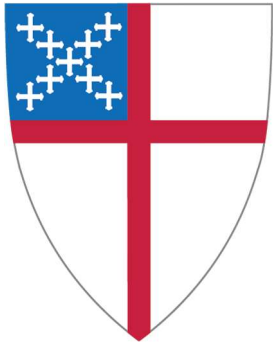

Dear Friends of St. Paul's,

Over the summer the church staff and I have been working diligently to present our kids, teens, and adults with quality formation groups this fall. Throughout this Messenger, you'll find lots of ways to learn in community about the Bible, about Jesus, and about living out our Christian values.

Here's the main highlights:

- **Two Godly Play Rooms this Year – Upper and Lower**

A new Godly Play room for 3rd – 6th grade will begin, allowing the kids to engage with the materials at a more age-appropriate level.

- **Jordan Sundberg is stepping into leadership in Godly Play**

I'm also really pleased that Jordan Sundberg will be taking a key leadership role in organizing Godly Play along with Sophie. Please welcome Jordan to our formation team and, if you have kids in Godly Play, please keep an eye out for communications from her.

- **Rector's involvement in Youth Ministry**

This year I will have a teaching role in our two youth classes: the 4th – 6th grade youth group and the 7th – 9th grade youth group. Please see page 3 for details about these groups and a calendar. These groups will be given their first "adult" Bible at a special church blessing on September 27 and then learn how to use them over the course of the year. The groups will be working with a curriculum called Follow Me that is progressive, scripturally based, and approaches teens with intellectual respect.

- **Adult Forums are Growing**

Wednesday Adult forums are being organized and held by Jill Peterman, Sue Sommer, and Tamara Jansen. You can read more about what their plan is for these forums on page 7. Deacon Pat will begin another cohort of Practicing the Way, which I highly recommend to anyone wishing to deepen their faith personally through simple practices. Please see page 4 for an update from Deacon Pat. Book and Bible Study groups are also active.

Lastly, I want to make sure you know that you are invited to Pride Sunday at 10 am on September 6. Each year for Duluth-Superior Pride, one of the affirming churches hosts an inter-Christian worship service that is available to all. This year we volunteered to host. We will be offering a relatively traditional Rite II service with special texts for Pride. I hope to show the local community that you can have a traditional church that is also welcoming and affirming. We will be joined by Peace UCC, Pilgrim Congregational, and the Unitarians of Duluth, among Pride Festival goers. There will be a social hour before the service in addition to coffee hour after the service, thanks to Susan Anderson and Natalie Constance.

I look forward to seeing you this month, returning from your many adventures!

Youth Groups in 2026 – 2027

This year both youth groups will be given their own NRSV Bibles (as a kind of 'first grown up Bible' gift) and will spend the year learning how to use it. We will use portions of a curriculum called Follow Me that is progressive, scriptural, and offers practical uses for the texts that we read. Because we will order a Bible for each teen in each group, registration is necessary. An online registration will be at stpaulsduluth.org/sign-up.

Bible presentation and blessing will be on Sunday, September 27.

New This Year: The 4 to 6 from 4 pm to 6 pm

Monthly, 3rd Wednesdays -- September 16, October 21, November 15, and December 16

Recognizing that grades 4, 5, and 6 are critical years for big questions about God and church, we're spending special attention on this crew this year. In addition to a new upper Godly Play class, these students will have a youth group opportunity once a month. "The 4 to 6" will meet on the 3rd Wednesdays, have about an hour of gathering time, and then join the 5:15 pm Eucharist. Parents are welcome to join the Eucharist with their kids and then stay for supper. Lead teachers will be Maggie and Sophie. This is an experiment, so **we need at least five students to register officially in order to make it work.**

Upper Youth Group:

Grades 7–9 and Up from 6:30 to 8 pm

Bi-Weekly, 1st & 3rd Wednesdays – September 16, October 7 and 21, November 4 and 18, December 2 and 16

The upper youth group is geared for pre-Confirmation students but is open to those who have already been confirmed, as it is a new curriculum and a new focus. This group will go more in depth into the different units we are doing from *Follow Me*. The lead teachers in this group will be Maggie, Joann, and Brad.

Lost Treasures from the Archives

ARTHUR F. M. CUSTANCE

Born in Hereford, England on January 28, 1866, Arthur F. M. Custance was a son and grandson of clergymen in the Church of England. After a preparatory education, he studied at Lancing College and Brasenose College, graduating from Brasenose in Oxford, England, with a Bachelor of Music degree. Following graduation, he taught school in Wales for a short time before leaving England for St. Johns, New Brunswick.

