be on Saturday, March 14, from 10 am-3 pm. I will be teaching a watercolor session, and there will be chances for kids to move and get their wiggles out. The St. Paul's Church Scholarship Fund

Because education is one of the most important elements of a successful society and a key factor in the well-being of a community, the Mars family established a Scholarship Fund in 1989 for members of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Graduating seniors from high school or high school graduates, of any age, are eligible to apply. The scholarship recipients are chosen by a committee of people who also are members of St. Paul's and/or members of the Mars family.

The criteria to be considered are active church participation, completion of high school or GED, a demonstrated interest

in completing a college or trade-oriented education process, and submitted recommendations. The awards are renewable annually for four academic years.

SCHUMANN AND SCHUBERT.

St. Paul's Guild Ladies Spend an Afternoon With Them.

Circle No. 4 of St. Paul's Guild gave a musicale yesterday afternoon at the home of Mrs. John Loman, at 295 East Tenth street. A large number, principally women, attended, and the circle realized a very comfortable sum for St. Paul's Episcopal church.

The event was called "An Afternoon With Schumann and Schubert." The first thing on the program was a sketch of Robert Schubert, read by Mrs. J. D. Morrison. Miss Villa Butters followed with selections from Schumann's "Carnival Scenes." Miss Marlon Ray gave Schumann's Nocturne in F, op. 23, and Mrs. Emily Ellis Woodward sang "Der Hilda-go." James C. Ray gave a violin solo, "Traumerel" and this ended the Schumann part of the program.

The second part was opened with a paper on "Some Characteristics of Schubert," by Mrs. Emily Ellis Woodward, who after her paper sang "Hark, Hark, the Lark," and a serenade by the composer. Francis E. Woodward sang "Her Portrait," "Faith in Spring," and "By the Sea." Miss Ruth Markell and Mrs. Loman gave the "Marche Militaire."

From Deacon Pat

Lent has always been a time of deepening spiritual practice for me. For the past several years I've been working crazy hours, and am resigning from Chum at the end of March. I'm looking for something PT for income, and focusing on living into my diaconal identify. Just freeing up more time doesn't bring about a healthier balanced life. I keep returning to my Rule of Life and find myself not fully living into who I want to be and how I want to spend my days.

I've begun changing some of my daily practices, but find my habits are so ingrained that I need to be more than intentional to overcome them. During Lent I'm stepping away from social media. My iPhone is dying so I replaced it with a flip phone. Now instead of having a computer in my pocket, I have to go looking for digital communications when wifi is available. I'll spend less time on snippets and emails, more time lingering in conversation face to face.

I'm a fan of John Mark Comer's teachings, and his discipleship course "Practicing the Way." His teaching on Sabbath includes really slowing things down and focusing on rest for our souls, rejuvenating us for who God calls us to be and what God calls us to do. As I reclaim my time I'm reading Comer's book, The Relentless Elimination of Hurry. A variety of Lenten practices invite us to enter into this space of reflection, of turning away from those things which no longer serve us and toward those things that draw us closer to Jesus. When keeping the Sabbath we have so often focused on it as something God wants from us. Jesus reminds us that "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath." (Mark 2:27) Sabbath feeds and restores us. Each time we gather around the Lord's Table we are nourished at the altar before we "go in peace to love and

serve the Lord." Sabbath includes gathering at St. Paul's on Sunday morning, but it is so much more.

Our Lenten journey leads us first to Palm Sunday, then to the cross. Jesus died. Those watching thought it was the end, but Jesus didn't end there. Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again! Jesus equips us to share his love with the world. The Holy Spirit provides what we need to follow Jesus, to learn and do. Sabbath prepares us for this work.

There's so much to do. Are you tired? It's so easy to rush from one urgency to the next crisis. Jesus calls us to follow him and provides specific guidance throughout the gospels. In Matthew 25 he emphasizes faithful stewardship of God-given gifts, and radical compassion for those who are marginalized and in need. Genuine faith is shown through actions, particularly serving "the least of these" who are seen as Christ himself.

We are companions on this journey, both in the nourishing and in the laboring as together we become the embodiment of God's Kingdom on Earth. We Sabbath together, and we serve together. I pray you are finding opportunities for both here with our St. Paul's family of faith.

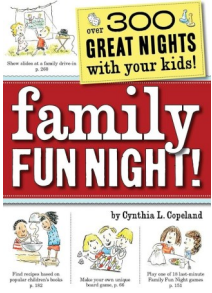

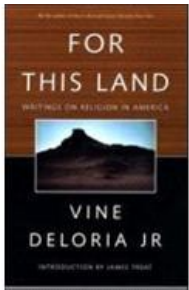
New Additions to the Olcott Library

For This Land: Writings on Religion in

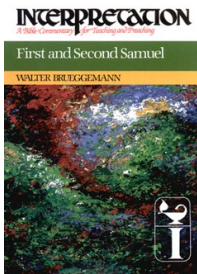

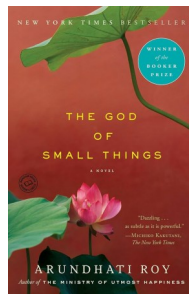

cies and our ultimate fate reminding us "that we are a part of nature, not a transcendent species with no responsibilities to the natural world."

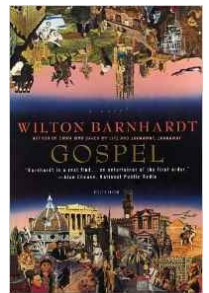


First and Second Samuel by Walter Brueggemann.

Gospel by Wilton Barnhardt. A shy theological student and a hard-drinking, disillusioned ex-Jesuit pursue rumors and clues to find a lost first-century gospel of the Bible, a document that could shake the foundations of Christianity.