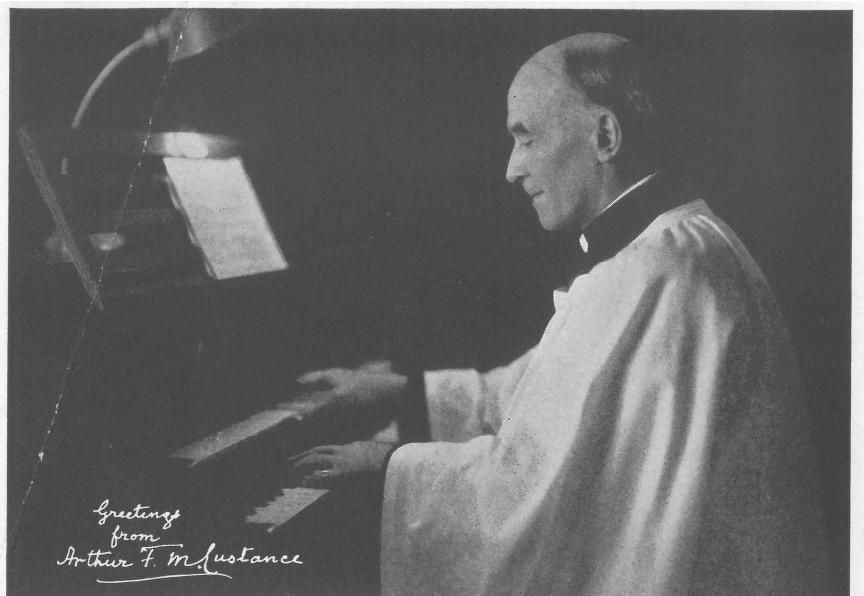
He came to the United States in 1892 to join the faculty of Duluth Central High School where he taught Latin, a position he held for 34 years. He was a strong advocate for the teaching of Latin in the curriculum of the public schools. To him Latin was the history and literature of a powerful and scholarly people, and knowledge of Latin derivatives offered a deeper understanding of the English language. His courses were difficult, but his classes were overflowing. Few could match his ability to interest students. To the community he was more than an individual—he was an institution. He left his impression upon all those he touched -- his thousands of students who profited by his inspiration during 40 years of teaching, His church friends who sat in awe at his deftness at the organ, and all those who knew him in his many Masonic relationships and who marveled at the many-sided versatility of his genius.

Custance was a born musician, a natural organist; his compositions were admired and he had the rare ability of fitting words to them with his spontaneous gift of rhyme. Serving as organist and choir master at St. Paul's Episcopal Church for 28 years, he also directed and coached the Ionic Lodge Male Chorus and the Scottish Rite Quartet. He compiled and arranged a volume *Ex Oriente*, containing selections suitable for use in all the degrees of the Scottish Rite. While the majority of these are his original compositions written expressly for these Degrees, the volume also contains arrangements and adaptations from the works of well-known composers. Many of his compositions are still used by many Masonic orders throughout the country.

In addition to being widely known for his musical work in the Masonic fraternity, hundreds of Custance's other compositions and arrangements were published by nationally-known publishers. His best-known musical score is "Taps" written to the words composed by H. S. Spencer of the U. S. Navy. This song won the attention of John Philip Sousa, who programmed it many times.

Because of his musical ability Custance was appointed to arrange and conduct the music at the dedication ceremonies of the present Scottish Rite House of the Temple in Washington, D.C. on October 18, 1915. The dedication program included several of his original compositions. He also served as Organist for the Scottish Rite Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction from 1919 to 1923. Custance was a recognized authority on Masonry. He was raised to the Master Mason degree in the Apollo University Lodge No. 357 at Oxford, England on June 16, 1887 and coroneted a Thirty-third Degree Inspector General Honorary by the Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction in 1919.

He died on August 21, 1926, leaving an indelible mark in the memory of all who were privileged to share his genius. A bronze tablet in his memory is displayed in the Valley of Duluth Scottish Rite Temple, a gift of the Scottish Rite Class of 1926. On it is inscribed: "Never was there a more faithful Brother." A deserved tribute to a Man and His Music.

July 2026 financials were presented to the Finance Committee and Vestry at their August meetings. Below is a summary of the July General Operating Fund results.

Of note: We are already running a deficit fairly early in the year.

Adult Formation

What the heck is Adult Formation? Is it the same as Adult Education? An answer might be summed up in this prayer:

*Dear Lord, of these three things I pray:
To see thee more clearly
Love thee more dearly
Follow thee more nearly
Day by Day.*

Adult Education might teach us that this prayer is attributed to St. Richard of Chichester. We might learn more about him and his influence in the pre-Reformation Anglican Church. We might learn that prayer is set to music and is #654 in our hymnal. People of a certain age might remember that it was featured in Godspell with a really catchy tune, which might lead us to compare that musical theologically with its contemporary, Jesus Christ Superstar. All of this is great! And...

...Engaging in the lifelong work of what this prayer actually points us to is Adult Formation. Baptism got us started; formation is what keeps us growing as adult Christians living in a complex world. It's for everyone at every stage of life.

St. Paul's offers a host of formation opportunities through Bible Studies, Book Groups, retreats, and more. Many of these are held during the day, making them

unfortunately inaccessible for much of the congregation. Which brings us to Wednesday Evenings at St. Paul's on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the month.

Who is this for? Everyone who wants to see God more clearly in the here and now; who longs to be equipped to love God more dearly because the here and now can be challenging; who wants to follow God more nearly not just on Sunday mornings but throughout the week and would like some tools to do so.

To that end, join us Wednesday evenings at St. Paul's, beginning with a simple supper followed by a brief, engaging presentation and a chance to explore and respond to prompts around the table. Each week builds on the preceding week, but even if you're juggling a busy schedule, know that even periodic participation will nourish your spirit. We'll be using a program specifically geared for adult learners which links up with the materials that Rev. Maggie will be using with the youth in their classes – a plus for parents whose kids are in that class.

Wednesday Evening Adult Formation kicks off on September 16. Watch this space for more information!

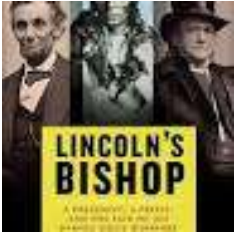
Thank You

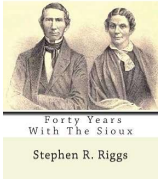

Lincoln's Bishop: A President, a Priest and the Fate of 300 Dakota Sioux Warriors by Gustav Niebuhr. On the Minnesota frontier in 1862 Dakota Sioux rose up and slaughtered hundreds of pioneer families. Citizens demanded mass executions and deportations. Into this turmoil stepped the Rt. Rev. Henry Benjamin Whipple, the Minnesota's first Episcopal bishop. He made the case for mercy and a deeper justice which led to a meeting with President Lincoln, who after the meeting, was moved to intervene.

Mary and I: Forty Years with the Sioux by Stephen R. Riggs. First published in 1880, this is Riggs' firsthand account of the 40 years of missionary life he and his wife spent among the Sioux in the Dakota territories beginning in June 1837, when they arrived at Fort Snelling on the Minnesota River.

Faith Formation



As I write this, I can hardly believe that it's time to get back to school, regular programming, and a predictable rhythm of life. This summer I worked with a lot of folks to plan the coming year and envision some new spaces for youth formation.

Godly Play: Jordan Sundberg has been busy behind the scenes recruiting and training teachers and has stepped into an ambitious leadership role. We are beginning the year with a new set of spaces on third floor. So, if your child is in K-6 grade, they will go upstairs for children's church (instead of downstairs). There will be two rooms. We will be adhering to a mode of teaching that is closer to the vision of the Godly Play foundation, which includes "work" and "feast." We will learn a lesson one week and spend the following week digesting what we've taken in through art and discussion (work). Each week will include something akin to communion that is shared in a circle (feast). Look for updates from Jordan about the lessons we're learning, so that you can support your child's spiritual growth if they have thoughts or questions they'd like to discuss. Godly Play will resume on September 20.

New Youth Groups: As you hopefully read on the first page, Maggie is excited to spend more time on youth formation this year. I will be helping with this, as well as getting spaces ready and organizing meals for all in attendance on Wednesday evenings. It was great to get feedback from families this summer about how to best

serve the youth at our church, and we hope to deliver! Please see Maggie's article for the details if you have a child in the 4th grade and up.

Rally Day: is September 13! This is the official kickoff for the programming year. Because there will be baptisms on that Sunday, kids will stay in the sanctuary during the service, but afterwards there will be a bouncy house and yard games outside as well as lunch for all.

Kids Coffee Hours will be September 20 and October 25 in the Children's Room downstairs after the 10 am service. This is a chance for kids to play, sing, and get their sillies out. We will have special treats for them, and will host them until noon.

White Earth 2.0: We're going to White Earth again! Because we have a confirmation gap year, this will be an all-ages trip. The trip is planned for MEA weekend (Thursday 10/15 – Saturday 10/17), and will include visits to St. Columba's, the Treaty Museum in Park Rapids, the Maker's Place, talking circles, and visits with community members and elders. Pastor Mark Olson is leading the trip, and I will be attending as well. We will stay at the Shooting Star event center in Mahanomen. Please look for more information and email me if you and your family would like to come!

I look forward to seeing you as we get going this fall! I hope you and yours are enjoying the last blast of summer.
